

Troops proceeded on their March to Italy. Care is taken to prevent any farther Designs of this kind, by disarming the disaffected Persons in Bavaria, and by putting Garisons into all Places where they are judged necessary.

**Hamburg, May 29.** The King of Poland went from Leipzig the 25th Instant towards Carlsbad, having before his Departure sent Orders to Saxony, for his Forces which are designed for Poland, to be in a readiness to march. It is said his Majesty intends, after a short stay at Carlsbad, to proceed to Vienna. The Swedish Troops in Pomerania are to draw together near Stetin, and have already left their Quarters, in order to march thither. They write from Carlsbad, that several Transport-ships, under Convoy of a Swedish Squadron, were failed from thence for Prussia, with 1500 Horse on board, who are to join the Swedish Army in Poland; and that more Reinforcements were shortly to follow.

**Hague, June 2. N. S.** The 24th. past we received Advice, that the French Army commanded by the Marshal de Villeroi was come out of their Lines, and was encamped between the Mehaigne and the Jaar. The 29th, an Express came from Monsieur d'Auverquerque with an Account, That they had on the 27th invested Huy, and had laid a Bridge over the Maese, within two Leagues of that Place, and that the Elector of Bavaria was expected in their Camp that night. The Garrison of that Place consists of four Battalions. The Letters from the Maese of the 30th say, the Enemy had been reinforced by 7 or 8000 Men from Flanders, and that they had not yet begun the Siege of Huy; but it was doubted they might have some other Design in view. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough arrived at Triers the 26th, and the English Forces were then within six Leagues of that Town. Letters from Spain give an Account, that the Marquis Das Minas, with a Body of 13000 Portuguese, had attacked Salvaterra, and taken it at the 4th Assault, the Garrison being made Prisoners. He afterwards possessed himself of another Place called Zarza, 500 Spanish, who were there, remaining likewise Prisoners of War. A hole from France say further, that the Earl of Galway had taken by Storm the Town of Valencia d'Alcantara three days after the opening of his Trenches, 350 of the Garrison being taken Prisoners, and the rest put to the Sword. They had Advice from Italy, that Miranda had surrendered to the Duke of Vendome for want of Provisions, and that Prince Eugene had attempted on the 10th to pass the Mincio, but had been repulsed. There is an Account from Savoy, that a Detachment of the Duke of Savoy's Forces had taken near Abiagrasso part of the Duke of Vendome's Baggage, and all that of Monsieur Mignon: Whereupon the Count de Vaubecourt, Governor of Verceil, marched out with a Body of Horse to intercept this Detachment, but fell into an Ambush of 2000 of the Duke of Savoy's Horse, and was defeated, himself being killed, with a Lieutenant-Colonel and other Officers, and a Brigadier-General, with the Marquis de Bonelles, and several more, wounded.

**Portsmouth, May 24.** On the 22d Instant Her Majesty's Fleet commanded by Sir Cloudesly Shovell failed from Spithead to St. Hellens. Yesterday in the afternoon the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Peterborough went on board the Admiral at St. Hellens; and this morning the Fleet failed to the Westward.
