

pared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of the parishes of Saint George, Doncaster; Sprotborough; and Saint Peter, Bentley, all in the diocese of Sheffield.

“SCHEME.

“Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

“And whereas the Right Reverend Leslie, Bishop of Sheffield, consents to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme):

“Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the said parishes of Saint George, Doncaster; Sprotborough; and Saint Peter, Bentley, shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

“THE SCHEDULE.

“The territory to be annexed to the parish of Saint George, Doncaster:—

“(1) All that part (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Sprotborough which lies to the north and east of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the parish of Saint Jude, Doncaster, from the parish of Sprotborough in the middle of the River Don at a point opposite the middle of the north eastern end of the footpath which leads generally northeastwards from Sprotborough Park to the western end of the Newton Ferry, and proceeding thence first westwards to, then southwestwards then generally northwestwards along the middle of the said footpath to a point in the middle of the footbridge which carries the said footpath across the Gowdall and Braithwell branch line of British Railways (North Eastern Region), and continuing thence northwards along the middle of the said railway line to the boundary which divides the parish of Sprotborough from the parish of Saint Peter, Bentley.

“(2) All that part (coloured green on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Saint Peter, Bentley, which lies to the southwest of the middle of the Great North Road.”

And whereas the provisions of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme, have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Sheffield.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 18th day of September, 1957, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Harold, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme) for effecting the union of the benefice of Great and Little Saxham and part of the benefice of Fornham All Saints with Westley, both situate in the diocese of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich.

“SCHEME.

“1. *Union of Benefices.* With the consent (which has been given to us in writing) of the Reverend Canon Miles Peard Sargent, being the incumbent of

the benefice of Fornham, All Saints with Westley, that part of the benefice of Fornham, All Saints with Westley, which coincides with the area of the parish of Westley shall be severed from the said benefice and the part so severed and the benefice of Great and Little Saxham shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of ‘The United Benefice of Great and Little Saxham with Westley’ but the parishes of Great Saxham, Little Saxham and Westley shall continue in all respects distinct; and the remaining part of the benefice of Fornham, All Saints with Westley, shall be known as ‘The Benefice of Fornham, All Saints’ and the incumbent thereof shall have the cure of souls within the limits of the parish of Fornham, All Saints.

“2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend William Thomas Taylor if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Great and Little Saxham shall, with his consent, (which has been given to us in writing) be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

“3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Great and Little Saxham shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

“4. *Patronage.* With the consent (which has been given to us in writing) of the Master or the Keeper and Fellows and Scholars of Clare College in the University of Cambridge, being the patrons of the benefice of Fornham All Saints with Westley, after the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the alternate patrons of the benefice of Great and Little Saxham in the order in which they would, but for the provisions of this Scheme, have been entitled to present to the benefice of Great and Little Saxham.

“5. *Endowments.* Upon the union taking effect the whole of the endowments and property belonging to the benefice of Fornham, All Saints with Westley shall belong to the benefice of Fornham, All Saints.”

And Whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And Whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.

“We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Derby (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for authorising the taking down and sale of the site and materials of the church of Saint James, Buxton, in the parish of Buxton, in the diocese of Derby.

“SCHEME.

“1. As soon as conveniently may be after the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette, the church of Saint James, Buxton, in the parish of Buxton, shall be taken down and the materials and site thereof, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof, shall be sold and disposed of by us at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient subject to the conditions and restrictions imposed by the said Measures.
