Vienna, January 9. N. S.

THE 6th Instant the Sieur Osten, a Colonel in the Danish Forces, arrived here from Transilvania: He had the Misfortune to be taken Prisoner on the 7th of the last Month by a Party of Hungarians, and had Leave given him to come hither on his Parole for 6 Weeks, in order to solicit his being exchanged for Monsieur Verville, a French Colonel. Colonel Osten left Prince Ragotzi the 16th at Eczed; from whence he intended to go towards Monkate, to see the new Fortifications that are making there; and he was afterwards expected at Tolzal, a Castle belonging to his Aunt, the Countess Erdodi, not above a day's Journey from Tirnau. Count Berzeni went from Tirnau the 2d past, as is supposed, to the Siege of Oedenbourg, in which Place there is a small Garison of 300 Men, but commanded by Baron Wintzenheim, a brave and experienced Officer, who, as is reported, has repulsed the Enemy in three several Attempts they made to scale the Walls in the night; whereupon they are said to have withdrawn their Forces from before that Place. An Officer arrived here last night from Prince Eugene, with Letters dated the 2d Instant from his Head Quarter at Carzago, giving an Account, That the French Army marched away from the Neighbourhood of Lonato the 26th past; and the Imperial Army did the like 3 days after; so that the Campaign is now quite ended on that side, and both Armies are separated, and marched into Winter Quarters.

Berlin, January 16. Monsieur Mardvelt arrived here the 3d Instant, with Letters from the Court of Hesse-Cassel, to notify the Death of the Princess Royal, Daughter to the King of Prussia; and on the 5th Monsieur Terrau, one of his Majesty's Chamberlains, was dispatched to that Court with a Compliment of Condolance from his Majesty to the Prince of Hesse-Cassel upon that melancholly Occasion. Monsieur Ilten, one of the Elector of Hanover's Privy-Councillors, arrived here the 9th, and had Audience the 11th of his Majesty, to whom he made a Compliment of Condolance, in the

Name of the Elector his Master, upon the Death of the Princess Royal. The Prussian Forces and Recruits, which according to the late Treaty for that purpose, are sent to Prince Eugene's Assistance; are marching towards Italy with all possible expedition, and will join his Highness very early the next Campaign. They write from Warsaw, That the Swedes had passed the Weiffell, carrying with them Materials, for making Bridges to pass the Bugg likewise, in order to attack the Muscovites; and that the King of Poland having Intelligence of their Motions, had ordered General Menzikof, with a great part of the Muscovite Forces, towards Pultask, where there was already 10000 Foot and 6000 Horse; and had posted the rest of his Troops in the Passes and Woods, his Majesty appearing resolved to wait for the Swedes; so that we may probably hear of some Action on that side.

Frankfort, Jan. 16. We hear the Imperialists have retaken Cham in the Upper Palatinate; and there being now a considerable Body of regular Troops in Bavaria, it is not doubted but the Insurrection there will soon be suppressed. General Kirchbaum lately attacked a Body of 5000 Malecontents near Braunau, whom he entirely routed, many of them being killed upon the spot, and divers taken Prisoners: And this continuation of ill Success will we hope not a little contribute to their being persuaded to lay down their Arms. The 14th Instant the Princess of Baden was safely delivered of a Prince at Rastadt.

Hague, January 22. N. S. The States of Holland and Westfriesland continue assembled, having under Consideration what Supplies will be necessary for this Year's Service, and how they shall be raised. The Convoy for Lisbon is fitting out with all possible diligence. The King of Spain has appointed the Count de Goessen to have the Administration of his Revenue in the Netherlands, particularly in the Duchy of Limbourg, in the room of Count Zinzendorf. Monsieur Van Stucken, who was appointed to be Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark to Her Majesty of Great Britain, having received Orders from Copenhagen to return thither, will accordingly leave this Place in few days. Monsieur Rosencrantz went from hence 3 days ago, in order to return likewise to Copenhagen. Letters from Madrid of the first Instant confirm the Account we had before by the way of France, of a Tumult at Saragossa, occasioned by the Marshal de Tesse's having, without any Regard to the Privileges of that City, caused several of the Burghers to be imprisoned, upon Suspicion of their being affected to the House of Austria. The Burghers took up Arms to rescue the Prisoners; and in this Dispute there were

were about 100 of the French killed. The Mar-
thal de Tesse had demanded Satisfaction of the Ma-
gistrates, and remained encamped with his Troops
near Saragossa, to awe that City into a Compliance.
These Letters add, That the Confederate Troops
had repossessed themselves of Fraga and Moncon;
which Places had formerly been taken from them by
the Duke of Anjou's Forces. That Prince had de-
clared, that he would certainly part from Madrid
towards the Frontiers on the 20th Instant; where-
upon four Gentlemen of his Bed Chamber, viz. the
Duke de Vexa, the Marquis de Quintara, the Conde
de Pigneranda, and the Conde de Colmanar, had
desired, to be excused from attending him in this
Expedition. Our Advices from Bavaria say, That
since the late Defeat near Munich of the Inhabi-
tants of that Country who are in Arms against the
Emperor, another very considerable Body of them
had likewise been totally routed. Letters from the
North mention an Insurrection in Muscovy, occa-
sioned by the Discontent of the Inhabitants, upon
the Czar's attempting to introduce new Customs
among them; and that a considerable number had
already taken up Arms against him. They write
from Paris, That the Castle of Nice surrendered the
4th Instant upon Articles. Some Letters add, That
6 French Men of War, which had been fitted out at
Brest, and were designed for the Streights, had been
cast away in that Harbour during the late stormy
Weather.

Falmouth, January 12. The 8th Instant a Dutch
Privateer, called the Queen Anne, brought into this
Port as Prize a French Privateer, called the Jealousy
of Calais, of 12 Guns and 106 Men. The 10th
was sent in here as Prize, by a Privateer belonging
to Guernsey, the Pearl of Morlais, of 12 Guns, la-
den with Wine, Arms, Iron, and other Goods, for
the West-Indies.

*Her Majesty's Ships the Burlington, Dartmouth, and Oxford,
being ordered to proceed forthwith to Sea; it is the Commands of
his Royal Highness, That such of the Men belonging to the afore-
said Ships as are now in Town, or otherwise absent from them,
do immediately repair to their Ships in the River of Medway,
they being ordered to be paid to the first of July last before they
sail from the Buoy of the Nora.*

*If any Able-bodied Men are willing to serve Her Majesty in
the Train of Artillery Abroad, let them repair to Captain Silver,
Master-Gunner of England, at his House in St. James's Park,
they shall enter into present Pay of Seven Shillings a Week, and
be further encouraged and advanced as they shall deserve.*
