ER Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers; and being in Her Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solennity, Mr. Aston, Deputy Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Messeg from Her Majesty to the House of Commons, requiring their Attendance in the House of Peers. My Lords and Gentlemen,

Having newly Receiv'd Letters from the King of Spain, and the Earl of Peterborough, which contain a very particular Account of Our Gues and Happy Successes in Catalonia; And showing at the same time the Reasonableness of their being immediately Supported: I look upon their veing immediately Supported: I won upon this to be a Matter of so much Consequence in it self, and so Agreeable to you, that I have Ordered a Copy of the King of Spain's Letter to My Self; a Letter from the Junta of the Military Arme, of Catalonia; and another Letter from the City of Vich; as also an Extract of the Earl of Peterborough's Letter to Me, to be Communicated to both Houses of Parliament.
I Recommend the Consideration of them to you,

Gentlemen of the House of Commons, very particularly, as the Speediest Way to Restore the Monarchy of Spain to the House of Austria; And therefore I Affure My Self you will Enable Me to Prosecute the Advantages We have Gained in the most Effectual Manner, and so Improve the which God Almighty is pleased to Opportunity, which God Almighty is pungent Afford Us, of putting a Profeerous End to the

prefent War.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I must not Lole this Occasion of Desiring you to give as much Dispatch to the Matters before you, as the Nature of them will Allow, that so Our Preparations for next Year may be Early, which cannot fail of being of great Advantage to Us.

From the French Camp before Nice, Nev. 11 N S. The Duke of Berwick arrived here the 31ft past; but we were hindred during several days from proceeding in this Siege, by the overflowing of the River Var, whole Waters had in a manner surrounded our Camp;

and by the want of Artillery, Ammunition, and other Neccessies, the Ships that were to bring them from Toulon being kept back by contrary Winds. At length the Rains, which occasioned this Inundation, being ceased, the Ships arrived at Villafranca, and our Cannon and Stores landed, we have begun to raise a Battery of 6 Guns against the Town, and another against the Castle.
