The Duke d' Osona having missed of his hopes, in being Preferred by the Q teen Regent to be a M:mber of the Council of State, was to far concerned at his Exclusion, that he immediately dispatched away a Courrier to the Queen, to defire the would permit him not onely to retire himfelf from his Charge, as Vice-Roy of Gatalonia, but from all other Publick Employment, that so he might throw off all other Cares, and live quietly upon his private Estate, fince he finds himself disabled from doing the Publick any further Service: The Queen was pleafed immediately to take him at his word, and, by the same Conrrier gave him the permission which he demanded; but Ordering him rocontinue at Barcellona till the arrival of his Successor in that Government. In his Room the Queen has been pleased to nominate the Duke De seffa, to whom a Courrier is like wife dispatched, with Order to hasten what he can to take possession of this new Govern-

The People of this Place are infinitely pleased to see their young King firmly establish in his health, who, as he encreases in age and strength, showes daily more and more inclinations to Military Exercises, and pleases himself daily with the Divertisement of seeing His Companies Exercised, especially those of His new Regiment of Guards, whose Souldiers are kept in excellent Order, Equipage and Disciplines in 6 much, as no Complaints are exhibited against them as formerly, which is principally attributed to the Conduct and Severity of the Marquis D' Aytona, their Collonels, who received strict command from the Queen for that purpose.

The Marquis de Villars Envoy Extraordinary from His Most Christian Majesty, departed on his way homewards the first instant, well satisfied with his Entertainment in this Cours, having been Presented from their Majesties with a Jewel of Diamonds to a considerable value, but, as yet no person is made choise of, or nominated to be sent into France, as a Publick Minister from this Crown, though its believed that Province may be conserved on the Marquis de Liebe, who is diverted from his intended Voyage to Liebonne.

Venice, Nov. i. A Feluca lately arriving here from the Levante, brings us Levers, which though of no very late date, give us a more particular Account then what we formerly had, both of the Treaty and Surrender of the City of Gandia; affuring us, That the Generaliffino finding the place reduced to a heap of Rubbish, and by the Turks for former entred, and the Garrison so considerably lessened, there remaining only 3600 Men sit for Service, that it was judged impossible to preserve it from the Enemy & A Counsel having been called, it was resolved that endeavours should be used to come to a Treaty with the Visier for a Surrender, and accordingly Collonel Arnardi; and Segnior Scordeli the Vice-Chancellor were made choice of to Manage the Treaty; and on the First of September sent out to the

Post, on the side of Giosies, with a White Flogg, whose business being com nunicated to the Grand Visies, the Newes was immediately castied through the Turkish Army, and entertained with extraordinary joy, and Commissioners were inmediately appointed to Treat with them on the Turks side, between whom all that day was spent, but nothing farther Concluded, then that the next Conserence should be held in the opan Field, before the Fort Demetrica, where the Turks set up a large Tent for that purpose. The Treaty was there continued till the Fisch of September, and then concluded upon the Articles formerly Publishs; For performance whereof Hostages were given on both sides, particularly, Segnior Calbo Commissay for Provisions, De Riva Lieutenant to the Generalls Guards, and Zacaria Mocenizo from the Venetians; and from the Turks the Bezlerbey of Temissar, Mehemet Basa, the Aga of the Fanisaries, and Gassi Bey the Tesserator Romelia.

The Turks holfages were lent into the Town, and ours into the Turkish Camp where they were received with extraordinary civility, having a rich apartment prepared for them, a guard of Jantifaries appointed to attend them which r they pleised, and a Table of 30 dishes a meal allowed them, where they received visits fron the Visier and all the principal Officers of his Army. This done, the great Officers on both fides give and returned visits with much ceremony and kindness; ours viewing the Turks Lines and much wondring at their Order and Strength, and theirs as much admiring the ill condition of the Town, and the great courage of the defendants which alone preferred them: the following days were spent in removing of the Stores, Guns and Goods of the besieged to the Fleet which attended for their transportation, and on Friday the 20th of September, the Garrison marched our without the least disturbance, the Visier being resolved to win as much fame for his justice in performing Articles as for his industry and courage in the war; and the hexe Friday the 27th of the same moneth, the City being cleanled and prepared for him, he marched in with his Army ; the four principal Churches he has since converted into Mosques to lerve for the worthip of Mahomet, the other Churches turned into Stables for his own hories and those of his Army; the civility of the Visiter has been emi-nently shown to all the Venetian Officers of any notes but more remarkably to the Generalissimo Morofini, to whom he made considerable Presents, with this Compliment; that however affairs might be ordered, the peace should have as long a continuance as his Command: the Visier has been since pressed to transfer the war either into Affrick against the Emperour of Morecce who refuses the payment of the Tribute, which was never refuled by his predecessors, or into Arabia upon the like account; but the Visier seems rather resolved to make war upon Maltha or Italy, for which he supposes he shall be able to set out a powerful Fleer, and for this purpose intends to continue with his Army all this winter in Candia.

Himbourg, Nev. 8. From Stockholm we are advisedy that the Milicia of the kingdom has been lately reviewed and paid, part of them returned again to their Quarters but a confiderable number of them, ordered to march towards the Province of Schönen and others towards Livenia, where this believed they have in readingly neer eight thought and men, it being thought needlid to have a confiderable frength in those parts til some assurance can be had of the event of the Negoriation now on foot between that Crown and the Great Date of Muscary, nothing being left undone

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
