**A**N Express is lately arrived here from Ferrara, being dispatch'd by the Cardinal Legate of that Place, with an Account, That the Imperial and French Armies in Lombardy were in Motion; and he has since been sent back with Directions to that Cardinal how he shall behave himself in case the Troops of either Party should offer to come into the Ecclesiastical Territories. Cardinal Paolucci, the Pope's Chief Minister of State, has lately had several Meetings with the Venetian Ambassador upon that Subject. General Paolucci, who has the Chief Command of the Pope's Troops in the Ferrarese, is fallen dangerously ill. The Pope's Ministers are frequently in Conference together, to consult upon the Means of composing the Differences between him and the Duke of Savoy, concerning the Right of Presentation to divers Abbies and other Benefices in Piedmont; and an Envoy is shortly expected from his Royal Highness to put a final end to this Dispute. The Contention between this Court and the Duke of Lorraine upon the like Occasion, which had been of a long Continuance, is now entirely at an end, the Pope having in a great measure complied with his Highness's Demands. The Envoy whom that Prince sent hither to transact this Matter had Audience of the Pope yesterday, and is said to be on his Departure home. We are in good hopes also of seeing Matters brought to an Accommodation in a short time with the Court of Vienna, there having of late mutual Expressions of Civility been exchanged on both sides; and the Pope having consented that the Clergy in his Imperial Majesty's Dominions shall give him certain Free-Gifts, which are usually granted to the Emperor's of Germany upon their Accession to the Imperial Throne.

*Venice, Oct. 31.* Signior Emo being appointed to command the Forces of this State in the Morea, went lately thither on Board one of our Men of War. Our Senate has made choice of General Steinau to have the Chief Command of their Land Forces, in the room General du Hamel, who died not long since in the Morea; and he will shortly be going from hence to Brescia, to command their Troops on that side. Letters from Constantinople bring Advice, That Count Emeric

Teckeli died the 13th of the last Month near Nicomedia, in the Lesser Asia, having made a Will, by which he leaves all his Estate in Hungary to the Second Son of Prince Ragotzki. Our Advices from Lombardy give an Account, That the Imperial Forces continued posted at Fontanella, Calzo, and other Places along the Oglio; That a Detachment of them has lately taken Post at Vrago; and that there being little use of Horse in that Country, which is full of Rivers and Canals, the Prussian Cavalry which served last Summer under Prince Eugene, will be sent home; and their room will be supplied by a greater Number of Foot of the King of Prussia's Forces. The Imperialists continue to be supplied from time to time with Recruits and other Reinforcements from Germany. The French Army commanded by the Duke of Vendosme is still encamped between Ticengo and Soncino.

*Basle in Switzerland, Nov. 3.* Letters from Italy of the 28th past say, That General Staremberg, with a Detachment of the Imperial Forces under his Command, had possessed himself of the Castle of Alse in the Territory of Asti, and had put the whole Country of Alexandria under Contribution: That Prince Eugene of Savoy had drawn his Troops near to Palazzuolo, to cover that Place, which the French seem to have a Design to attack; and that his Highness expected, besides other Reinforcements, 6000 Prussian Foot in the room of the Horse of that Nation, which was recalled. The Duke of Vendosme had lately been reinforced with a Detachment of 6000 Men from the French Army in Piedmont.

*From the Imperial Camp between Haguenau and Bischoweiler, Nov. 9.* Our Army is still encamped in this Place. The necessary Dispositions are made for the Siege of Hombourg, which is to be carried on by a Detachment of the Imperial Troops, and by those of the Elector Palatine, that are already marched thither for that purpose; and divers Wagons laden with Ammunition for this Siege lie at Neustad in a readiness to be sent thither. The French seem to make Preparations for some Enterprize; but this is generally looked upon only as an Artifice to divert us from the intended Siege above-mentioned: However we shall keep in the Field till their Forces are separated in order to march into Winter Quarters.

*Cölogne, Nov. 13.* Our Magistrates, upon Notice of the Prince of Saxe Zeits's Arrival at Bon, who is appointed to receive the Homage of this City in the Name of the Emperor, sent two Deputies to his Highness to regulate Matters relating to that Ceremony; which having accordingly done, they are since returned hither; and the 23d is the day appointed for that purpose. The Prince of Hesse Cassel came hither the 7th instant from the Confederate Army in the Netherlands, and continued his Journey the same day towards Cassel. The Elector Palatine returns to-morrow from Bensberg to Düsseldorf. His Highness intends

tends to raise two new Regiments of Foot. Three Companies of Prussian Foot are lately come to Nuys, over against this City, where they are to remain in Garrison during the Winter. The Forces of Lunenburg and Hesse-Cassel having Quarters assigned them in the Hontfrug, are now marching through this Electorate, in their way thither. They write from Triers, That the French Lieut. Gen. du Rozel is appointed to Command in that Place this Winter; Lieut. General Druy in Lorraine, and along the Saar; Lieut. Gen. Chelader, with the Marquis de Broglie, in the Lower Alsace; and Monsieur de Lanion, another of their Lieut. Generals, in the Upper Alsace.

*Falmouth, Nov. 12.* Yesterday came into this Port the Samuel of London, George Wheatly Master, laden with Sugar, Cotton, and other Goods, from Barbadoes, whence she came the 16th of September last, in the Company of a Fleet of about 26 Sail of homeward-bound Merchant-men, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the Portland and Winchelsea, but was separated from them the 4th instant by bad weather. At the same time came in here the Dragon of Cork, from Hambourg, but last from Mounts-Bay, laden with Tar and Pipe-Staves.

*Plimouth, Nov. 13.* Her Majesty's Ship the Worcester sailed hence this day to the Eastward, having under Convoy about 25 Sail of homeward-bound Merchant-men and Coasters, most of them bound for London.

*Bristol, Nov. 13.* The Hanah Brigantine of Cork, Josiah Ruddock Master, arrived here this day from Jamaica, having been nine weeks in her Passage: She brings an Account, That about the 19th of August last, Rear-Admiral Whetstone, with the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships under his Command, being in sight of Jamaica, met with a violent Storm; but got to that Island, without any other Loss than some Damage the Men of War suffered in their Masts and Rigging, particularly the Admiral's own Ship and the Bristol.

*Tarmouth, Novemb. 16.* The Eagle Galley, commanded by Captain Beale, and the Mercury of Rotterdam, failed out of our Road to the Southward the 14th instant; as did likewise yesterday the Peterborough Galley, and this day the Louisa Galley, being all four laden with Red-Herrings.

*Westminster, Nov. 15.* This day his Grace the Duke of Mountagu was introduced into the House of Peers, between the Lord Duke of Ormond and the Lord Duke of Bolton, and Seated in the usual manner: The Rt. Hon. the Earl of Manchester officiated in this Ceremony as Lord Great Chamberlain, in the Absence of the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Lindsey.
