

(testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice of Lyonshall with Titley.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Without prejudice to the exercise before the date when the union takes effect of any of the powers conferred by the Parsonages Measures, 1938 and 1947, and pending the provision of a new house approved by us as suitable to be the house of residence for the incumbent of the united benefice of Lyonshall with Titley, the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Lyonshall shall, if at the date of the union it so belongs to the said benefice, be the house of residence of the incumbent of the said united benefice.

"4. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect, in every series of three successive turns of presentation to be made to the united benefice of Lyonshall with Titley the patron of the present benefice of Lyonshall shall have the first and second turns and those of the joint patrons of the present united benefice of Titley with Staunton (or their successors in title) who were patrons of the former benefice of Titley immediately prior to its union with the former benefice of Staunton-on-Arrow shall have the third turn; and the patronage of the separate benefice of Staunton-on-Arrow shall belong to and be exercised by the other joint patron of the present united benefice of Titley with Staunton.

"5. *Endowments and property.* Upon the union taking effect the endowments and property now belonging to the united benefice of Titley with Staunton shall be divided and distributed as follows, that is to say, a capital sum sufficient to produce an annual income of £300, being part of a larger capital sum held by us for the said united benefice, shall be assigned and annexed to the united benefice of Lyonshall with Titley and all other the endowments and property of the united benefice of Titley with Staunton shall be assigned and annexed to the separate benefice of Staunton-on-Arrow."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.

TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England on Friday, the 16th May, 1958, at 1 p.m. for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the National Loans Act, 1939, to the amount of £250,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000, £10,000, £25,000, £50,000 or £100,000. They will be dated at the option of the tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 19th May, 1958, to Saturday, the 24th May, 1958, inclusive, and will be due 91 days after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000 and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. Notification will be sent by post on the same day as Tenders are received, to the persons whose Tenders are accepted in whole or in part, and payment in full of the amounts due in respect of such accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 1.30 p.m. (Saturday, 11.30 a.m.) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

9. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.
