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From Thurlday, November 4. to Bonday, November 8. 1669.

Lyme, Nov, x. He 30 past arrived here the Fane of this place and a small French Vessel with Wines from Morlaix, and the May-Flower of Lyme from Croyfick with Salt.

Yesterday came in the Sarab of this place from Morlaix and the Virgin of Weymouth from Bourdeavx, both of them having been long at lea and ran much hizard by foul weather, giving us but little news, but on-ly that the Great ship building at Brest for 1 co Guns was ready to be launched.

Yesterday about two or three Leagues from this Harbor was foundred a small veffel of Tinmouth.

Minebead, Nov. 1. On Sunday last the Thomas of Foy laden with Wooll from Waterford in Ireland was caft on shoar a little to the Eastwards of this Key and broken in pieces: the men laved.

The Confiant Foan of Toughall was also caft away neer the Bar of Earnstaple, three of her men escaping and five drowned 3 the was a new veffel laden with Wooll and other Irish Goods, we hear of several wrecks upon the coafts of Ireland, but no other on this Channel by the late Tempefts.

From the Bay of Algiers, Sept. 18. The 7th inftant the Briffol, a man of War of the lquadron belonging to Sir Thomas Allen, leiled an Algier Bark, having on board 54perfons, whereof fome Women and Children; and the night following another was put on thoar in the Bay of Algier.

The 8th inftant neer Montefous within the Bay was taken a Galliot, which the Turks hed left and bored, but the vefiel still swimming, was carried off with a lading of Goods; thip-Timber defigned for one of their thips now on the Stocks.

The 10th inftant came in the Portland, , Novfuch, and Pearl from cruifing between Cape Tenes and Cape Barter, with this account ; that the 7th inftant discovering a Turks man of war under the fhour, the Portland and Nonfuch being to the windward, kept at a diftance the better to fecure the Turk; fhould he have endeavour'd to come by the wind, whilst the Pearl went before to intercept him from making to Cercelli, in which way Captain Berry in the Pearl maintained a long fight, keeping under the Lee, that the Turk might not get away, in which, though with fome loss to the Turk, he had only two men wounded; during this difpute, the Portland and Nonfuch making up, the Algier man ran on shoar and was immediately fired by them, but are as yet uncertain whether this were the Guilt Lime-tree of Algiers of 36 or the Flower-pot of 24 Guns.

The 11th, came in the Canstant Warwick from Alecant and the next day Sir Edward Sprag with the Portfmouth, Forefight, Dragon and Garland, bringing with them a Dutch Pink, with fome Iron which had been retaken from the Enemy, having on board 12 Turks and Moors;. at the same time came in also the Centurion, Dartmeuth, the Golden hand and Welcome Fireship.

The 13th we had intelligence that a small Algiers man of fix Gans was stolen out to cruife, and that two others were ready for the fame employment. The 14th, Sir Tho. Allen ient a Beat with a white Flag, carrying a Letter to the Duan, offring an equal-number of fuch of their people as he was mode prifoners, for the English as they have with them, to which as yet no answer is returned. The

next day the Nonfuch was fent out to Formentera, where tis probable an account may be taken of the small Turk which fole out, and the fame day the Ferfey and Centu-

rion were dilpatched to Junis and Tripoly. The 16th the Milford and Pearl were lent to Convoy the Golden hand, the Dutch Pink, the Galliot, and two Prize boats to Porto Mohun, , where they are also to cleanle, fince which nothing has happened of any moment. Madrid. Offob. 16. Thefe two last months here has

been a great Mortality in this Town which hath fwept'a way feveral Ministers, as Don Lattiffa de Arespacochago one of the Secretaries of State, who died the 4th inftant, in whole room the Queen was pleafed to make choice of Don Diego de la Torre, eldeft Secretary of War ; the next day died the Marquis de Trucif4 a Member of the Council of War, and on the 13th Don Blafco de Loyola, Secretary of the Universal dispatch, into whose place the Queen the next day preferred Don Pedro Fernandez del Campo eldest Secretary to the Council of State.

The Dake of Offuna Viceroy of Catalonia, lately defigned Governour of Milan being somewhat disgusted that he was left out at the late Nomination of three new Councellors of State, has fignified to the Queen his defires of refigning up his Government, who taking him at his word, has fent him Licence to retire.

The Queen bath been this week much diftemperd, and tis feared is in much danger. Letters of the 7th inftant from Alccant tell us, that the Dutch Convoy of 24 thips is pafled by that place bound for Genoua, Legern and Smirna,

Geneua, Ciob. 30. About 6 days fince arrived here the young Prince of Denmark incognite, attended only by 8 or 10 Gentlemen and Servants : upon news of his arrival the Senate ordered two. Gentlemen to attend him with their Compliments, and to flow him all the Civilities of this City, and at his ceparture yefterday in the morning,fent him a confiderable Prefent. He embarked upon one

of this States Gallies intending for Legern. The 26th infrant arrived here the Paradice, Loretas, and St. Anne, Great Genouele Merchant thips from Portugal and the coafts of Spain, their principal lading being Sugars; and the 28th came in five of the Dutch Convoy; fome of them empty, and in their company one English thip with Pilchards, the reft of the Convoy are pait by for Legorn and the Levant.

From Alecant we are told that a Turkish man of war had forced on thear neer that place an English Pulchard thips whole men faved themfelves, but left their thip to the Flames.

Three of Centurione's squadron will in few days be ready to follow him to Thoulon, having received a return of 35000 pieces of 8. from Paris to pay for their refitting.

Park, Nov. 9. As yet it is not refolved whether the Turkifh Envoy, norwi luftandir g his pretence of Letters. to be delivered into His Majesties own hand, shall be ad-mined to His Majesties presence, it having hitherto been thought fit .x Cily to follow the rule which has been ob ferved in Turky, where the Grand Segnior admits none to Audience under the character of Ambassador, referring all others to his Visier. This first Audience given by Monfieur de Lyonne was in Ceren onies the fame with that which was formerly given by the Vifier to the Sieur de Beaulien the French Envoy, who having been obliged to attend fome time for his Audience, upon pretence of a call to Prayers to which the Turks are by their Religion engaged
