**O**UR last Letters from Warsaw give an Account, That some Swedish Prisoners had been brought there from Grodno, who were taken by a Party of the King of Poland's Forces at the time when the Swedish Army passed by that Place; that a Party of his Majesty's Troops, commanded by the Sieur Malerewski, had met near Lowitz a strong Party of the Confederated Poles, who were raising Contributions there; and that he attacked them, killed several upon the spot, and brought back to Warsaw 50 Prisoners, and 1000 Florins in Money which he had taken from the Enemy, besides other Booty. The King of Poland having received the News of the Defeat of his Forces under the Command of General Schuylenbourg, by the Swedish Army commanded by General Reinschild, set out from Warsaw the 18th Instant early in the morning, with a considerable Body of Horse, having left in that Town a Garrison of 1000 Men. His Majesty directed his March towards Lowitz, and from thence will proceed towards General Reinschild's Army to observe his Motions, and prevent his making any further Advantage of his late Success. They write from Lithuania, That the Swedish Army there had not yet made any Attempt against the Muscovites, who lie very strongly Intrench'd near Grodno; and that some Swedish Parties having gone up as far as Wilna, the Muscovite Troops, who were there, believing the whole Swedish Army was coming upon them, immediately withdrew, and retired to Potozko. There is an Account from Livonia, That a Body of Swedish Troops under the Command of General Schreienfeld, had met with a Party of the Muscovite Garrison of Dorpt and routed them; after which, the General came before that Town and block'd it up, and sent to General Lewenhaupt, who has the chief Command of the King of Sweden's Forces in Livonia, for more Troops, and a Train of Artillery, to enable him to form the Siege of that Place, and that General Lewenhaupt had drawn together a Body of Troops; but it was uncertain whether it was in order to carry on this Siege, or with intent to march into Lithuania

and reinforce the King of Sweden's Army. Major General Baur, who commands the Muscovite Troops in Courland, has drawn them together, and is marching towards Livonia to observe General Lewenhaupt. Lemberg and the other Towns on that side, which have lately been visited by the Plague, are now wholly free from it.

*Liege, March 2.* A further Supply of Ammunition has lately been brought hither by Water from Holland, and part of it is sent to Huy, and the rest laid up in our Magazines. They are working with great application upon our new Fortifications, and those of Huy. Most of the Officers of the Confederate Troops in these Parts, have raised all their Recruits. Our Parties make frequent Excursions upon the Enemy, and with very good Success. One of them, which went last week out of Mastricht, advanced to the very Suburbs of Brussels, and brought home several of the Inhabitants as Hostages, for the Payment of the Contributions demanded of them.

*Plymouth, Feb. 28.* The 26th Instant arrived here 10 Sail of Tin Ships, and several Coasters from London and the Isle of Wight, but last from Plymouth, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the Maidstone; which having seen them safe in, made the best of her way to join a Fleet of outward-bound Transports, Merchant-men and other Vessels, under Convoy of several of Her Majesty's Ships that were then in the Offin. The 26th in the morning, to the Eastward of this Port, a small French Privateer fell in with some of the Coasters who were next the Land, and drove one ashore; but the Cambridge's Tender, which had 30 Men on board, and 4 Guns, came to her Assistance, and soon obliged the Privateer to make off. The House of Nassau, a Privateer of Flushing, sailed hence yesterday, being homeward-bound.

*Dartmouth, March 1.* Yesterday sailed hence the Elizabeth and Hannah of London, Captain Robert Chafe Commander, homeward-bound from Oporto. The Marlborough and Lucy Gallies are still remaining here.

*Plymouth, March 3.* Her Majesty's Ship the Triton sailed from hence the 28th past to the Eastward, with a Merchant-man under her Convoy.

Convoy. This Day Her Majesty's Ship the Newark came in from Spithead; as the Penzance did from Milford, with 8 Sail of Ships under her Convoy.

*Convey, February 27.* A Dutch Privateer, commanded by Captain Jacob Coning, one of those who took the Spanish Prize mentioned in our last, is since come into our Harbour. This Prize is called the Nostra Señora del Rosario, of 26 Guns, and 128 Men, belongs to St. Sebastian, and came from the Havana laden with Tobacco, Snuff, Cocoa and Hides. She was taken the 22d Instant; and the 26th, the Privateers being in Company, they met to the Eastward of this Island a French Man of War of about 60 Guns, and engaged her, while the Prize made the best of her way hither; the other Privateer is yet at Sea.

*Portsmouth, March 3.* The 28th past, in the afternoon, Her Majesty's Ships the Dorsetshire and Cumberland, with 30 Sail of Ships under their Convoy, sailed from St. Hellens to the Westward. The 2d Instant, in the afternoon, sailed from Spithead Her Majesty's Ships the Chatham and Nottingham, with about 20 Sail of Merchant men and other Vessels, bound for the Downes. The 3d in the evening sailed from Spithead Her Majesty's Ships the Milford and Sun Prize, bound likewise for the Downes; from whence two Dutch Men of War arrived yesterday at Spithead, with about 30 Sail of Ships under their Convoy.

*There are Two Men due from Holland.*

*Her Majesty's Ships the St. George, Revenge, Dover, Winchester, Phoenix and Hunter Fireships, being ordered to proceed forthwith to Sea; it is the Commands of his Royal Highness, That such of the Men belonging to the aforesaid Ships, as are now in Town, or otherwise absent from them, do immediately repair to their Duty aboard the said Ships, at the Bus of the Nores, where they'll be paid the Wages due to them to the first of July last past, before they sail from thence.*

*Her Majesty's Ships the Royal Anne, Devonshire, Shrewsbury, Essex, Medway and Mary, at Spithead, as also the Cambridge, at Portsmouth, being ordered to proceed forthwith to Sea; it is the Commands of his Royal Highness, That such of the Men belonging to the aforesaid Ships, as are in Town, or otherwise absent from them, do immediately repair to their Duty aboard the said Ships, where they'll be paid the Wages due to them to the first of July last past, before they sail.*

*If any Able-bodied Men are willing to serve Her Majesty in the Train of Artillery in Flanders, with his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, let them repair to Captain Silver, Master Gunner of England, at his House in St. James's Park, or at the Exercise on Blackheath, they shall enter into present Pay of Seven Shillings a Week, and be further encouraged and advanced as they shall deserve.*
