

# The London Gazette.

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*Plymouth, Nov. 9.*

**H**Erè are lately arriv'd only two ships of this Port, both of them from *Portugal*, one of them laden with Sugars the other with Oyls.

*Dover, Nov. 12.* The Report of the breaking out of the Plague in *Gallice* is upon inquiry found to have had little foundation, the place continuing healthy without any jealousy of infection, the fear of infection in this place begins also to vanish, of ten persons which were shut up in the suspected house, none of them having fallen into any kind of distemper.

There are now riding in the Downs a Fleet of above 30 Merchant ships, all of them outwards bound, expecting the opportunity of a fair wind.

*Cracovie, Octob. 19.* The 12th instant arriv'd here two Ambassadors from the Cossacks and Inhabitants of several Islands of the *Boristhenes*, who have lately put themselves under the Command of their General *Anenko* in their addresses to His Majesty they have represented that their General refusing to join with *Dorosensko*, who with the other Cossacks have put themselves under the obedience and protection of the Turks, desires to be united with *Poland* for the reducing those Rebels to their obedience, but as yet no resolution is taken in this point, we being either over cautiously jealous of the sincerity of this Embassy, or more diffident of our own abilities that to declare a war with so potent an Enemy, till we have either fortified our selves with a League with the *Muscovite* and *Tartars*, or assured our selves of the succors of our neighbour Christian Princes.

The Popes Nuncio has lately pressed His Majesty to begin a war upon the Turks, and is expected that within 3 or 4 days he will make his proposals to this purpose at the full Assembly of the States.

Here has been lately many Quarrels and Duels between private persons, and some between persons of great eminency, besides that which happened between the Duke *De meirins Wisniousky* and the Palatine of *Russia*, Signior *Rugiosky* son to the late famous person of that name, had four days since a quarrel in the Kings presence with Signior *Galeski*, whom he challenged into the Field to fight before the next morning, where *Galeski* received a shot in his mouth which passed through his right shoulder, which is believed will prove mortal; about the same time Signior *Sapia* one of the principal Nobility of *Lithuania* upon the occasion of an old quarrel with Signior *Potoski*, under Sewer of the Kingdom, quarrelled a Colonel of his and struck him with such violence on the head with an Iron Mace in the Kings presence, and with some danger to His Majesties person, that the said Colonel dyed the next day; on the same evening when the blow was given *Potoski* sent a challenge to *Sapia*, in which were concerned as seconds, the two Princes, brethren to *Lubomirski*, and several other persons of Quality, but this was timely prevented by the shutting up of *Sapia* in his Lodging, whilst Duke *Michael Radziwil* with a party of Horse secured the rest of the parties; Five other Duels have within this week been fought by private Gentlemen, to the no little dissatisfaction of His Majesty.

The Deputies from *Kibovia* and some other Palatinates some days since left the Diet, protesting against the disposal of the Government of *Rossia* to the Palatine of *Sandomir* which by the *Passé Wort* was with other vintacles to have been reserved for the maintenance and satisfaction of such of the Nobles as had lost their Estates by

the revolt of the Cossacks; but by the endeavours of the Psiquaire, have been prevailed with to return. Since this the Palatine of *Sandomir* has returned the Government of *Rossia* into the Kings hands to be disposed of according to the first intention.

The Dietive or lesser Assembly of *Cracovie* hath by virtue of the Kings Letters Patents, after much debate, made choice of their Deputies to take their place in the great Assembly, where this morning some of the Members protested against their admission.

*Rome, Octob. 26.* The Marriage of *Don Giovanni Baptista Rospigliosi* with the Rich Heiress of *Pallavicino*, is now fully resolved, of which the Pope was pleased to give an account to his Generalissimo *Fra. Vincenzo* in the first Audience which he gave him on Saturday last upon his arrival from his Expedition to *Candia*, as he has since done to the Queen of *Swedenland*. Signior *Bailly Canillo* Father to *Don Giovanni* has also communicated the same to all the Cardinals, Ambassadors and Princes about the Town, this Marriage is designed to be first solemnized at *Genova*, the place of the Ladies abode by a Proxy, for which Signior *Nicols Lomellino* is the person designed, and the Bride to be from *Genova* conducted hither in one of the States Gallies, attended by several others of the Popes; in the mean time she has been attended on and complimented from *Don Giovanni* her designed Husband by Signior *Lopez Casati*, and presented with several Jewels to the value of 60 thousand Ducats.

The Count *de Vivonne* with several French Gentlemen who had their parts with him in his voyage to *Candia*, have been honourably received, entertained, and admitted to kiss the Popes foot, who as a special mark of his favour ordered them to be presented with some Gold and Silver Medals, and divers pieces of Devotion and Holy Relicks.

The Duke *de Miranda*, whose valour had been eminently shown in several occasions during that Siege, has been also treated by the Pope with extraordinary kindness, and is since returned home, carrying with him as an ample testimony of the Popes bounty, the body of a Saint enclosed in a rich Coffin.

The 19th instant the Count *de Prado* the Portugal Ambassador made his solemn entry, attended with a Train of above 60 Coaches and six Horses, and the same day made a private visit to the Pope who has been pleased to take order for the defraying of all his expences since the time he first entered within the bounds of the Ecclesiastical territories.

On Friday last he was by the Cardinal *d'Orsino* introduced with more solemnity to kiss the Popes foot, where he delivered his Credential Letters, and the same day he gave his visits to the Cardinal Patron *Don Camillo*, and the rest of the Popes kindred.

The Spanisht Ambassador, the Marquis *d'Assarguet* (who was not wanting in point of Ceremony to give a visit to the Count *de Prado* the next day after his arrival) has from *Spain* received Letters, assuring him of the Queens favour in admitting him into the number of Her Counsellors of State, upon which accession of Honour, he has received the Compliments of several Cardinals, he intends in little time to leave this Court, and to take possession of the Government of *Milan*, and the Duke *de sesto*, who for a little time only has supplied the charge, is to succeed him in his employment as Ambassador here.

The Cardinal *de Hesse* has upon the arrival of a Courier from *Vienna*, had an Audience from the Pope on the be-

half of the Marquis de Bade, the said Courtier being commanded to make a speedy return, the Pope has been pleased to return a Letter in an answer, written to him by the Emperor, full of kind expressions and compliments but giving him no encouragement to continue his solicitation for the promotion of the said Marquis to the Dignity of Cardinal.

**Lybon, Octob. 28.** Here are lately arrived three English ships, one of them the *Mary* and *Martha* from Scanderoon homewards bound, informing us, that the Plague was ceased at Aleppo after an exceeding great mortality, whereof 10 English Merchants were deceased there, and at Scanderoon, as were also Consul Boyer with several of the Prætorian Officers.

Here are now entering this Port two of the Great Duke's Gallies in 6 Days from *Marseilles*, having on board 12 English Horses, 3 Coaches and other Goods and some servants belonging to the Prince of Tuscany, who is suddenly expected in this Port.

Here is lately arriv'd the Dutch Convoy in 13 days from *Alcazar* consisting of two men of War and 10 Merchant ships, telling us, that off *Carragena*, a Corsair of *Alger* had chased on shore a small *Richard* ship bound for this Port, but not being able to fetch her off set fire to her.

From *Florence* we are told, that the Cardinals *Filoso* and *Sigismundo Chigi* were returned thither from *Piena* and lodged privately at the House of Chevalier *Borromeo*, but though they are *inognito*, they have in sight by some make their visit to the Great Duke and Duchesa, and Cardinal *Leopold*, who entertained them with much liberality at an excellent supper, and afterwards diverting them with a Ball and Comedy.

On Sunday last the Great Duke with his whole Court appeared in mourning for the death of the Queen Mother of England, since which the foreign Ministers residing at that Court have made their Compliments of Condolence to their Highnesses upon that Subject.

**Vienna, Nov. 1.** The Count de *Montecuculi* having by the Emperors Order taken a view of all the Frontiers, and the several Garrisons in *Hungary*, is lately returned thither and has given the Emperor an exact account of the posture of them, and of the state of affairs in that Kingdom, amongst other things, having represented to His Imperial Majesty of how small importance it would be to the Empire to continue a Garrison in the little Fort near *Comortz*, and what the consequences might be if a war should on this occasion be commenced with the Turks; His Imperial Majesty has thought fit to give out his Orders for the demolishing of the said Fort, which has been since executed in presence of the Bassa of *Neuhauzel*, who upon invitation came thither with a guard of 400 Turks to see it done, between whom and the Governor of *Comortz* passed many Ceremonies and Compliments.

Their Imperial Majesties intend to pass the winter in this City, which ends, they design as the Spring to pass into *Hungary*, where the Empress may be solemnly Crowned Queen of *Hungary*.

The Treasurer-General being more then suspected to have ill managed the publick Revenues, and being unable to give a satisfactory account of his Charges, is arrested and his Estate sequestred and expos'd to sale, and the Money which shall arise from thence ordered to be employed in the repair of the Fortifications of *Raab*.

The dissensions still continue high between those of the Reformed Religion and the Roman Catholics, which oft times break out into open violence, thereby encouraging the Turks to levy Contribution upon them, and to proceed with severity against such persons as dispute the justice of such exaction, of which the Bassa of *Neuhauzel* gave them one example of terror, ordering the head of an Hungarian Gentleman to be struck off, who refused the Turkish Officers who came to collect a Tribute which he denied to be due to the Grand Signior.

Upon intelligence that a considerable party of the Turks were drawn together with an intention to make an inroad

into *Moravia*, Orders were immediately sent to the Count *Rabatta's* Regiment to march towards the River *Waag*, and so to take up their Posters to put a stop to their passage over that River.

The Hungarians begin the rather to stand upon their guard on that side, because of a late discovery of a Conspiracy for the delivery of the Fort of *Vialo* to the Turks of Great *Waradin*.

**Genoa, Nov. 6.** The late ill and tempestuous weather hath put a stop to all ships in this Port, and hindered all Merchants ships from coming in hither. One of the Gallies belonging to this Republick Commanded by *Segnior Spinola* about three days since off *Amibo* took a Turkish Bark, having on Board 63 Turks, who had two days before sailed on a *Felucca* with several passengers.

From *Sardignia* we have advice that a Turkish ship richly laden, was by tempestuous weather cast upon that Island, where the men coming to Land not knowing upon what coasts the Storm had cast them, were quickly seized by the people, and the Ship and Goods made Prize, and that the Viceroy of the Island had armed out several Barks to defend the coasts against the Turkish Pirates, some of which had given chase to a Turkish man of War, and recovered from him a French Merchant ship with considerable lading, which the Turks had intended to have sent away for *Argiers*, but that the Viceroy being petitioned by the Proprietors of the lading, had ordered most of it to be restored to them.

**Paris November 19.** On Saturday last His Majesty had a review of about 6500 horse drawn up in the Plain of *Hobille*, but without any of the foot, but neither was the King of *Poland* present, or the Turkish Envoy. The Gallantry of this Rendezvous was much abated by the ill and rainy weather, which obliged His Majesty to take Coach, and the forces to draw off, sooner then was intended, to their Quarters.

The Courrier is dispatched away for *Constantinople* to solicit the Ottoman Port to furnish their Envoy in this Court with sufficient Character and Power to proceed in a Treaty for the settlement of Trade between that Empire and this Kingdom, whose return may be expected in 2 months.

The King of *Poland* arriv'd here on Sunday last, and hath taken up his lodgings in the Abby of *Saint Germain*.

On Saturday last was performed at *Chalot* a funeral service for the Queen Mother of England, where in a great assembly of persons of Honour, the *Abbot Bossu* pronounced an Eloquent Oration, to the great applause of the whole Auditory: The greater solemnity of the Entertaiment is to be performed too morrow, the 20th instant at *St. Dennis*.
