**L**etters from Warlaw give an Account, That the Swedish Forces, and those of the Confederated Nobility of Poland that side with them, had passed the Weiffell over two Bridges, which had been made for that purpose below that City, and were marching in three Columns towards Grodno, in order to attack the King of Poland's Army, who, upon Advice thereof, was marched from thence to Pultowsk, intending to meet them near that Place; which he had appointed for the Rendezvous of all his Forces. The Heads of the Confederated Nobility who were lately assembled at Warlaw, before they separated, sent Circular Letters to the several Palatinates, to notify to them the Treaty they had lately concluded with the Swedes; and to require all those who continued stedfast in their Loyalty to the King of Poland, to come over to them in three Months, after which they should not be admitted; and wrote a Letter to the Pope, to inform him of their late Proceedings, and pray him that the Bishop of Posen, now a Prisoner in the Castle of St. Angelo, for having adhered to them, may be set at Liberty. The King of Poland on the other hand has, by the Advice of the Council which he lately held at Grodno, published a general Amnesty to all such of his Subjects in Arms against him, as shall return to their Allegiance within a certain time.

*Berlin, January 19. N. S.* Yesterday being the Anniversary of the King of Prussia's Coronation, was observed here with great Solemnity. His Majesty received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers upon this Occasion; and the Mourning our Court is in for the Death of the late Queen was laid aside for two days, which were spent in Feasting and other Rejoycings. Yesterday between 8 and 9 in the Morning, and again between 6 and 7 at Night, all our Cannon, and the small Arms of our Garison, were thrice discharged; and the Bells were rung in all our Churches, where Divine Service was also performed, the Prayers being suited to the Day. After the Morning Service, his Majesty held a Chaptet of the Order instituted by himself, wherein four Knights were ele-

cted; *viz.* Monsieur Printz, one of his Privy-Council; Baron Sonsfeld, Lieutenant-General of his Horse; the Marshal de Biberstein, King of Arms, and one of the Chamberlains to his Majesty; and Monsieur Kameck, Master of the Wardrobe, and one of the Chamberlains. They were thereupon invested with the Ribon and Cross belonging to that Order; and this Morning they were conducted in one of the King's Coaches by the Count de Wighenstein, Great Marshal of the Court, to the Apartment of Count Wartemberg, Charicellor of the Order, who having invested them with the Habit of the Order, two Heralds conducted them into the King's Presence, the Officers of the Order attending. After they had paid their Duty to his Majesty, they attended him in Procession to the Chapel Royal, where the new Knights were Installed. After which there was a splendid Entertainment in the great Hall of the Palace, there being four Tables, one for the King, over which was a Canopy; another for the Prince Royal, and the other Knights of the Order; and two more for the Ladies. Letters from Warlaw say, their last Advices from the King of Sweden's Army were of the 8th Instant, and that his Majesty was then encamped in the Plain of Stanislawow, about 6 Leagues from that City, and in the way to Grodno.

*Falmouth, Jan. 26.* On the 22d Instant came in here from cruising the Great Curtiene, a Privateer belonging to Flushing, and the Joanna of Amsterdam, Barnes Bushman Malter, homeward bound with Wine from Bourdeaux. The 24th a Dutch Hoy, called the White Lamb, sailed hence for Bourdeaux. Yesterday sailed hence Her Majesty's Ship the Nonfuch, with about 30 Sail of Merchantmen and Coasters under her Convoy, bound for London, and other Ports to the Eastward.

*Plimouth, Jan. 27.* Yesterday came in from Falmouth, a Merchant Ship from the Canaries, and two or three Coasters bound for this Port. This day came in Her Majesty's Ships the Feversham, Valleur and Margaret, and under their Convoy 13 Sail of Merchantmen, some from Portugal, and the rest from the West Indies, from Chester, and other Parts.

*Dartmouth, Jan. 27.* Yesterday Morning came into this Port three small Vessels belonging
