Turin, July 1. N. S.

THE Duke de la Feuillade arrived at Susa the 24th past with several Battalions from the Vallies of Perouse and St. Martin; the next day, having been joined by a Reinforcement of Foot, and two Squadrons of Dragoons, he came to Buffolini, and the 26th to Villars-Almeze, where he still continues. Our Duke, upon Notice of his March, sent a Detachment of Horse towards that Place to observe his Motions. The Duke of Vendosme has hitherto made little Progress in the Siege of Chivas: He has lately sent several Battalions over the Po to attack the Post of Castagnito: They raised some Batteries against it; but finding they did little Execution, he sent over a further Detachment, which was reinforced yesterday by 20 Companies of Granadiers; and about one in the afternoon they attacked a House that we had fortified, and upon which they had made an unsuccessful Assault about 12 days ago. They met with a second Disappointment; and after a Dispute which lasted two hours, and wherein they were thrice repulsed, they retired with considerable Loss. We had not above 10 Men killed or wounded. Our Men marched out of their Intrenchments to pursue them in their Retreat; but we know not yet with what Success.

From the French Camp before Chivas, July 3. On the 30th we assaulted one of the Duke of Savoy's Intrenchments near Castagnito with a Detachment of Granadiers, supported by several Regiments of Foot. The Attack was very vigorous, but unsuccessful; and our Forces, after having been exposed about an hour to the Fire of his Troops, were obliged to retire with the Loss of about 20 Officers and 200 private Men killed and wounded. The taking of this Intrenchment being of great Importance, we have opened Trenches for that purpose. Upon the Motions which our Forces on the other side of the Po made yesterday, the Duke of Savoy came out of Castagnito to attack them; but found them so advantageously posted, that he retired within his Intrenchments without attempting any thing. We continue the Siege of Chivas, where the Duke of Savoy's Forces defend themselves with great Bravery: our Miners are already advanced under the Covered-way.

From the Grand Prior's Camp at Ombriano, July 2. N. S. The Grand Prior having received Advice, That Prince Eugene marched the 26th past from the Neighbourhood of Roncaglia, had passed the Oglio at Calze, and was encamped at Roncaglia, he immediately left Manerbio, and having passed the Oglio at Ponte-Vico, encamped within two Leagues of the Germans, with his Right at Soncigno, and his Left towards Crema, whence he detached five Battalions and six Squadrons, under the Command of the Marquis de Broglie, with Orders to guard some Passes upon the Adda. The Imperialists having since crossed the Serio, we also passed that River, and are now encamped with our Right at Ombriano, near Crema, and our Left stretched out towards the Adda.

Vienna, July 8. N. S. The Emperor went from hence the 14th Instant to his Palace of Favorita, intending to continue here part of the Summer. Count Schlick returned the same day from the Island of Schutt, where the Imperial Forces continue, expecting the Danish Troops. Baron Szirmai's Secretary arrived here last night from Hungary; He left Prince Loboski the 4th Instant, who was then marching with 20000 Men from Waizing along the Danube, intending to join Berzulin near Newhausen, in order to observe the Imperialists. Baron Szirmai has given Notice to Mr. Stepney, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary, and to Monsieur Bruyart, Envoy from the States General, That Prince Ragotski, in the Name of all the Malecontents, accepted the Mediation of Her Majesty and the States for composing those Troubles; which is looked upon as a good step towards attaining that End, of to great Advantage to the Common Cause, and to the Empire in particular.

From the Imperial Camp at Lauterbourg, July 12. N. S. The Enemy, after several unsuccessful Attempts, finding it impracticable to force these Intrenchments, retired the 10th Instant.

London, July 12. The Duke of Marlborough, and several other Gentlemen, shall have a Guinea Reward, and reasonable Expence, for their Notice of him (so as he had again) to Richard Nicholls of the notice of his name, and black ink, in the Star-Place, where he on his near Bank, with the Hair off, a kind of Mark in his forehead, which is the Duke's, and to guard our

ment to reinforce the Troops which are employed to guard them. Several Deserters are come over from the Enemy, who report, That the Marshal de Villars has received Orders to send Detachments to Italy and Spain.

Frankfort, July 15. The Elector of Mentz passed through this Place this day, going from Achaffembourg to Mentz, and was saluted by a discharge of our Cannon. The Palatine Forces, and those of Westphalia, which have lain some time near Traerbach, are now marching towards Mentz, being, as is said, to encamp near that Place, and to be joined by 6 Palatine Regiments. The Prussian Forces, to the Number of 10 or 12000 Men, continue at Rhinhausen, not far from Philippsbourg. General Arnheim, their Commander, is gone to the Camp at Lauterbourg, to confer with the Generals there.

Dresden, July 15. The King of Poland's Forces are preparing for their March into Poland. Our Advices from thence say, That the King of Sweden was still at Rawitz, and had sent a Detachment of 3000 Men to observe the Starost Smigielky, who continued to oppose the Designs of the new Elected King and his Adherents, and had dispersed several of the particular Diets, which had met in pursuance of his Summons: And that the Czar of Muscovy had been at Witpefsky, and was decamped from thence with the best part of his Army; but it was not yet known whether he intended to march.

Hague, July 21. N. S. The 19th Instant about noon an Express arrived here from the Deputies of the States General who are with their Army commanded by Monsieur d'Auverquerque, with Advice, That his Grace the Duke of Marlborough had the morning before forced the French Lines near Heilefhem, and was then in pursuit of the Enemy. Yesterday another Express came with a Letter upon the same Subject from Monsieur d'Auverquerque to Monsieur Fagel, which has been published by Order of the States, wherein he mentions, That the Bavarian Horse were almost entirely ruined, as were also the two Regiments of Alsace and la Marque; That the Marquis d'Alegre and the Count de Hoorn, Lieutenants General, the Baron of Thaufkirchen, Commander of the Bavarian Carabiniers, the Colonel of the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Woltramsdorf, and divers other Officers, had been taken Prisoners; And our Men had besides taken from the Enemy 18 Pieces of Cannon, some of them 24 Pounders. Monsieur d'Auverquerque adds, that this Justice was due to the Duke of Marlborough, That the Glory of this happy Success was entirely owing to his Grace's Courage and Conduct. Other Advices reckon among the Prisoners, besides those above named, the Prince d'Aquaviva, Aid de Camp to the Elector of Bavaria, 3 Bavarian Colonels, with many other Officers, and a great number of private Men; and say, that another Bavarian Colonel had been killed, the Prince of Talmont mortally wounded; and that of the two Regiments above-named, few escaped being either killed or taken Prisoners. That our Army was marched towards Louvain, and the Enemy to Park. Monsieur Hompech is just now arrived from the Army, being sent by the Duke of Marlborough to the States General with further Particulars; by which it appears, That the Advantage we have gained is much greater than it had been represented in our former Advices. Letters from Switzerland say, that there was Advice from Italy, That Prince Eugene had passed the Adda, and was on the 5th Instant advanced within five Leagues of Milan.

Windsor, July 14. Colonel Durell, Adjutant-General and Aid de Camp to his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, arrived here this evening, being sent Express by his Grace to acquaint Her Majesty with the happy Success of Her Arms under his Grace's Conduct: The Particulars whereof are as follow;

considerable Magazine of Provisions and Ammunition.

In the eige of the Evening his Grace, according to the Measures on which he had resolved, ordered a Detachment of 20 Battalions and 38 Squadrons, under the Command of Count Noyelles, Lieutenant-General Scholten, and Lieutenant-General Ingoldesby, the Horse (that were principally concerned in this Action) being commanded by Lieutenant-General Lamley, to advance towards the Posts above-mentioned, which were at least 3 Leagues from our Camp; and at 10 at night he followed with the rest of the Army, having given Notice to Monsieur d'Auverquerque that he might march back again, in order to join and second him.

By break of day, the Detachment being come to the Lines, forced their Passage with little Opposition, and got over with so much diligence, that 3 Regiments of French Dragoons, which were encamped near the Place attack'd, had not time to oppose them, but were obliged to retire to Leeuwe. Immediately after, Monsieur d'Alegre appeared with a strong Body of Horse and Foot, computed at 50 Squadrons and 20 Battalions, and advanced with great Resolution; But his Grace being already got over with good part of the Horse of the Right Wing, and having formed them, he attacked the Enemy with so much Bravery, that after a hot Dispute of two hours, he obliged them to retire with considerable Loss. His Grace thereupon immediately ordered a Detachment to march to Tirlemont, where they forced the Battalion of Monluc, which was in that Place, to surrender at Discretion.

Another Detachment of Dragoons, which his Grace sent to pursue the Enemy, had the good Fortune to overtake and seize a great part of their Baggage.

In this Action Monsieur d'Alegre and the Count de Hoorn, Lieutenants General, two Majors General, and a great number of other Officers and private Soldiers, were taken Prisoners: We also took 10 Pieces of Cannon, 8 whereof were treble Barrels, and many Standards and Colours. It is not possible to express the Bravery and Resolution our Troops shewed on this occasion.

Yesterday our Army marched from Tirlemont to this Camp, the Right being near Vhebeck, within a Mile of Louvain, and the Left at Corbeck. The Enemy having marched all the night before, passed the Dyle the same evening at Hever, and encamped near Blichem; But their Rear-Guard was not quite passed over when our advanced Squadrons appeared; whereupon they immediately took up their Bridges, leaving behind them a great number of their Foot, of which the Parties sent out by his Grace have brought in above 1400 Prisoners.

Several Officers and Soldiers who were wounded and made Prisoners at the forcing of the Lines are still hourly brought in; and the Number of Officers now Prisoners amounts to near 80, besides those of the Regiment of Monluc.

The Enemy have quitted Dielt, and withdrawn the two Battalions that were there in Garrison; upon which the Magistrates deputed two of their Body to wait upon his Grace, and beg his Protection.

The Enemy fire upon us from the Walls of Louvain, but without doing us any Damage.

His Grace has sent Colonel Richards, one of his Adjutants, to the Emperor, and Lieutenant-General Hompeich to the States General, with an Account of this great Success.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c.
