The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

UPON Reading this Day at the Board a Memorial from his Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, Lord High Admiral; Her Majesty, by the Advice of Her Privy-Council, is pleased to Order, as it is hereby Ordered, That the Time limited by Her Majesty's late Proclamation, bearing Date the Eighteenth of December last, for granting several Rewards and Allowances therein mentioned, as of Her Majesty's Free Gift and Royal Bounty, to such Seamen and able Bodied Landmen, as shall between the Twentieth Day of December last, and the Eleventh of this Instant February, Voluntarily Enter themselves into Her Majesty's Service at Sea, as is Directed in the said Proclamation, be Prolonged, as the same is hereby Prolonged, to the First Day of March next, for a further Inducement to the said Seamen and able Bodied Landmen to come into the said Service; Whereof all Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, Chief Magistrates of Cities and Towns, Vice-Admirals, Captains and Commanders of Her Majesty's Ships, and other Commission Officers, and all others whom it may concern, are to take Notice and Govern themselves accordingly: And to that End Her Majesty's further Pleasure is, That this Order be forthwith Printed and Published in the Gazette.

Gibraltar, January 23. N. S. The Squadron of English Men of War commanded by Sir John Leake came into our Bay the 9th Instant, and failed again the 16th for Lisbon. Vice-Admiral Waffenaer, with the Squadron of Dutch Men of War under his Command, came in here 3 days ago, and will proceed on his Voyage to Lisbon with the next fair Wind. We have an Account by several Vessels which came lately from Malaga, That Alicant, and the greatest part of the Kingdom of Valencia, had declared for the Catholick King Charles III. That Major-General Ramos, Governor of Denia, had got together a great Body of Horse and Foot for his Majesty's Service; and that a Person of great Note, with a considerable number of other Persons from Castile, had joined his Catholick Majesty. The Damage which the Enemy had done to our Fortifications during the late Siege is in a great measure repaired; and we are adding some new Works to them, which will make this Town in a manner Impregnable. A small Body of Spanish Troops are encamped near this Place, but do not commit any Hostility against us: On the contrary, we have had several Interviews with them, and they appear disposed to come over to his Catholick Majesty's Interest.

Lisbon, Jan. 30. N. S. Sir William Jumper failed hence the 22d Instant with several English Men of War, and divers Merchant-men under their Convoy. Sir John Leake arrived the 27th, having been 13 Weeks in his Passage from Barcelona, and has brought in with him several Prizes, one of them very richly laden. He met with the three Ships that went out with Provisions for him near this Place, and sent them forward to meet the Dutch Squadron under the Command of Baron Waffenaer, which he had left in the Streights, judging that by this time Provisions would begin to grow scarce with them. Our Forces have been in Motion these 8 or 9 days towards Alentejo; the Earl of Galway is on his Departure for the Frontiers; and the necessary Preparations are making with all possible Diligence and Application for their taking the Field, in order to give the Enemy a powerful Diversion on that side, which will be of very great use towards facilitating the King of Spain's Progresses in Catalonia. We have no late Advices from thence.

Vienna, January 26. Prince Eugene arrived here the 21st Instant from Italy. Count Rechteren came to this

Place the same day from Tyrnau, but will return thither in three or four days with a Declaration from this Court, which (we hope) may have a good Effect on the Malecontents at the opening of their Assembly at Miskotz; in order whereunto, their Deputies set out from Tyrnau the 18th Instant. The Troubles of Bavaria are now composed, upon General Kirchbaum's having made a great Slaughter of the Peasants in 2 Rencontres: The remaining part of them have pray'd the Archbishop of Saltzbourg to intercede in their behalf, whose Chancellor had Audience of the Emperor 3 days ago to that purpose. The Suppressing of this Insurrection will very probably be a great Inducement to the Malecontents of Hungary to contribute their part towards restoring likewise the Tranquility of their Native Country, and bringing Matters to a friendly Composition.

Berne, January 30. We received an Account last week, which has since been confirmed, That 80000 Louis d'Ors had been seized in Tirol, which the French were transmitting to Bavaria, to be laid out in encouraging and supporting the Insurrection there. Monsieur Melarade, the Duke of Savoy's Envoy to the Swiss Cantons, set out this morning for Turin, from whence he is expected back again about 4 Months hence.

Berlin, Jan. 30. By Letters which came in this day from Poland, we have an Account, That the Swedish Army continued its March towards Pultawsk and Tikozy; and that the King of Poland had sent Orders to his Troops to retire from those Places upon the Approach of the Swedes, and to join him at Grodno, where he was drawing together his whole Army, with intent, as was thought, to give Battle to the Swedes.

Bransfort, Febr. 3. The Peasants in Bavaria, who had taken up Arms against the Emperor, being entirely dispersed, the Duke of Wirtemberg, who was to have commanded the Forces to be employed against them, is returned to Strugard; but those Forces are to remain some short time in that Electorate in Quarters of Refreshment. Both our Troops and those of the Enemy upon the Rhine continue very quiet in their Quarters. Our Forces which are posted near Fort Louis do still keep that Place very closely blocked up.

Paris, Febr. 5. The Duke of Vendosme having obtained Leave to be absent from his Command for a Month, is shortly expected here from Italy. Our Letters from Spain give an Account, That the Duke of Anjou's Departure for Arragon was again put off: That since the Disorder which happened at Saragossa, the French had begun to fortify the Palace of the Inquisition there; and a Garrison would be left in that Place for the better keeping the Inhabitants in awe: That another Dispute had happened between the French and Spaniards at Carega, a small Town about 9 Leagues from Saragossa, where two French Battalions having been quartered, committed such Disorders, that the Inhabitants of that Place, and of the adjacent Country, took up Arms against them, and there was a sharp Action between them, wherein many of the French were killed: That the Conde de las Torres, who commands a Body of Spanish Forces in the Duke of Anjou's Service in Valencia, had attacked St. Matheo, and afterwards another Town that had declared for the King of Spain; but was repulsed in both Places: And some Advices add, That a considerable Reinforcement of English and Dutch Troops, and Miquelets, being sent from Catalonia towards Valencia, the Marshal de Tesse was thereupon marched that way to join the Conde de las Torres; but that he was under great Inconveniences for want of the necessary Magazines of Provisions and Ammunition.

Hague, Febr. 9. N. S. The French Troops on the Demer have made some Morions, as if they intended to attack Sout-Leeuwe; but they have not yet undertaken any thing. The Enemy have also been endeavouring

ing to give us some Jealousy towards Sluce; whereupon Baron Spaar was dispatched to Flanders; but our Troops on all sides are upon their Guard, and the Weather at present being set in for Snow, and very unfit for Action, we are not under any Apprehensions of that kind. The Letters from Madrid of the 15th past say, That the Conde de las Torres had attempted to besiege St. Matheo, in which Place was a Garrison of 1000 Miquelets, commanded by an English Officer; who made so vigorous a Defence, that the Conde was forced to retire; and that the Spaniards who are in Arms for his Catholick Majesty had had two sharp Engagements with part of his Troops, wherein the former fought with great Resolution, and came off with very little Loss. Letters from Paris confirm the raising of the Siege of St. Matheo; and add, That the Conde de las Torres had met with the same ill Success before another Place in Valentia; and that their Affairs on that side were in so ill a Condition, that the Marshal de Tesse had been obliged to march thither with the greatest part of his Forces. The Marquis de Languetie, a Lieutenant-General in the French Service, who was employed in Italy, has retired to Avignon, upon some Discontent given him by the French Court. The States of Holland and Westfriseland are to meet to morrow.

Eastmouth, January 28. This day came here the Thomas and Ann of London, Thomas Jenkins Master, being bound for Topsham, with a Cargo of Wine, Fruit and Oil: She came from Lisbon the 4th Instant, in the Company of 22 Sail more, under Convoy of several of Her Majesty's Ships, commanded by Sir William Jumper.

Plymouth, January 29. Yesterday failed hence to the Eastward Her Majesty's Ships the Windsor and Deale-Castle, with several Merchant Ships and Coasters under their Convoy. This day came in here the Swallow Prize from Lisbon, which came from thence in the Company of a Fleet of Merchant-men, under the Convoy of a Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships commanded by Sir William Jumper, and left them off at Sea.

Bristol, January 30. This day came in here the Dolphin of this Place, John Templeman Commander, from Leghorne, and the King's-Wefton Galley likewise belonging to this Port, John Bevon Commander, laden with Currants from Zant, but lost from Gibraltar, whence she failed the 16th Instant.

Cowes, January 30. Yesterday came to Spithead the Rye Galley, John Carleton Commander, which was separated 7 days ago from several Men of War under the Command of Sir William Jumper, and 16 Merchant Ships under their Convoy.

Tarmouth, Febr. 1. Yesterday came into our Road Her Majesty's Ship the Solebay, with several Coasters under her Convoy from Harwich. Her Majesty's Ship the Gosport is also come into our Road from the Southward.

Deale, Febr. 2. Her Majesty's Ships under the Command of Sir William Jumper came into the Downes the 31st past, with the Merchant-men under their Convoy, from Lisbon, and are since failed for the Buoy of the North.

Whitehall, Febr. 2. By Letters from Barcelona of the 30th of December, N. S. we have an Account, That the States of the Principality of Catalonia having resolved to raise 5000 Foot and 1000 Horse for his Catholick Majesty's Service, the Levies had been begun, and were already in great forwardness: That the Conde de Cifuentes, a Grandee of Spain, had joined his Majesty; and that many of the Nobility and other Principal Inhabitants of the Kingdoms of Valentia and Aragon had likewise paid their Duty to his Majesty, assuring him of a general Disposition in the People of those Parts to declare for him, and to give him all possible Demonstration of their Loyalty and Zeal for his Majesty's Service.
