Gate of the City, where She arrived about 6 in the evening, and was received by the Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen, with the rest of the Corporation, in their formalities. The Duke of Somerset first presented to the Majesty the Duke of Rolton Last Lord High Her Majeffy the Duke of Bolton, (as Lord High Seward of this City) who presented the Corporation in Her Majesty: The Mayor then with suitable Expellions delivered to Her Majelly the Keys of the Gate, Maces, and other the Badges of his Truft, which the Mace, and other the Badges of his Truit, which the Queen received, and was pleafed to return to him. The Recorder then made a Speech, wherein he expedied the Corporations great Thanks for the Honour Ber Majeffy did, them by Her Royal Prefence, and their very great Duty, Loyalty and Affection, to Her Majeffy and Government. Whitehall, August 30. Letters from on Board the Confederate Fleet Commanded by the Earl of Peterborough and Sir Cloudelly Shovell, dated in the Bay of Altea the 3d inflant, O. S. which came in this morning, give an Account, That on the 20th of the last Month, that part of the Fleet which was cruifing be-tween Cape Sparrel and Cadiz, was joined by the Ships from Lisbon, except the Men of War that attended the King of Spain, which made the best of their way to Gibraltar, in order to change the Garison. The 23d the Fleet got into the Streights. And the 24th at night the Men of War abovementioned came out from Gibraltar, and joined the Fleet near that Place; which having a favourable Wind, arrived in the Bay of Airea the 30th. They met there with Easterly Winds, which they were told had blown in those Partsabout Sweeks; and a little to the Westward of that Place they took a

Sattee, which lay under the Shore, with 6 Brass Guns on board, that had been made use of in a Battery against Gibraltar during the late Siege of that Place. This Vessel had been detained near 3 weeks by the contrary Winds in the Place where she was taken. The Fleet took in fresh Water at Altea, and would proceed as foon as the Wind would permit on the intended Expedition.
