My Lords and Gentlemen,

I Recommend the Consideration of them to you, Gentlemen of the House of Commons, very particularly, as the Speediest Way to Restore the Monarchy of Spain to the House of Austria; And therefore I Affure My Self you will Enable Me to Prosecute the Advantages We have Gained in the most Effectual Manner, and so Improve the which God Almighty is pleased to Opportunity, which God Almighty is pungent Afford Us, of putting a Profeerous End to the

prefent War.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I must not Lole this Occasion of Desiring you to give as much Dispatch to the Matters before you, as the Nature of them will Allow, that so Our Preparations for next Year may be Early, which cannot fail of being of great Advantage to Us.
