the Turks; this the Gavernour of Milan oppoled, affi ming the disposal thereof, did of Right belong to His Catholick Majetly his Master, the Pope much distrissed with this unexpected opposition, Orders the Cardinal de Litta the Archbithop to pronounce the Church Censures against his opposers, and fent several Officers to collect and dispose of the said Revenues; those Officers were seized on by the Covernours Order, who also gave the Cardinal to understand, that if he persisted in this vractice, he should be forced to send him into Spain to answer it before the King: the Pope highly exasperated by this procedure, has sent his Complaints to his Nuncio at Madrid, of which we may expect the issue.

Don Pedro d' Arragon, Viceroy of Naples having ordered some Companies to hatrasse some parts of the Countrey about Abruzzo, which was wont to give neception and Entertainment to the Banditi 3 the Bishop of that place of though offered equivalent satisfaction) opposed it as injurious to his Revenue; whereupon the Viceroy summoned him to appear at the Chamber-Royal at Naples, but the Bishop appealing to the Pope, has resused to obey the

The Viceroy having thought fit to Leavy a Tax upon the feacoasts for their desence, the Bishops who were mostly-concerned in those Lands opposed the said Leavy, and made their complaints to the Pope, who wrote a severe Letter to the Viceroy, and encouraged the Bishops to perfevere in their opposition: the Pope has since faither declared his distaits action, saying that he will not consist the promotion of the Spanish Cardinal till he have sull state clion given hom both from wither and Naples.

Legorn, Octob. 21. The 16th inftant arrived the Submission Ketch sions Foy, and yesterday the Falmouth Merchant, both of them laden with Pilchards; here is also come in the Phenix in B days from Tunis, advising us that two English Fregats had been lately there and were passed thence to Tripoly, to Land and settle there a Consul, intending to return by Messina and this Port for Convoys to our Merchant ships; farther telling us, that Sir Thomas Allen continues before Algier, and had forced on shoar and afterwards buttn one of their men of War of 30 Guns, but the Turks escaped all of them to land; and that at Tunis the people were ordered to make great and publick rejoytings which were to continue for a whole Moon, for the surrender of Candia to the Grand Visier.

Venices Oftob. 26. On Saturday last the Senate ordered that speedy notice should be given to all Princes of Christendom, especially such as are most concerned with them in the assairs of Candia, of the peace lately made with the Turks, of which they advised the several Ministers residing

in this City.

On Monday last the French Ambassador went to the Colledge to make his Compliments of Condolency for the surrender of the place, and of Congratulation for the Honourable Articles of the Peace, which were the same evening they artived, approved of by the Votes of the whole Senate, Three only excepted, and their Ratissication dispatched away to the Captain-General. Segnior Cavalier Molino is since chosen to be sent Ambassador Extraordinary to the Grand Segnior, with an ample Ratissication of the said peace, with a Present of Cloth of Gold for himself, and a considerable sum of Moneys for Presents to his Ministers.

Orders are sent to the Captain-General not to dismiss as yet any ships from his service, but to attend for the security and transportation of our forces from Candia, whole Conduct was committed to Monsseur de St. Andre Montbrum, and 21 Gallies and all the Galeasses lay ready to receive them; the Generalissimo was departed thence for Standia, having lest Segnior Rattaglia, Proveditor General of the Forts and Islands of that Kingdom which remain fill in our possession.

Paris; Nov. 6. On-Saturday last the Thikish Minister having been conducted from Fountainbleau to Iff, two Leagues distant from this City, the place appointed for his entertainment during his continuance in those parts, was from thence brought to an Au ience at Surenne from Monfieur de Lionne, who fitting on a Couch, after the mutual salutes after the Turkish manner by accuching only the Hat and Turban; Monfieur de Lionne received his Letters of Credence, from which he told him, he could not collect his Character as Amba ador, tur only as Envoy; to which the Turkish Minister answered, that he had other Letters but was Commanded on pain of his head, not to deliver them but into the hands of the Emperour of the French (as he stiled His Majesty) with which, Monsieur de Lionne promising to acquaint His Majesty, the Audience ended.
