## A PROCLAMATION.

ANNE R.

**W**HEREAS by Our Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty third Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and four, We did Charge and Command all Mariners in Our Service on Our Ships of War and other Ships, that had Leave by Tickets Signed by Our Flag-Officers, to be absent from their Duty for a time limited in such Tickets, and others that were absent without such Leave, that they should repair on Board the Ships to which they respectively belonged, at or before the Times therein and herein after mentioned, that is to say, All such of them as were then absent without such Leave, on or before the Tenth Day of January, the next ensuing, and such of them as were absent by Leave, on or before the Thirtieth Day of the same Month of January, upon Pain of being made Run upon the Ships Books to which they belonged: And whereas it has been represented unto Us, that the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, upon comparing some of the Books of the Ships which were fitted out last Winter at the several Ports, with the Muster-Books returned from the Clerks of the Chicque of the said Ports, have found that many of the said Mariners did not return to their Ships at or before the respective Times limited in Our said Proclamation, but did afterwards return, notwithstanding which they became liable to the Forfeiture of all their Wages grown due before their Return; We nevertheless out of Our Royal Grace and Favour, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby Declare, That all such Mariners as did respectively return to their Ships aforesaid, although the same were after the respective Times limited in Our said Proclamation, shall be charged out of Wages only from the respective Times they ought to have returned to their Duty in Obedience to Our said Proclamation, until the respective Times they actually did return to their Duty, as aforesaid.

Given at Our Court at Kensington, the Eleventh Day of October, 1705. In the Fourth Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the QUEEN.

Rome, September 26. N. S. A Courier whom the Pope lately sent to Vienna, with Letters for the Emperor and Empress; and the Empress Dowager, upon the Occasion of the Differences with the Imperial Court, returned hither this Morning; and this Matter seems at present to be in a fair way of Accommodation, through the Mediation of the King of Ro-

land and the Elector Palatine, which is accepted by both Parties. Cardinal Janson, who manages the Affairs of France at this Court, has been endeavouring to persuade the Pope to raise more Forces in order to oppose the Imperialists, if they should offer to take Winter Quarters in his Dominions; but this would favour so much of Partiality towards the French, and engage the Pope into so great an Expence, that his Ministers do all advise him against it.

Venice, October 3. The Imperial Army under Prince Eugene, and that of France and Spain under the Command of the Duke of Vendosme, continue in their former Camps, and had begun to build Barracks for their Troops, as if they were not soon to remove from thence. Count Palfy, who had been dispatched by Prince Eugene to Vienna, is returned to the Army, with fresh Instructions for his Highness, and a considerable Sum of Money to pay the Troops. Signior Ruzzini, Ambassador Extraordinary from this Republick to the Grand Signior, embarked here the 27th inst, in order to repair to Constantinople, and will shortly be followed by Signior Erizzo, whom the Senate has appointed to reside at the Ottoman Porte as their Bailo, or Ambassador in Ordinary.

Warsaw, September 30. Preparations are made here for the Coronation of the new Elected King Stanislaus; however some think that this Solemnity will be put off some time longer, several Members of the Assembly of the Confederated Nobility of Poland, which is sitting here, insisting that they should not proceed to the Coronation till after the Conclusion of the Treaty that is now on foot with the King of Sweden. We have an Account from Tycozyn, That Prince Menziko, First Minister of State to the Czar of Muscovy, came lately thither, and after he had conferred with the Vice-Chancellor of Poland, and reviewed the Saxon, Polish and Lithuanian Troops, lying near that Place, he returned to Grodno, to meet the Czar his Master, who we hear is advanced thither with 24000 Men, and is followed by 40000 Men more, intending to join the Troops above mentioned near Tycozyn, and then to march towards this Place. A considerable Body of Cossacks is also advancing this way from Ruffland, in order to join him. The King of Sweden with his Army continues encamped at Blonitz.

Libau in Courland, October 3. The Czar of Muscovy having possessed himself of the Castle of Bauske, which was the last Place belonging to the Dutchy of Courland that remained in the Hands of the Swedes, the Garison surrendring upon Articles, he has left a Body of 10000 Men to oppose any Forces which the Swedes might send this way, and is marching with the rest of his Army towards Warsaw. The Muscovites have put a Garison of 300 Men into this Place.

**Frankfort, October 11.** The Diet of the Circle of the Upper Rhine is assembled here, to regulate several Matters relating to the providing of Winter Quarters for the Imperial Forces; whereof it is said 16000 Men will be quartered in the Upper Palatinate and in Bavaria. Orders have been sent to the States of that Electorate for the hastening of the Levies that are making there for the Emperor's Service, which, if they are not compleat by the time appointed, the States will be obliged to pay a Sum of Money in Lieu of the Number of Men that shall be wanting. A considerable quantity of Corn and Meal has lately been sent to Prince Lewis's Camp at Wierheim. His Highness has given Orders for fortifying the Towns of Sultz, Hatten, Rodern and Wurth.

**Kinsale, September 28.** This day came in here Her Majesty's Ships the Kingsfisher, Captain Toller, the Burlington, Captain Francis Hosier, and the Dartmouth, Captain William Cock, Commanders, and under their Convoy the Tavistock, the Dutchess, the Scipio, the Kent, the Rochester, the Sidney, the Ann, the Samuel Ann, the Marlborough, and the Chambers Frigate, all homeward bound from the East Indies and China, and laden with Raw Silks, China Lacker Ware, and Salt-Petre. At the same time came in a French Prize called the St. Paul and St. Christopher, a Privateer belonging to St. Malo, of 16 Guns and 120 Men, taken on the Banks of Newfoundland by Her Majesty's Ship the Dartmouth; and the Grazewell Galley of London, John Sampson Master, homeward bound with Sugar and Ginger from Jamaica: She came away from thence with divers other homeward bound Merchant Ships, but was separated from them the 19th of the last Month by a violent Storm, which dispersed the Fleet, except 10 of them, which bore away for New-England.

**Plymouth, October 9.** This day arrived here the Happy-Return, George Tapson Master, and the Ann Frigate, James Tanner Master, both from Jamaica, which were separated from the homeward bound Fleet from thence by a Storm, which happened the 19th of August, in the Latitude of 37 Degrees, off the Coast of Virginia.

**Cowes, October 10.** We had lately very tempestuous Weather, which forced into Yarmouth a French Vessel laden with Brandy and Salt, and drove another ashore near that Place, which was bulged; but most of the Goods on board her are saved: They both came from St. Martins, and were bound to the Eastward.

**Kensington, October 11.** This day Her Majesty in Council was pleased to commit the Custody of the Great Seal to the Right Honourable William Comper Esq; one of Her Majesty's Learned Council in the Law, with the Title of Lord Keeper of the Great Seal of England; and the usual Oaths being administered to him, his Lordship took his Place at the Board accordingly.

**Whitehall, October 13.** Her Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Marr to be Secretary of State of Scotland, in the room of the Rt. Hon. the Marquis of Arundale, who is preferred to be Lord President of Her Council in that Kingdom.

The Dutch Mails of Tuesday and Friday last are not yet come in.

If any Able-bodied Men are willing to serve Her Majesty in the Train of Artillery abroad, let them repair to Captain Silver, Master-Gunner of England, at his House in St. James's Park, they shall enter into present Pay of Seven Shillings a Week, and be further encouraged and advanced as they shall desire.

The Master, Wardens and Assistants, of Trinity-House, do give Notice to all Commanders and Masters of Ships going in and coming out of Plymouth Sound, That, for the avoiding the Rocks in the said Sound, they have caused to be placed two great Cane Buoys; the one on the Swiftsard's Rock, painted white on the Head, bearing W. by N. near a Mile from the Shoagstone, on which Rock, at low Water, at a Spring Tide, there is not above two fathom and half Water, and broken Ground; the other on the West-end of a large Range of Rocks near the middle of the Sound, on which, at low Water, on a Spring Tide, there is not above 16 Foot Water, being painted red on its Head, and bearing N. by W. one large Mile from the other Buoy before described. This League of Rocks lies about one Mile and half between the S. and by E. and the S. S. E. from the Bury of St. Nicholas Island.
