Count Noailles is on his departure for England, in order to pass from thence into Catalonia, to command the King of Spain's Forces.

Dartmouth, January 19. Yesterday were put in here by contrary Winds the Fame Galley, Captain Bower, and the Triton Galley, Captain Tipper, Commanders, both belonging to London, and homeward bound from Leghorne, whence they came about 5 weeks ago, laden with Wine, Oyl, Silk, and other Goods. They came out of the Streights about 12 days ago, and met Sir John Leake, with the Squadron of English Men of War under his Command, at Gibraltar; failed in Company with them as far as the Southward Cape, and there parted from the said Squadron, which proceeded towards Lisbon.

Plymouth, Jan. 20. Yesterday came in two Dutch Ships, homeward bound with Salt from France; and the St. Francis of Bilbao, John Antonio Master, laden with Wool from thence for Topsham.

Cowes, January 21. A Privateer belonging to Flushing sent in hither yesterday as Prize a Letter of Mart Ship of 12 Guns, called the Marquis of Diepe, laden with Wine and Brandy from Bourdeaux.

Portsmouth, January 22. On the 19th Instant came to Spithead a Dutch Man of War, with about 22 Sail of Merchant-men under her Convoy from the Downes.
