

From *Turin* we are advised that the Duke of *Savoy* being restored to his health, hath appeared in publick to the great satisfaction of the people, and intends for the confirmation thereof, to go thence to *Venaria* to recreate himself with the diversilements of that place.

Hambourg, Nov. 22. Some days since the *Swedish* Courier was, with several others in his company, let upon on his way hither by some persons who intended to have robbed them, but found so stout a resistance, that they lost their Design, leaving one of their number dead behind them; but the Courier with a Marchant of his Company died of the wounds received from them. The 18th Instant were brought in here seven Thieves taken by the Country People, and suspected to be the Persons that set upon the *Swedes* Courier.

From *Elzenour* we have Advice of many Shipwracks occasioned by the late Tempests; and, on the 15th Instant the waters so much overflowed the Banks, that it filled the Cellars of several Marchants to their extraordinary damage.

Letters of the 15th of *November* from *Warsaw* inform us, That *Olezark*, a Provincial Judge of *Kiovie*, being dissatisfied that the Nobles of that Province were not admitted to an equal share of the Vacant Governments, in Recompence of their losses in *Ukrania*, had by his absence and Prostration put an end to the Diet at *Cracovia*, to which 'tis feared he was encouraged by several Discontented persons, whose endeavours have but too visibly discovered to aime at the Disturbance of the Peace of that Kingdom.

They farther tell us, That the Generalits of the *S* nation and Nobles seem infinitely pleased with the Proposal of a Marriage between their King and the Emperours Sister; and, 'tis said, That an Honourable Embassy will be in little time sent from *Poand* to the Emperours Court at *Vienna*, for the Concluding of that Great Affair.

Venice, Nov. 23. The Count *di Portia* who commanded a Regiment of German soldiers sent by His Imperial Majesty to the assistance of this Republick, having been convoyd by the Procurator General *Bernardi* as far as *Zante*, met there with the news of the surrender of *Candia*, and the peace concluded with the Ottoman Emperour, upon which, the whole Convoy returned back to *Corsu*, and from thence put again to sea for this place in company with two other ships bound for *Ancona*, having on board them 200 soldiers, which had been put on shoar in the said Island of *Corsu* by Signior *Baly Vincenzo* *Rospigliosi* the Popes General of the Gallies; but having put out to sea, they met with so furious a storm, that most of the ships were cast away with all their men; that ship whereon was embarked the Count *di Portia*, being for three days and nights tossed at sea with much damage to the ship; the seamen being forced to leave her to the mercy of the winds, and is now with much difficulty put into this Port; since which, the Count has had thoughts of filling up his Regiment, but waves it in this place, that so he may not give the Turks the least occasion of any jealousy.

From *Dalmatia* we are informed, that the peace has been there solemnly published by the Turks in all parts of their Dominions, so that we doubt not of its Ratification, which yet we cannot expect to hear of, before the Reception and Audience of Signior *Luigi Molino* our Ambassador extraordinary to the Ottoman Port.

Signior *Antonio Barbaro* has made all necessary preparations for his voyage into *Dalmatia*, where he is to succeed in the Charge of Procurator General; this week he attended the Colledge to receive his Dispatches and Moneys, but these being not yet furnished, his journey is for while deferred.

On Monday last was launched from the *Arsenal* a lusty Gally, the General of *Dalmatia*, excellently Carved and Equipp'd, and the next morning the States Standard was

advanced on her with much Ceremony; with the beat of Drums and sound of Trumpets, and the firing of all her Canon.

Several Noble Greeks have lately presented a Memorial to the Duke, representing to him the present great Necessities both of themselves and some numbers of their Country-men; who since the surrender of *Candia* despatch of a return into that Island; to the enjoyment of their Estates which lie under the Turkish Dominions; humbly praying, that some allowance may be made; or some employment given to them for their support, but as yet no answer has been returned.

We were here for some time in much doubt; whether upon the peace made with the Turks, any farther progress would have been made in the title of Estates belonging to the lately suppressed Religious Houses; the cause of their Sequestration being now over; but to the general satisfaction of all men; that point is cleared, the Popes Nuncio on Tuesday last commencing the Officers appointed for the receiving the Moneys arising from those sales.

Paris, Dec. 4. The Bishop of *Effiers* has not yet received his instructions in Order to his Embassy to the Court of *Spain*; his voyage thither being supposed to be deferred till first we have news of the arrival and reception of Monsieur *de Gourville*, the Prince *de Conde's* Envoye to that Court.

To morrow the Turkish Envoye is to be received with extraordinary splendor by His Majesty at *St Germain's* in the great Gallery of the Old Castle, which is to be furnished with the best and richest Hanging; a stately Throne to be erected at the end of it, whereon His Majesty intends to appear in an Habit extraordinarily rich and covered with Jewels; His guard of Musqueteers being also ordered to attend in their best equipage for the greater lustre of that Ceremony.

We now begin to apprehend lest the inclination of the Empire proving but little favourable to the Interest of this Kingdom, may oblige us to close with the Grand Signior in the Treaty so fairly offered to us.

Our late advices from the *West Indies* inform us of a terrible Hurricane near *St Christo;hers*; by which 25 of our Merchant ships and others have been cast away, and a great part of the Island much ruined; this news is reported with so much confidence, that some of our Merchants are already getting into their hands all the Commodities they can meet with of the growth of that place, to make their best advantages for this misfortune.

Hague, Decemb. 6. The States are not yet come to a Resolution about their Impositions upon the French Merchandises and Manufactures: but seem now resolved about their Recruitment of the Old Militia; and the Levies of New Forces, having projected the increase of their Forces to the number of above 63 thousand Foot, and between 5 and 6000 Horse. Most of the Provinces have Ratify'd the late Treaty made with *Portugal*, and expect the like Ratification from the Prince Regent of that Crown.

Deale, Novemb. 20. The 27th Instant failed to the Westward; a Fleet of about 20 Merchant Ships.

The 29th a *Hambourg*-Hoy of 60 Tuns laden with Oats and some Lead, and *Deale*, came on ground between *Deale* and *Sandwich*, and is since broken up.
