**A** Merchant Ship belonging to Malta came in here last week from Port Malone, having been 13 days in her Passage from thence, which brings Advice, That Barcelona was surrendred; and that all the French who were in Miño ca had left the Island, and the Inhabitants waited only for the appearing of some English Men of War to declare for King Charles the Third. They write from Faro of the 26th past, that an Express was come in there from Tavira, with Advice, That one of their Fisher Boats had spoke with a Genoese Sattee that came out of the Streights, by which they likewise had an Account of the Town of Barcelona's being surrendred to the Confederates. The Letters from the Confederate Army on our Frontiers contain the following Account.

That on the 7th past, the Army being then before Badajoz, they had Intelligence, That the Marshal de Tesse was drawing his Troops together near Talavera; whereupon there was a new Disposition made of our Camp, the Left being extended over the Guadiana towards the Bridge on the Xevora, for the better preventing of the Enemy's succouring the Town, and to secure our Bridges of Communication upon the Guadiana. The 8th Lieut. Gen. Fagel came to the Camp. The 11th a Battery of 30 Twenty four Pounders, and another of 14 Mortars, were finish'd, and began early in the morning to play upon the Town. In the afternoon some Powder of the great Battery took fire, which occasioning a Disorder, the Earl of Galway immediately went thither in Person to give the necessary Directions for preventing any ill Consequences that might follow from this Accident. While his Lordship was there, his Right Hand was unfortunately struck off above the Wrist, by a Cannon shot from the Town; and it was found necessary to cut off his Arm a little below the Elbow, which succeeded very well: His Lordship thereupon being obliged to leave the Army, retired to Elvas, and is now in a fair way of Recovery. It is not easily to be exprest how much the whole Army was concerned for this unfortunate Accident; which is so much the more to be lamented, since the Dispositions his Lordship had made were not pursued in the manner he had designed them. However the Siege was carried on; and a practical Breach being made, they were preparing on the 13th to give an Assault that night: But between 10 and 11 they had Intelligence, That the Enemy's Forces were passing the Guadiana; whereupon a Council of War was called, and it was resolv'd to march against them. Accordingly part of the Army being left to guard our Attacks and Batteries, the rest of our Forces passed the Guadiana the next morning, and drew up in Order of Bat-

tel. The Enemy in the mean time had passed the Xevora, and had formed their Troops on the other side of that River, which was between the two Armies; only 10 or 12 Squadrons of their Dragoons remained on a rising Ground on the same side with our Army, whom Lieut. Gen. Wyndham attack'd with 7 Squadrons, and pusht them into the River, with great Disorder and Loss on the Enemy's side. The two Armies Cannonaded each other about two hours; after which our Troops returned to their Camp. The Enemy having in the mean time, by the Advantage of a Pass they had secured, thrown Succours into Badajoz, we withdrew our Artillery from the Batteries; and the 17th our Army decamped, and passed a Brook called Calomon. The Marshal de Tesse appeared upon some rising Grounds with part of his Army; but the March of our Troops being covered by the Marquis de Montandre, with 6 Battalions and 8 Squadrons, our Army drew off in very good Order, without any Loss; and encamped the next day at Telena. The 19th it passed the Guadiana; and all our Artillery was brought into Elvas.

The King of Portugal having an Account of the Earl of Galway's Misfortune, has been pleased to send his Lordship the following Letter.

My Lord Galway,

**I** The King, &c. The Marquis das Minas of Our Council of State, and Governor of Arms of the Province where you are, giving Us an Account in his Letter of the 12th Instant, That as you were advancing with great Zeal for Our Service, and the Common Cause, it happened that you were wounded with a Cannon Ball of the Enemy's, which struck off your Right Hand: We think it fitting to let you know the great Concern We had upon the Notice of that Accident, as well by reason of the particular Esteem We have for your Person, as of the great want there will be of you in the Army during the time of your Cure; assuring you, That We shall ever have your great Valour and Conduct in our Memory; and We order our Envoy at the Court at London, to represent to the Queen of Great Britain, Our Dear Sister and Cousin, the great Satisfaction We have in your Person. Given at Alcantara, the 14th of October, 1705.

Falmouth, November 10. The 6th instant came in here the Fame, a Privateer belonging to Flushing, which cruized in company with the Charles the Third, another Dutch Privateer, that had the Misfortune to strike on a Rock three Leagues to the Southward of this Port, and about two Miles from the Shore, and immediately sunk; but the Captain who Commanded her, and 34 of his Men, were saved. The 8th arrived here from Guinea the Donbourg of Middlebourg, Peter Greenstreet Master. Yesterday sailed hence to the Eastward Her Majesty's Ships the Moderate and Hazardous, together with a Dutch Man of War, a Frigate belonging to the Dutch East India Company, and two Privateers, and under their Convoy 13 Ships laden with Tin, 16 Prizes which had at several times been brought in here by Dutch Privateers.

The Godolphin Packet-Boat, commanded by Captain Gibson, arrived here the same day from Lisbon, but last from Kinsale; and the Samuel and Mary of London, from Antego; from whence she failed in company of 43 Sail of Merchant-men, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the Lynn and Margarét; but was separated from them about a week ago by bad Weather.

*Plimouth, Nov. 11.* The 7th instant the Triton, and some other of Her Majesty's Ships, came in here from cruising; and the former brought in with her as Prize a French Privateer of 14 Guns. The next day came in from Swanzy 10 Vessels laden with Coals for this Place. The 9th the Pelican, Peter Coffin Master, arrived here from Nevis, having been 8 weeks in her Passage: She came in company of a Fleet of about 40 Sail of homeward bound West-India Ships, under Convoy of the Lynn, and another Man of War; but parted from them the 2d instant about 200 Leagues to the Westward. Yesterday came in Her Majesty's Ship the Exeter from Kinsale; and this day the Medway likewise from Ireland; the Encrease of Bristol from Cork; the Hogthead of and from Rotterdam, bound for Bourdeaux; and the Joseph and Benjamin for London, homeward bound from Nevis.

*Bristol, Nov. 11.* This day came into our Port the New England Merchant, John Rogers Commander, from Nevis, having been 8 weeks in her Passage. The William and Mary, Isaac Shepperd Master, the Greyhound-Galley, and the Monferat-Merchant from Monferat: They came out of the Leeward Islands with a Fleet of Merchant-men, under Convoy of two of Her Majesty's Ships; and on the 9th instant they fell in with Sir John Jennings's Squadron, who had the homeward bound East-India Men under his Convoy.

*Dartmouth, Nov. 11.* A small Privateer belonging to Guernsey of 4 Patercocks and 20 Men, commanded by Captain Knapp, came in here this morning from cruising. This day came in a French Prize called the Welcome, being a Privateer of St. Malo, taken some time since by Sir John Jennings, and carried into Kinsale; from whence she came in company of the East-India Ships that put in there some time ago; but was separated from them the 9th instant by bad Weather. Sir John Jennings, with three of Her Majesty's Ships, and a large Flyboat supposed to be a Prize, came this day into Torbay from the Westward.

*Tarmonth, Nov. 12.* On the 10th instant Her Majesty's Ships the Dolphin and Gosport failed out of our Road to the Northward, with several light Colliers under their Convoy. This day came in here the Ridge-Galley of London commanded by Captain Parison, and the Jubilee of this Place by Captain Maymore, both from the River of Thames.

*Cowes, Nov. 10.* Yesterday passed through our Road the James and Mary, commanded by Captain Penn, which came from Gibraltar about 8 weeks ago, and is bound for London.

*Deale, Nov. 13.* Her Majesty's Ship the Moderate came into the Downes the 11th instant, with 10 Sail of Ships laden with Tin, and several Coasters, under her Convoy. Yesterday morning came in Her Majesty's Ships the King-fisher, Dartmouth, and Burlington, and under their convoy 10 Sail of homeward-bound Merchant-men from the East-Indies, but last from Ireland. There came in at the same time about 30 Sail of homeward-bound Merchant-men from the West-Indies, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the Lynn; and these two Fleets are since failed up the River.

*Portsmouth, Nov. 13.* Two Dutch Men of War came last Thursday to Spithead; with about 30 Sail of Ships under their Convoy from Holland. Last Sunday three of Her Majesty's Ships came to Spithead; and the East and West India Fleets failed by this Place for the Downes. Yesterday in the afternoon came into our Harbour two Merchant-men, laden with Sugar from Barbadoes, one belonging to Poole, the other to Bristol.

*St. James's, Nov. 14.* Signior Cornaro, Ambassador from the State of Venice, being lately arrived, had this day a private Audience of Her Majesty; and afterwards of his Royal Highness; being conducted to both these Audiences by Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

*The Dutch Mail of Friday last is not yet come in.*
