by the Swedes which may honourably conduce to an accommodation, of which they begin to conceive greater hopes then formerly, fince from the Governour of Nerva in Livonia they are informed, that the Heer Heinfina who was fent from the States of the United Provinces to interpose and mediate with the Grand Duke for the composing of the said differences, being on his way thinher, the Great Duke upon notice of his approach to the frontiers, had given order to the Governour of Nevigred to affish him in his voyage; and that the Great Duke was refolved to send Treat him with all possible Civility and to affish him in his voyage; and that the Great Duke was refolved to send his Ministers is to England, Swedeland, and Holland for the more full satisfaction of all parties interested in this Negotiation.

His Majesty minding to preserve all His loving Subjects in their Lives and Estates from all Rapine and Violence, was this day pleased to order His Proclamation to be iffued out, Commanding all His Subjects and Officers of Justice to use their endeavours for the apprehension of the faid perfons and all others who have been or shal be guilty of the offences aforefaid, that they may be proceeded against according to Law and Justice, declaring His Will and Pleasure, That all Justices take Order, that due Watches and Wards be kept by Horse and Foot for the apprehension of such offenders; Commanding all Vintners, keepers of Common Ordinaries, Gaming-Houses, Innkeepers, Hous-keepers and other persons, where fuch persons shall be or resort, to apprehend or cause them to be apprehended &c. or otherwife themselves to be proceeded against as far as by due course of Law they may, declaring, That who soezer shall before the 20th of fune next, apprehend or cause to be apprehended any of the and persons above-named, and brought into custody, and prosecute them to a Conviction, shall have a reward of Twenty pounds for every fuch offender; and for every other notorious Robber, Burglar or Murderen, the fum of Ten pounds: within 15 days after their conviction, to be paid by the respective Sheriff of the County where fuch conviction shall be had, upon the Certificate of the Judge or under the hands of two or more Julices of the peace before whom they were convicted; this to be paid out of the publick Moneys received by fuch Sheriff in the faid, County, which shall be allowed him upon hisaccount in the Exchequer, for which His Majestys faid Proclamation is to be a sufficient Warrant: His Majesty farther Commanding all persons who keep Horses at Livery, or Lett Horses ont to Hire in any part of the Cities of London and Westminster, Borough of Seuthwark, or Counties of Middlesex or Surry, to give a just account to the two next Julices of peace of all fuch horses as they keep at Livery or Lett out to Hire, and who are the owners of them, with the place of their usual abode, for which purpose the Justices of the peace of the said Cities and Counties, or some of them, are to meet together and fend for Oftlers and others concerned to give an account accordingly. His Majesty farther declaring, That if any person shall, furnish another with horses who shall commit any of the offences aforfaid, he shall for the same be proceeded against and punished according to the utmost feverities of Law, as by the Proclamation at large will more fully appear.
