**A** Constantinople, August 2. N. S. A Discovery has lately been made here of a dangerous Conspiracy that had been formed in order to make an Insurrection, and to depose the Sultan, which happened in the following manner: The Visier Azem having received Intelligence the 30th past of a Meeting of part of the Conspirators, immediately sent for the Musti and Osman Pasha; but before they got to his House he mounted on Horseback, and went with his Guard of Janisaries to the Place of Assembly, where, after some Resistance, about 20 Persons were seized. They had prepared their Arms and Ammunition, and were to have put their Design in Execution in few days. The chief Men engaged in this Conspiracy were, the Nichi Pasha, a Visier of the Bench, and Hassan Effendi, who had been Caddee of Cairo, and was one of the Commissioners dispatched hence to Adrianople by the Rebels at the time of the late Revolution. It is found to have spread its Roots farther than it was at first believed, there being near 1000 Persons of all Ranks concerned in it. If it had continued undiscovered till they had thought fit openly to declare themselves, 'tis uncertain what numbers of People might have joined them, and how far the Attempt might have succeeded, in a Place where the People are always disposed to Sedition and Novelty. The Grand Signior was with his Seraglio diverting themselves under Tents in some Woods; Leagues from this City; but upon notice of this Event, he came the same night to Town, and the Danger being over, returned to his Diversions the next day. There is a Report, that Count Teckely is turned Roman Catholick, and is preparing to remove from Hunn, but it is not certain whither; and that in order thereunto he has sent his Plate and other precious Effects to the Jesuits College at Galara.

Venice, Sept. 19. Our Senate having appointed Signior Desino to be their Proveditor-General at Brescia, in the room of Signior Molino, he is gone thither to take possession of that Employment. The Governor of Bergamo has made an Agreement with Prince Eugene, for the furnishing of the Imperial Army under his Command with Forage and Provisions out of that Country. His Highness, as is said, has given Orders for the building of Barracks in the District of Gera d'Adda, for the use of his Army, whence it is conjectured that he intends to continue in those Parts till the Arrival of the Reinforcements he expects from Germany, from whence he daily receives fresh Supplies of Men and Ammunition. He has ordered the Roads from his Camp towards Crema to be enlarged, and Bridges to be made over the River Seriole, from whence some judge that he has a Design upon that Town, he having also sent a Detachment that way. The Duke of Venosme continues in the same Camp near Rivolta, and has ordered the Town of Bordolano to be fortified, intending to keep a Garison there, for the better preventing the Excursions of the Imperialists into the Mantuan and Cremonese. They write from Brescia, That the Prince of Anhalt Dessau is perfectly cured of the Wound he received in the late Action near Treviglio; and that Prince Alexander of Wirtemberg is also in a fair way of Recovery.

Wilna in Lithuania, Sept. 12. The Muscovite Forces left this Place the 10th Instant, and are marched in two Columns to a Camp marked out for them at

Grodno. The Lithuanian Troops are posted at Brest-cici, and the Saxons along the River Narew, behind Tikozin; which Place being of Importance, is garrisoned by 2000 Muscovite Foot and 500 Cossacks. General Lewenhaupt, who commanded the Swedish Forces in Courland, having Advice, that the Czar of Muscovy was advancing that way with part of his Troops, quitted that Province, and retired to Riga. The Czar is now before the Castle of Mittau, which Place is pretty well fortified, and has a good Garison in it. It is said he intends, when he has reduced it, to rejoin the rest of his Army.

Vienna, Sept. 19. Count Breuner, Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment which was commanded by the late Prince Joseph of Lorraine, arrived here the 17th Instant from Piedmont: The Emperor has made him Colonel of that Regiment. Count Diemanstein, Great Chamberlain to the Elector Palatine, came hither the same day from Dusseldorp. That day also the Emperor settled the Regency of the Lower Austria, and constituted Baron Kirchbaun Deputy Stadholder of this Province. His Imperial Majesty is expected here this evening from his Palace called the Favorita; and intends on the 22d Instant to receive the Homage of the States of Austria, as being the Regent Arch-Duke, which will be performed with great Solemnity. Letters from Buda say, that General Herbeville, with the Imperial Army under his Command, was continuing his March towards Upper Hungary, and that the Detachment commanded by General Glockelsberg was advancing towards Transilvania.

Berlin, Sept. 26. The Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel came the 19th Instant in the evening from Swerin to Oranienbourg: The next day the King of Prussia and the Prince Royal went to meet his Highness, and brought him to Charlottenbourg. The 22d the Landgrave came with his Majesty hither; and having seen the Castle and other Curiosities of this Place, they returned to Charlottenbourg, from whence the Landgrave set out the day following towards Swerin. His Majesty has made him a Present of a very fine Set of Horses. General Flemming came hither the 21st; and having waited upon the King at Charlottenbourg, went back from thence towards Dresden. They write from Courland, That the Cattle of Mittau is surrendered to the Muscovites upon Articles.

Frankfort, Sept. 27. The Town of Drusenheim surrendered to the Count de Frise the 24th Instant, and the Garison, consisting of about 400 Men, became Prisoners of War. Haguenau was invested the 26th, where the French have above 2000 Men: The Direction of that Siege is given to General Thungen; and we doubt not but that Garison likewise will be obliged to surrender at Discretion. Prince Lewis continues in his Camp at Wiersheim. By possessing himself of Drusenheim, he secures his Communication with the Lines of Stolhoffen; and the taking of Haguenau will make him Master of a great part of Alsace: It is thought his Highness will also attack Fort Louis, which, by the present Disposition of his Forces, is in a manner blocked up.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Herentals, October 1. N. S. Yesterday the Army made a Forage to the Right; and a Guard being posted for the Security of the Foragers at the Village of Wechlersandr, a Party of the Enemy came to the same Village, and being

being challenged by the Continel, were retiring towards a Wood at some distance from thence; but Lieutenant Alexander of Lieutenant-General Lumley's Regiment of Horse posted himself with his Guard of 30 Horse and as many Hussars between the Wood and the Village, so as to intercept the Enemy's Retreat; and Lieutenant-Colonel Dalzel of Colonel Lalo's Regiment coming up with his Guard of Foot, attacked the Enemy, killed 35, and took 40 Prisoners, with the two Partymen that commanded them.

*Hague, Oct. 2. N. S.* They write from Paris, That a Courier was arrived at Fontainebleau, who left Barcelona the 16th of the last Month, and brought an Account, That our Troops had that day possessed themselves of one of the Forts there, called the Fort Montjoye, which would in great measure facilitate their taking the Town; but that the Dispute was very sharp, and the Prince of Darmstadt, with 800 more of our Men; were killed upon the place: The latter part of which News it is hoped will not be confirmed; nor shall we give Credit to it till the Account comes from such Hands as may be better relied upon. These Letters add, That the Marquis of Dreux came the 22d from Piedmont to the French Court, being sent by the Duke de la Feuillade to give the King an Account of the Disposition of Matters in relation to the Siege of Turin; whereupon Consultations had been held, and the Marquis was sent back the 26th with Orders to lay aside that Design. Our last Letters from Madrid are of the 16th: They had no Advices from Barcelona sisher than the 9th: They write, that the whole Principality of Catalonia had declared for their lawful King Charles III. such Places only excepted in which there were Garisons to keep the Inhabitants in awe: That in Arragon, a considerable Town, and several Villages, had likewise proclaimed his Catholick Majesty; and that their Example would undoubtedly be followed by the neighbouring Provinces, as soon as he should be Master of Barcelona, which Place the Court of Madrid gave for lost. The Duke of Anjou had removed the Duke of Montalto from his Office of President of Arragon; which would serve but to exasperate the Spanish Grandees, who were already highly dissatisfied with his Administration.

*Whitehaven, Sept. 21.* The Amity of this Place, Isaac Lanton Master, arrived here last night from Virginia.

*Falmouth, Sept. 21.* The Unity, a Privateer of Jersey, brought in here the 20th Instant a French Prize laden with Iron. Yesterday the Charles the Third and the Fame came in with another French Prize called the Rose Pink, formerly taken from us in the West-Indies laden with Sugar and Coco from Martinico. Two of Her Majesty's Ships put into this Port the 20th, with about 120 Sail of Coasters and other Vessels, bound for Wales, Bristol, &c. and being joined by 30 Sail more from hence, continued their Voyage again the same evening.

*Plimouth, Sept. 23.* Two Dutch Men of War came in here the 19th Instant, with 9 Merchant-men under their Convoy from Rotterdam.

*Parsmouth, Sept. 25.* The 20th Instant 3 of Her Majesty's Ships came to Spithead, with about 30 Sail under their Convoy for Holland. The same day a Hamburg Man of War arrived here, with about 20 English and Dutch Merchant-men.
