

Ships under their Convoy, failed out of Torbay the 11th Instant. The next day came in here the Charles of Jerfey, Daniel Grando Master, laden with Wine from Viana, having been 28 days in her Passage.

Plimouth, April 14. Two Dutch Men of War, with several Dutch Merchant Ships under their Convoy, came in here the 12th Instant from Torbay, being bound to the Westward. This day came in the Dolphin of London, Roger Carnaby Master, homeward bound from Jamaica.

Yarmouth, April 15. Her Majesty's Ship the Dunwich, with several Coasters and light Colliers under her Convoy, failed out of our Road this morning to the Northward.

From on board Her Majesty's Ship the Worcester, off of Laystoff, April 15. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough, being on board the Peregrine Galley, with the other Yachts bound for Holland, joined the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships commanded by Sir Edward Whitaker on Saturday last about 11 in the Morning at the Gunfleet; and yesterday about 9 in the Morning the Squadron left his Grace, with the Centurion Man of War, and the several Yachts and Sloops, going into the Macse, having both Wind and Tide favourable.
