Colonel Freizen, of Guido's Regiment, who commanded in Verue; the Major of the laid Regiment, and a Nephew of Count Staremberg's, are amongst the wounded. We lost one Standard, and took two from the Enemy. The Duke de la Feuillade will now see that Asti is not to be taken by Storm; and not having in the whole above 6000 Men with him; both Horse aid Foor, it cannot be thought that he will be able to carry on the Siege with so small a Force. We have had such violent stormy and rainy Weather for these three weeks past, that all our koads are unpassable; and our Rivers and Torrents have overssowed an such manner, that they have done considerable Damage all over the Country.
