

the Turks; this the Governour of *Milan* opposed, affirming the disposal thereof, did of Right belong to His Catholic Majesty his Master, the Pope much dissatisfied with this unexpected opposition, Orders the Cardinal *de Lissa* the Archbishop to pronounce the Church Censures against his opposers, and sent several Officers to collect and dispose of the said Revenues; those Officers were seized on by the Governours Order, who also gave the Cardinal to understand, that if he persisted in this practice, he should be forced to send him into *Spain* to answer it before the King: the Pope highly exasperated by this procedure, has sent his Complaints to his Nuncio at *Madrid*, of which we may expect the issue.

Don Pedro d' Arragon, Viceroy of *Naples* having ordered some Companies to harrasse some parts of the Countrey about *Abruzzo*, which was wont to give Reception and Entertainment to the Banditti; the Bishop of that place (though offered equivalent satisfaction) opposed it as injurious to his Revenue; whereupon the Viceroy summoned him to appear at the Chamber-Royal at *Naples*, but the Bishop appealing to the Pope, has refused to obey the Citation.

The Viceroy having thought fit to Levy a Tax upon the seacoasts for their defence, the Bishops who were mostly concerned in those Lands opposed the said Levy, and made their complaints to the Pope, who wrote a severe Letter to the Viceroy, and encouraged the Bishops to persevere in their opposition: the Pope has since farther declared his dissatisfaction, saying that he will not confirm the promotion of the Spanish Cardinal till he have full satisfaction given him both from *Milan* and *Naples*.

The Count *de Prado*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Prince Regent of *Portugal*, is this day arrived in Extraordinary Pomp and State, and has this Evening a private Audience from the Pope.

Legorn, *Octob. 21.* The 16th Instant arrived the *Submission Ketch* from *Foy*, and yesterday the *Falmouth Merchant*, both of them laden with Pilchards; here is also come in the *Phoenix* in 8 days from *Tunis*, advising us that two English *Fregats* had been lately there and were passed thence to *Tripoly*, to Land and settle there a Consul, intending to return by *Messina* and this Port for Convoys to our Merchant ships; farther telling us, that *Sir Thomas Alton* continues before *Algier*, and had forced on shoar and afterwards burnt one of their men of War of 30 Guns, but the Turks escaped all of them to land; and that at *Tunis* the people were ordered to make great and publick rejoicings which were to continue for a whole Moon, for the surrender of *Candia* to the Grand Visier.

Venice, *Octob. 26.* On Saturday last the Senate ordered that speedy notice should be given to all Princes of Christendom, especially such as are most concerned with them in the affairs of *Candia*, of the peace lately made with the Turks, of which they advised the several Ministers residing in this City.

On Monday last the French Ambassador went to the Colledge to make his Compliments of Condolency for the surrender of the place, and of Congratulation for the Honourable Articles of the Peace, which were the same evening they arrived, approved of by the Votes of the whole Senate, Three only excepted, and their Ratification dispatched away to the Captain-General. *Signior Cavalier Molino* is since cholen to be sent Ambassador Extraordinary to the Grand Signior, with an ample Ratification of the said peace, with a Present of Cloth of Gold for himself, and a considerable sum of Moneys for Presents to his Ministers.

Orders are sent to the Captain-General not to dismiss as yet any ships from his service, but to attend for the security and transportation of our forces from *Candia*, whose Conduct was committed to *Monsieur de St. Andre Montbrun*, and 21 Gallies and all the Galeasses lay ready to receive them; the Generalissimo was departed thence for *Standia*, having left *Signior Pattaaglia*, Proveditor General of the Forts and Islands of that Kingdom which remain still in our possession.

The Proveditor General of the Three Islands has by a severe Edict forbid all Armed Brigantines and other vessels to go abroad for Piracies, and has sent his Compliments upon the peace to his Neighbour *Bassas* on the Continent, desiring the restoration of Commerce.

Paris, *Nov. 6.* On Saturday last the Turkish Minister having been conducted from *Fountainbleau* to *Iffy*, two Leagues distant from this City, the place appointed for his entertainment during his continuance in those parts, was from thence brought to an Audience at *Surenne* from *Monsieur de Lionne*, who sitting on a Couch, after the mutual salutes after the Turkish manner by touching only the Hat and Turban; *Monsieur de Lionne* received his Letters of Credence, from which he told him, he could not collect his Character as Ambassador, but only as Envoy; to which the Turkish Minister answered, that he had other Letters but was Commanded on pain of his head, not to deliver them but into the hands of the Emperour of the French (as he filed His Majesty) with which, *Monsieur de Lionne* promising to acquaint His Majesty, the Audience ended.

The Bishop of *Besceze* intends about the end of this week to set forwards on his voyage for *Spain* with the Character of Ambassador, and with him is to goe the *Sieur de Gourville* as Envoye from the Prince of *Condé*.

From *Heidelberg* we have Letters of the 21st past advising, that the Treaty is in all points of difficulty concluded between the Prince Elector Palatine and the Duke of *Lorraine*, and that the House of *Nassau* is willing to accept of an equivalent offered for the Town of *Homburg*, which is believed may conduce much to the union of the Princes of *Germany*, whose Deputies are met at *Heidelberg*, but may in little time adjourn to *Cologne*.

Yarmouth, *Octob. 26.* On Monday last upon the mistake or negligence of a Fisherman, two ships laden, one with Deals and Raft, and the other a Fly-boat with Pitch, Tarr, and Iron, ran upon the Sand called the *Newark*, lying about Four miles off from this place, where they were cast away, but the men happily escaped, excepting only the Mate, Cook, and one Boy which perished with the Fly-boat.

Deal, *Octob. 28.* The Town of *Diepe* continues to be severely visited with the Plague, by reason whereof, a stop is put to all Entercourse with that place, and His most Christian Majesty the better to prevent the spreading of the Infection in the Neighbourhood, has Commanded Two Companies of Foot and one Troop of Horse to lie near the Town to keep in the Inhabitants. The Infection is also broken out in *Callise*. One House in *Dover* is said to be also infected and shut up, but great care is used to prevent its farther spreading.
