

of Buttermere shall, with the consent (testified by his signature hereto) of the Reverend Ernest Llewelyn Weight being the incumbent of the united benefice of Shalbourne and Ham, be permanently united together and form one parish for ecclesiastical purposes under the style of 'The United Parish of Ham', but the parish of Shalbourne shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Parish Church.*

"The parish church of the parish of Ham shall be the parish church of the united parish.

"3. *Registers.*

"The marriage registers at the church of Buttermere shall be dealt with by the incumbent of the united benefice in accordance with the provisions of Section 62 of the Marriage Act, 1949, and the register books of baptisms and burials and other the records and muniments deposited in the said church shall be transferred to the parish church of Ham."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 8th day of January, 1958, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, in pursuance of the Church Patronage Act, 1870, and of the Acts therein mentioned, have prepared the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the churches and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Heapham with Upton in the County of Lincoln and in the diocese of Lincoln.

"SCHEME.

"Whereas we are satisfied that Sir Weston Cracroft-Amcotts, M.C., of Hackthorn Hall in the County of Lincoln is the patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice:

"And whereas the said Sir Weston Cracroft-Amcotts, M.C., desires to transfer the advowson of the said benefice to the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being and is consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof he has executed the same):

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Kenneth, Bishop of Lincoln (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be transferred to the said Kenneth, Bishop of Lincoln, and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Wiggonholt with Greatham and the benefice of Parham shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Parham and Wiggonholt with Greatham' but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Parham shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice."

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, and the Diocesan Stipends Funds Measure, 1953, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Geoffrey, Archbishop of Canterbury (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme), for effecting (1) the union of the benefice of Saint George, Ramsgate, and the benefice of Saint Paul, Ramsgate, and (2) an alteration in the boundaries of the parishes of Saint George, Ramsgate, Saint Paul, Ramsgate and Holy Trinity, Ramsgate, all of which benefices and parishes are situate in the diocese of Canterbury.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices and Parishes.* The benefice of Saint George, Ramsgate, and the benefice of Saint Paul, Ramsgate, shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Saint George, Ramsgate,' and subject as hereinafter provided the
