UR last Letters from Warlaw give an Account, That some Swedish Prisoners had been brought there from Grodno, who were taken by a Party of the King of Poland's Forces at the time when the Swedish Army passed by that Place; that a Party of his Majesty's Troops, commanded by the Sieur Malerewski, had mer near Lowitz a strong Party of the Confederated Poles, who were raising Contributions there; and that he attacked them, killed several upon the spot, and brought back to Warlaw 50 Prisoners, and 1000 Florins in Money which he had taken from the Enemy, besides other Booty. The King of Poland having received the News of the Deseat of his Forces under the Command of General Schuylembourg, by the Swedish Army commanded by General Reinschild, set out from Warfaw the 18th Instant early in the morning, with a confiderable Body of Horfe, having lest in that Town a Garison of 1000 Men. His Majesty directed his March towards Lowirz, and from thence will proceed towards General Reinschild's Army to observe his Mo tions, and prevent his making any further Advantage of his late Success. They write from Lithuania, That the Swedish Army there had not yet made any Attempt against the Muscovites, who lie very firongly Intrench'd near Grodno; and that some Swedish Parties having gone up as far as Wilna, the Mulcovite Troops, who were there, believing the whole Swedish Army was coming upon them, immediately withdrew, and retired to Potozko. There is an Account from Livonia, That a Body of Swedish Troops under the Command of General. Schreitenfeld, had met with a Party of the Muscovice Garison of Dorpt and routed them; after which, the General came before that Town and blok dicupt and lent to General Lewenhaupt, who has the chief Command of the King of Sweden's Forces in Livonia, for more Troops, and a Train of Artillery, to enable him to form the Siege of that Place, and that General Lewenhaupt had drawn to-gettler a Body of Troops; but it was uncertain whether it was in order to carry on this Siege, or with intent to march into Lithuania

and reinforce the King of Sweden's Army:
Major General Baur, who commands the Mufcovite Troops in Courland, has drawn them
together, and is marching towards Livonia toobserve General Lewenhaupt. Lemberg and
the other Towns on that side, which have
lately been visited by the Plague, are now
wholly free from it

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Liege! March 2. A further Supply of Ammunicion has lately been brought hither by Water from Holland, and part of it is sent to Huy, and the reft laid up in our Magazines. They are working with great application upon our new Fortifications, and those of Huy. Most of the Officers of the Confederate Troops in these Parts have raised all their Recruits. Our Parties make frequent Excursions, upon the Enemy, and with very good Success. One of them, which went dast week out of Mastricht, advanced to the very Suburbs of Brussels, and brought home several of the Inhabitants as Holtages, for the Payment of the Contributions demanded of them.

Palmonth, Feb. 28. The 26th Instantarived here to Sail of Tin Ships, and several Coasters from London and the Isle of Wight, but last from Plimouth, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the Maidstone; which having seen them safe in, made the best of her way to join a Fleet of outward-bound Transports. Merchant men and other Vessels, under Convoy of several of Her Majesty's Ships that were then in the Offin. The 26th in the morning, to the Eastward of this Port, a small French Privateer sell in with some of the Coasters, who were next the Land, and drove one asshore; but the Cambridge's Tender, which had 30 Men on board, and 4 Guns, came to her Assistance, and soon obliged the Privateer to make off. The House of Nassau, a Privateer of Flushing, sailed hence yesterday, being homeward-bound.

Dartmouth, March I. Yesterday sailed hence the Elizabeth and Hannah of London, Captain Robert Chase Commander, homewardbound from Oporto. The Marlborough and Lucy Gallies are still remaining here.

Plimouth, March 3. Her Majesty's Ship the Triton sailed from hence the 28th past to the Eastward, with a Merchant-man under her Convoy.
