

half of the Marquis de Bade, the said Courtier being commanded to make a speedy return, the Pope has been pleased to return a Letter in an answer, some written to him by the Emperor, full of kind expressions and compliments but giving him no encouragement to continue his solicitation for the promotion of the said Marquis to the Dignity of Cardinal.

Lybon, Octob. 28. Here are lately arrived three English ships, one of them the *Mary* and *Martha* from Scanderoon homewards bound, informing us, that the Plague was ceased at Aleppo after an exceeding great mortality, whereof 10 English Merchants were deceased there, and at Scanderoon, as were also Consul Bowyer with several of the Fraternity of Cyprus.

Here are now entering this Port two of the Great Duke's Gallies in 6 Days from *Marseilles*, having on board 12 English Horses, 3 Coaches and other Goods and some servants belonging to the Prince of Tuscany, who is suddenly expected in this Port.

Here is lately arriv'd the Dutch Convoy in 13 Days from *Alcator* consisting of two men of War and 10 Merchant ships, telling us, that off *Carragena* a Corsair of *Alger* had chased on shore a small *Richard* ship bound for this Port, but not being able to fetch her off set fire to her.

From *Florence* we are told, that the Cardinals *Filoso* and *Sigismundo Chigi* were returned thither from *Piena* and lodged privately at the House of Chevalier *Borromeo*, but though they are *Monarchs*, they have in sight to make their visit to the Great Duke and Duchesa, and Cardinal *Leopold*, who entertained them with much liberality at an excellent supper, and afterwards diverting them with a Ball and Comedy.

On Sunday last the Great Duke with his whole Court appeared in mourning for the death of the Queen Mother of England, since which the foreign Ministers residing at that Court have made their Compliments of Condolence to their Highnesses upon that Subject.

Vienna, Nov. 1. The Count de *Montecuculi* having by the Emperors Order taken a view of all the Frontiers, and the several Garrisons in *Hungary*, is lately returned thither and has given the Emperor an exact account of the posture of them, and of the state of affairs in that Kingdom, amongst other things, having represented to His Imperial Majesty of how small importance it would be to the Empire to continue a Garrison in the little Fort near *Comortz*, and what the consequences might be if a war should on this occasion be commenced with the Turks; His Imperial Majesty has thought fit to give out his Orders for the demolishing of the said Fort, which has been since executed in presence of the *Bassa* of *Neuhauzel*, who upon invitation came thither with a guard of 400 Turks to see it done, between whom and the Governor of *Comortz* passed many Ceremonies and Compliments.

Their Imperial Majesties intend to pass the winter in this City, which ends, they design as the Spring to pass into *Hungary*, where the Empress may be solemnly Crowned Queen of *Hungary*.

The Treasurer-General being more then suspected to have ill managed the publick Revenues, and being unable to give a satisfactory account of his Charges, is arrested and his Estate sequestred and exposed to sale, and the Money which shall arise from thence ordered to be employed in the repair of the Fortifications of *Raab*.

The dissensions still continue high between those of the Reformed Religion and the Roman Catholics, which oft times break out into open violence, thereby encouraging the Turks to levy Contribution upon them, and to proceed with severity against such persons as dispute the justice of such exaction, of which the *Bassa* of *Neuhauzel* gave them one example of terror, ordering the head of an Hungarian Gentleman to be struck off, who refused the Turkish Officers who came to collect a Tribute which he denied to be due to the Grand Signior.

Upon intelligence that a considerable party of the Turks were drawn together with an intention to make an inroad

into *Moravia*, Orders were immediately sent to the Count *Rabatta's* Regiment to march towards the River *Waag*, and so to take up their Posters to put a stop to their passage over that River.

The Hungarians begin the rather to stand upon their guard on that side, because of a late discovery of a Conspiracy for the delivery of the Fort of *Vialo* to the Turks of Great *Waradin*.

Genova, Nov. 6. The late ill and tempestuous weather hath put a stop to all ships in this Port, and hindered all Merchants ships from coming in thither. One of the Gallies belonging to this Republick Commanded by *Signior Spinola* about three days since off *Anibo* took a Turkish Bark, having on Board 63 Turks, who had two days before sailed on a *Felucca* with several passengers.

From *Sardignia* we have advice that a Turkish ship richly laden, was by tempestuous weather cast upon that Island, where the men coming to Land not knowing upon what coasts the Storm had cast them, were quickly seized by the people, and the Ship and Goods made Prize, and that the Viceroy of the Island had armed out several Barks to defend the coasts against the Turkish Pirates, some of which had given chase to a Turkish man of War, and recovered from him a French Merchant ship with considerable lading, which the Turks had intended to have sent away for *Argiers*, but that the Viceroy being petitioned by the Proprietors of the lading, had ordered most of it to be restored to them.

Paris November 19. On Saturday last His Majesty had a review of about 6500 horse drawn up in the Plain of *Bohille*, but without any of the foot, but neither was the King of *Poland* present, or the Turkish Envoy. The Gallantry of this Rendezvous was much abated by the ill and rainy weather, which obliged His Majesty to take Coach, and the forces to draw off, sooner then was intended, to their Quarters.

The Courrier is dispatched away for *Constantinople* to solicit the Ottoman Port to furnish their Envoy in this Court with sufficient Character and Power to proceed in a Treaty for the settlement of Trade between that Empire and this Kingdom, whose return may be expected in 2 months.

The King of *Poland* arriv'd here on Sunday last, and hath taken up his lodgings in the Abby of *Saint Germain*.

On Saturday last was performed at *Chalot* a funeral service for the Queen Mother of England, where in a great assembly of persons of Honour, the *Abbot Bossu* pronounced an Eloquent Oration, to the great applause of the whole Auditory: The greater solemnity of the Entertaiment is to be performed too morrow, the 20th instant at *St. Dennis*.
