"SCHEME

"Whereas we are satisfied that Herbert Copeland Cary Batten, D.S.O., of Church House, Yeovil, in the County of Somerset, a Colonel (retired) in Your Majesty's Army, as the surviving personal representative of the late Mrs. Dorothy Margaret Walker Heneage, is the patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice:

"And whereas the said Herbert Copeland Cary Batten desires to transfer the advowson of the said benefice to the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the time being and is consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof he has executed the same):

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Bath and Wells (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the *London Gazette* of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be transferred to the said William, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the time being."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the *London Gazette* pursuant to the said Acts.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Bath and Wells.

Whereas the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 8th day of October 1958, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Peterborough (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Lois Weedon with Plumpton and the benefice of Moreton Pinkney, both situate in the diocese of Peterborough.

"SCHEME

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Lois Weedon with Plumpton, and the benefice of Moreton Pinkney shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Weedon Lois with Plumpton and Moreton Pinkney' but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the *London Gazette* the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Thomas Patrick Hamerton if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Lois Weedon with Plumpton shall, with his consent (testified by his signature hereto) be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Lois Weedon with Plumpton shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"4. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the two benefices alternately, the patron of the benefice of Moreton Pinkney having the first presentation to the united benefice to be made after the union.

"5. *Archdeaconry and Rural Deanery.* The united benefice shall be in the Archdeaconry of Northampton and the rural deanery of Culworth."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the *London Gazette*.

Whereas the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 17th day of October 1958, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of the parishes of Quarndon, Darley Abbey, Mackworth and Allestree, all in the diocese of Derby.

"SCHEME

"Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Derby, consents to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme):

"Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the *London Gazette* of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the said parishes of Quarndon, Darley Abbey, Mackworth and Allestree shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule hereto and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

"THE SCHEDULE

"*The territory to be annexed to the parish of Quarndon.*

"All that part (coloured yellow on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Mackworth which lies to the northeast of the middle of Markeaton Brook.

"*The territory to be annexed to the parish of Darley Abbey.*

"(1) All that part (coloured green on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Mackworth which is bounded on the south and east by the parish of Darley Abbey and the parish of Allestree and on the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish of Allestree from the parish of Mackworth in the middle of Ferrers Way and extending thence westwards along the middle of Ferrers Way to its end and thence in the same straight line in continuation thereof to the eastern boundary of close numbered 3 thence southwards along the eastern boundary of closes numbered 3 and 13 to the southwestern corner of close numbered 48 thence southeastwards in a straight line across close numbered 13 to the northwestern corner of close numbered 47 thus meeting the boundary which divides the parish of Mackworth from the parish of Darley Abbey.

"(2) All that part (coloured purple on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Allestree which is bounded on the east by the parish of Breadsall, on the south by the parish of Darley Abbey and on the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish
