Swanty, Mov. 13.

E have daily frefir reports of the ill effects of the late florms, feveral veffels being caft away upon the coafts of Ireland. A veffel of London bound for Tangier, and an-

other laden with Pilchards for *legora* were lately forced to put into *Milford* having near *Minhead* and *Comb* ran much danger; having loft both (heit Sails and Mafts; alfo the *fuffice* of *Horne*, a great veffel laden with French wines homewards bound, with two French thips laden with Salt, Wine, and Brandy intended for *Dublin*, were with much difficulty preferved, and with much damage confiratined to put into *Tinby*.

Bay of Argiers, Oftob. 4. The Baffa of Argiers is labouring to incline the Duan to give latisfaction to the Baglifh Admiral, and to remove the war from their Gates : in the mean time fome hostilities have passed and feveral rencounters between boats, particularly on the 2d inflant zo toats of Argiers had engaged 2 of the English, between whom was mannaged a brisk dispute, wherein about 4 or 5 of the English were burt but none mortally, till Sir Tbo Allen to render the Fight more equal, fent the reft of the boats to take their thate of the Combat, and in the mean time ordered two of his Fregats to fland in between the Enemies boats and the 1 own, againft whom were fired from the Town neer 300 shot, but without any damage up the fishes or loss of men, but the Fregats fhor with set to take place amongst them, and three of the boats faid to have funk.

Venice, Nov. 9 A vetlel lately arrived from Smirnz informs us, that one of the fhips which came from Candialaden with 30 pieces of Canon and fome Goods, with about two hundred perfons abrard her, was by the violence of a florm forced on ground neer Cerigo, the learnen with fome few only of the other perfons efcaping the wreck. And that a Salch on which were embarked the Jews of Candia with the most part of their Goods and Wealth to a very confiderable value was feifed neer the Cape Sapien-Zu by fome Corfairs of Barbary.

The fame veffel farther informs us, that our Captain General Morofini had left the Charge of the Army with the conduct of the Fleet which transports them to the care of Monfieur de St. Andre Monsbrun who had made fome flay at Standia, himself being with fevetal of the principal Natives, with a foundron of the Fleet, a confiderable quantity of Provifions and number of Marn gone for Suda, intending to reinforce that and the other Garrifons ftill remaining to this Republick, and to furnish them with all things necessary for their defence.

The Vilier leems refolved to continue all this winter at Candia, norwith flanding his many invitations to the Court, and the good reception and entertainment he may promife ro-himfelf from the fuccess of hislong Siege, but he has hitherto axculed himfelf by reprefenting to the Grand Segnior the necessity of his continuance in that Illand to fetfle his new Comque &, and to take care for its fortification, Brc. but tissid is unwilling to mix with the tronbles of the Court all he have first feen what iffue the affairs of the Sultanels may have, who has hitherto by the affiitance of the Janifaries preferved the life of the Grand Segniors Brethirn; the is lately gone to a place within five days journey of Lariffa where the waits for the Grand Segniois Orders. . The Senate hathrefolved to keep a confiderable Fleet at Sea to fecure the Commerce which is too frequently interfupted by the Confairs, and have otdered 24 men of war, 20 Galli.s and 4 Galleafles to be fitted up and 1 ut to fea for this emploiment.

Here is lately artived firm France the Duke of Nevers, who intends to pils this winter here in the converfation of the Princes of Haffia and Borghele, which latter makes his appearance with an konourable Train of attendaous and rich Liveries, visiting the most coust letable curich is of thisplace, and leaving behind him great marks of his bounty.

The good flip called the St Michael the Archangel was lately caft away near Zara with all her lating, the Mariners eleaping in their boat, but the Captain mortally hurt by the wreck.

From Conflantinople we are informed that the Grand Segnior is npon his way thither, followed by the Suitaneis his Mither, having at Lariffa rasify'd the peace lately made with this Republick, and from Canlia, that the Vifier immediately after he had taken pofferfion of that City, had given Order and caufed many men to be emploise at in digging Stone and burning Lime for the ipeedy repair of the ruines of that place.

The Jews of this place are much affl field for the lofs of their Brethren and Goods taken by the Barbary Corfains, and defpair of reparation, being fince informed that the fhip was foundred in the fea and perifhed with all its lacing.

Here is much difcourfe of fome overtures for a defenfive League amongs the Princes and others who have any concernments upon the Po, and of a mutual Contribution for the tailing of an Army to fecure the peace of that part of Italy against all fuch as shall endeavour to diffue bir.

Hague, Nov. 25. The Heer Grotius is fuddenly to i e fent into France with the Character of Ambaliador, part of whole negotiation may be to endeavor the taking of the late high Cuftomes imposed upon foreign Commodities and Manufactures, which will other wife oblige the States to come to a fudden refolui n upon the point folong confidered, in fixing as high a Cuftom upon French wines and the other Commodities of the growth or manufactury of France.

The Spanish Ambassador having formerly put in a Memorial to the States, desiring them to give Order for the freeing of the Spanish ships, which has been detained by the Zealanders, the States have been pleased to write to those of Holland to do what in justice and reason can be done in compliance to the said Ambassadors desires-

The affairs between us and D. nmark, are also under confideration, both in relation to the arcers of Subfidies due from feveral of the Provinces; as for the other differences of which the arbitration was committed to His most Christian Majesty, in which, Secretary Romph is ordered to move His said Maiesty.

Prince Maurice and Marefhal Wurtz have had f.me conference with Deputies from the Council of State about the former propolal of railing fome new force, leveral Officers have upon the probability thereof repaired hither, officing their fervice to the States, in which this believed they will come to a fpe dy refolution 3 is the mean time Holland is filling up all the vacant empoiments w the in that Province, wig the Commands and Offices of Collonels, Captaios, or other more inferior Charges.

It having been complained of in the Allembly of Gaels deriand

derland and Overyfiel, that those Provinces suffer much by she insolency and want of discipline, amongst the new railed soldiers of their neighbors, they intend as one proper remedy for this Evil, to renew the Proclamation against the violencies of such people, and to put them into strict execution upon all offenders.

. As yet the Moneys which were returned to Amilerdani in order to the payment of the Swedes Sublidies, are not paid, which is lone what to the diffatisfaction of the Sieur Mireshal, who is thinking to return home and leave behind him the Sieur Appleboom to purfue this affair.

The Council of State have upon conference with the Offacers of the Army found that the number of the forces now in the States fervice do not exceed 2 5 thousand men, which they have reprefented to the States, and tis believed speedy Orders will be itlued out for the new Leavies.

• From the Texel we are advised, that all the fhips which were expected from Muscowy are returned either to the Hly or Ameland, and that the Convoy from the Streights had been seen upon the Coasts.

Bruffels, Nov. 22. On Wednesday last arrived here by the way of France, Don Juan de Teledo from Spain; expecting here farther dispatches and instructions to fit him for his Refidency in England whither he is intended.

An + xpreis from Osend informs us, that the Fleet from New Spain is faiely arrived at Cadis, having on their way made fone little ftsy at the Canaries, and that the Cargo of these fhips is very confiderable, both on the Kings account, and the account of the interested Merchant.

Paris, Nov. 23. On Wednesday the 20th instant was performed the f lemn Funeral fervice for the Queen Mother of England in the Abby-Church at St. D. unis, after the Form and Magnificence as was formerly used at the Funeral of the Queen Mother of France; the Gates : s well as the Body of the Church were hung with black, with two breadths of black Velvet, and the Quire with three, with great numbers of Eleutcheons of Her deceased Majesties Arms; in the midif of the Quire was creded a itately Hearle supported by eight Marble Collumes adorned with extraordinary Art, that and the whole Quire filled wi h Tapers; upon this Hearle was placed the Queens Body, covered with a Poelle of Cloth of Gold with a large Crofs of Cloth of Silver bordered round with Ermines, with large Embroidered Scutcheons ; the body being thus expoled, the Parliament, Chamber of Accounts, the Courts of Aids and Moneys, the body of the Univerfity of the Chaftelet, and the City were placed in their Or. der, as were also the Ambaffadors of Venice and Savoy : these being feated, the Masters of the Ceremonies with the King at Arms and four Heralds attended in Madam with the Princeffes in deep mourning, who took their places, as did alfo Monfieur and the Princes of the Blood ; then the Coadjutor to the Archbishop of Rheims began the Miss. which was lung with excellent Musick, where affifted four Bifhops and the Religious of the Abby ; the Devotion ended, the body was by the decealed Queens Guards conveyed to the place of burial, the Poelle carried up by four Gentlemen of Her decealed Majefties Chamber.

King Cafimir was pleafed to be prefene at this folemnity but *incognito*, who on the 17th inflant was received by His most Christian Majesty at St. Germains, both Kings entring at the fame time, but at leveral doors into the Kings Closet, where they continued standing during the enterview, and asterwards retired by the way they entred, with mutual satisfiction.

The 1 sth inftant the Popes Nuncio had an Audience from His Majefly about the compolure of the differences between the two Crowns of France and Spain in relation to the dependencies on His Majeflies late Conquefls in the *Netherlands*, His Majefly (cenning willing to hearken to any fair propolals which thould be made by any Commiffioners the Queen Regent flould think fit to employ to Paris upon that account, and if they flould meet with difficulties in that affair, would be content to hear fome propolals for an exchange. The Turkth Envoye has had another Audience from Monsieur de Lyonne, but not yet been able to prevail for an Audience from the King for the delivery of his Letter, but is believed fome opportunity may be given him at a fecond review which His Majesty intends suddenly to take of his forces neer St. Germains.

A Commission is now passing for the suppression of the Charge of Admiral of France, His Majesty resolving, that for the futtre all dispatches concerning the Navy shall pass in his own name.

We begin now to fancy that the Elector of Mayence will not close for fall with the interest of France as was expected, but that he rather is inclined to act in Confort with the rest of the Princes of the Empire, especially fince our Resident at Rasisbonne informs us, that he haszealoully incouraged the speedy raising of the 30 thousand men defigned for the fecurity of the Empire, which tis believed will be fet on 100 and the Levies perfected before the next Spring.

From Swifferland we are advited that the Cantons have received Moncys from the Prince d'Aremberg for the railing of 6000 men for the fervice of Franche Comtes and that they have affured the States of the United Provinces of the like number. The Dukes of Brunswick are also faid to have engaged to furnish the faid States with to thousand men in cale of exigency, and will raife 18, thouland more in their room. The Prince Blector Palatine has also thewed his inclinations towards the States, having given incouragement to General Chauves to engage in their fervice.

Parks, November 27. The Bilhop of Valence havingbeen by His Majefties Command formerly confined to his Bilhoprick, and fince by His Majefties indulgence upon his Petition obteining leave to divert himkelf for his health in one of his Abbys, theught fit to adventure upon a private visit to this place, and in the habit and difgaile of a Souldier tooka Lodging in a Gold-wire drawets houle, where, as a perfon fufpected for a Coyner or Highwayman he was feized by the Sieur de Grain Provoft of the Confisblery, and committed prifoner to Fort *l' Evelopus*, but upon further difcovery of bis true perfon was delivered from thence, and by His Msjefty ordered to be feat to the Isle Jourdain in Guienne, and in the mean time not to be permitted to entertain any private Converse.

The Companies of Foot in His Majefties army which confifted of 80. men a piece, are to be reduced to 50. the 20. which are taken out to be encreased to 50. out of the new leavies and to, be formed into new Companies.
