Turin, October 14. N. S.

THE Enemy, since the Arrival of the Marquis de Dreux, with Orders to put off the Siege of this Place, have been busied with sending away their Artillery and Ammunition. The 9th Instant we had Advice, that Orders were given in their Camp for the detaching of 4 Battalions more towards Suse, and 14 Battalions, with 15 Squadrons, to reinforce the Duke of Vendome; and if we may judge by the Motions of the Enemy's Troops, and by their marching some towards Suse and others towards Chivas, the Duke de la Feuillade intends to separate his Army. The Enemy pulled up and burnt the Palisadoes which they had planted round the several Redoubts that defended their Line along the Doria from Lufingo to the Old Park. The Duke de la Feuillade decamped from before this City, and marched with his Army to Colegno, where he passed the Doria. The Troops which he had left to bring up his Rear set fire to their Camp, and then retired. In the afternoon our Duke viewed the Enemy's Camp, with the Lines of Circumvallation and Contravallation which they had begun on this side the Doria; and the next day his Royal Highness ordered that about 300 Pioneers should be employed in leveling those Lines. His Royal Highness being informed, that the Enemy designed to return to Asti, and had already sent 500 Granadiers that way, who had passed the Po at Chivas, he ordered that a Regiment of Foot, 6 Companies of Imperial Granadiers, and two dismounted German Troopers, all Veteran Soldiers, under the Command of General Daun, should be detached from hence to reinforce that Garrison. Yesterday in the afternoon the Duke de la Feuillade marched to the Venerie; and we are told that he continues his March this day towards Setteau and Brandis.

From Prince Eugene's Camp at Fontanella, October 22. On the 16th Instant, our Army being then at Mondodena, a Detachment of the Duke of Vendome's Army attacked a Body of 500 Men that was posted on the other side of the Serio to guard our Bridge over that River, who thereupon retired to the Camp; and both Armies Cannonaded each other, the River being between them. The 17th we marched to Fianengo near Crema, the Enemy marching the same way on the other side the Serio. The 20th in the night we passed that River at Montotiano, without any Opposition from the Enemy, though they had advanced that way for that purpose; but they had not Intelligence of it soon enough to prevent us: After which we came to this Camp. The Enemy are advanced towards Soncino, where we have a Garrison, which is ordered to retire upon their Approach, and to rejoin us.

Vienna, October 24. The 17th Instant a Courier arrived here from the Imperial Army in Hungary, with a Journal of their March from the 16th of the last Month, when they passed the Danube at Pest, to the time of their crossing the Tibiscus. The Generals had at first designed to attack the Town of Zolnock; but finding it impracticable for want of Bridges, they marched along the Tibiscus by Czono-grod down to Segedin, where the Army passed that River the 9th and 10th Instant over a Bridge of Boats brought thither for that purpose from Peter-Waradin. The 11th they advanced as far as Varasbel, from whence they intended to proceed towards Great Waradin, in order to relieve that Place, which is besieged by a Body of Malecontents. The Imperial Army met with no Accident on their March, except that going from Koron the 25th past, their Left Wing was at-

tacked by a Body of Hussars belonging to the Malecontents, who were soon obliged to retire: And the 28th in the night the Malecontents beat up General Glockelsberg's Quarters near Ketskemec; but after an hour's Dispute, were likewise repulsed with Loss. Count Thun, Archbishop of Saltzbourg, being grown blind with Age, the Chapter proceeded to the Choice of a Coadjutor. The Election came on the 19th Instant, and Count Harrach, Bishop of Vienna, Son to the late Emperor's First Minister of State, was chosen unanimously. That day the Two Hungarian Deputies, Vifa and Occolucciani, came hither, with a Pass for Count Wratilaw, who is to go as Commissioner from the Emperor with the Mediators to Tirmau, where Count Berzeni, and Five other Deputies, are to meet them the 27th Instant, in order to treat of a Cessation of Arms, and to set on foot a Negotiation for accommodating of the Troubles in Hungary.

From the Imperial Camp near Haguenau, October 31. The 23d Instant Prince Lewis detached Colonel Stein with 600 Men to take Post in a little Island of the Rhine near Fort Louis, which will greatly annoy that Garrison, and hinder any Supplies or Provisions or other Necessaries from going into the Place. The 28th we marched from Wiertheim, and came to this Camp, lying between Haguenau and Pfaffenhoven. The Palatine Forces and other Troops are marched towards Hombourg, in order to form the Siege of that Place. Our General went from hence this day towards Francfort, to confer with his Grace the Duke of Marlborough. The Repartition of the Winter Quarters for our Troops is settled; 15000 Foot and 5000 Horse will be posted towards Haguenau and Drusenheim, and the rest of the Troops will be so disposed, that they may be drawn together in a very short time upon any sudden Occasion.

Francfort, November 1. The Emperor having thought it absolutely necessary, for the better carrying on of the War the next Campaign, to concert Measures with the Duke of Marlborough; and having by Letters earnestly pressed him to come to Vienna, his Grace accordingly left the Army in Brabant the 26th past, and came the 28th at night to Duffeldorp, where he was complimented, in the Name of the Elector Palatine, by Colonel du Socket, who, with other Officers of his Electoral Highness's Court, was appointed to attend his Grace in his Journey through the Elector's Territories. The 29th the Elector met his Grace on the Road about two Leagues from his Residence at Bernsberg, and entertained him very magnificently under several Tents which had been pitched there for that purpose. After Dinner his Grace continued his Journey; and the 30th at night was attended at Ditterken by the Baron of Eist, Great Dean of the Chapter of Triers, and the Baron of Hagen, Great Chamberlain to that Elector, who had sent them to compliment his Grace upon his passing through his Country. The 31st in the evening his Grace came to Francfort, and was saluted at his Entrance into this City with a triple Discharge of our Artillery; and when he alighted out of his Coach was complimented by the Magistraes. His Grace rested here this day, and, with his Retinue, was entertained at Dinner by his Grace the Duke of Shrewsbury. His Grace intended to have gone to morrow to Heidelberg, to confer with Prince Lewis; but was prevented by the coming of a Gentleman from his Highness, with a Compliment to his Grace, and to acquaint him, that he would be here this night to wait upon him; and intended to return towards the Army to morrow morning at break of day; and his Grace will proceed from hence on his Journey to Vienna.

Hamburg

Hamburg, November 3. Letters from Warfaw give an Account, That the new Elected King Stanislaus had nominated the Archbishop of Lemberg to succeed the Cardinal/Primate of Poland, lately deceased, in the Archbishoprick of Gnesen. They add, that the Van Guard of the Muscovite Army was advanced as far as Praagh; upon whose Approach the Troops belonging to the new Elected King which were posted there passed the Weiffel, and retired into Warfaw, being pursued by the Muscovites, who took 200 of them Prisoners, besides many Horses, and most of their Bagage.

Hague, November 6. N. S. The 2d Instant we received from Swifferland the Confirmation of the taking of Barcelona on the 4th of the last Month, which Intelligence they had by the means of two Letters intercepted by a Party of the Garison of Montmelian, one from the Duke of Berwick, and the other from the French Intendant at Montpellier, and both directed to the Duke of Vendosme. The same News was also mentioned in the Letters from Paris that came in the next day, which add, that the Caralans who are in Arms for his Catholick Majesty had entered into Arragon, and poss' fled themselves of the Town of Benasque, considerable for its being the Staple of the Wool that is exported from Spain into Languedoc. The Letters from Paris, which came in this day, confirm anew the taking of Barcelona, but with this Difference, that they now write, that the Garison marched out of the Place the 14th; and that the Viceroy, Don Velasco, offering to carry some Prisoners away with him, the Inhabitants rose up in Arms, and he was obliged to fly for his Life, and take Refuge, together with the Marquis of Aytona, in the King of Spain's Quarters, the Garison, both Horse and Foot, having forsaken him, and declared for his Catholick Majesty. The Advices from Paris mention an Action which is said to have happened the 14th past, between our Forces before Badajos and the French Army commanded by the Marshal de Tesse; and that the Earl of Galway had his Arm shot off by a Cannon-Ball; but they speak differently of the Success of this Action; some Letters say that the Siege was raised, and others that the Enemy's Van Guard was defeated, and that our Troops went on with the Siege. Yesterday there came two Expresses from our Army in Brabant; whereupon the States General met in the afternoon, and sent away a Courier to Monsieur d'Auverquerque: This gave occasion to a Report, that the Enemy were marched out of their Lines in order to attack our Army, which proved altogether groundless, these Expresses coming only for new Orders from the States concerning the Repartition of Winter Quarters, into which both Armies are preparing to go, the Elector of Bavarja himself being already gone to Brussels, as we are informed by Letters received from thence this day. The Earl of Portland, Lord Woodstock, General Churchill, the Venetian Ambassador, Mr. Poley Her Majesty of Great Britain's late Envoy at the Court of Hanover, and several other Persons of Note, went from hence 4 days ago to the Brill, in order to embark for England, there being several of Her Majesty's Yachts, under Convoy of 5 Men of War, appointed to attend them in their Passage thither.

Carke, October 14. This day Sir John Jennings, with part of the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships under his Command, came into our Harbour, and brought in with him 3 French Prizes, being all Privateers, one of 22, the other of 16, and the third of 14 Guns.

Bathnash, October 27. The 24th Instant came in here the Zealand's Weftare, a Dutch Privateer, which in her Cruize has taken a French Privateer of 14 Guns, and sent her away to Flushing. This day the St. Lewis, a Privateer of Jersey, sent in as Prize a small Vessel laden with Wine from Nantes.

London, October 29. Yesterday Sir Thomas Rawlinson, Elected Lord Mayor of this City, was Sworn at Guildhall, with the usual Ceremonies; And this day the said Lord Mayor, being accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, the Recorder, Aldermen and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went to the Water-side, and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the several Companies in their respective Barges, adorned with Streamers and Bendants, to Westminster-Hall, where the Lord Mayor was Sworn as usual in the Court of Exchequer; After which they returned by Water to Black Fryers Stairs, and from thence proceeded on

Horseback with the usual Solemnity to Drapers Hall, where a Noble Entertainment was provided, at which were present several Lords and others of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Judges, and other Persons of Quality.

St. James's, October 30. This day Dr. John Arbuthnet was Sworn Her Majesty's Physician Extraordinary, by Her Majesty's Special Command, in consideration of his good and successful Services performed as Physician to his Royal Highness.

Whitehall, October 30. The Squadron of Her Majesty's Yachts and Men of War, having on board the Earl of Portland, and other Persons of Quality, is safely arrived from Holland.
