*Turin, April 14. N. S.*

**T**HE French Forces which have winter'd in Savoy are now marching into Piedmont by the Way of the Valley of Aousta, and the rest of their Troops are likewise in motion. They are making a Bridge over the Po at Chivas, in which Place, as well as at Sufa, they lay up great Stores of Provisions and Ammunition. They have begun to demolish the Fortifications of Ivrea. On our side no time is lost in perfecting our new Fortifications, and making all the Preparations that are necessary for our Defence.

*Warsaw, April 23.* The Muscovite Forces are in Motion, and are to rendezvous at Brescici: The Czar himself is marched thither from Minsky with the Troops he lately brought from Muscovy and the Cossacks under the Command of General Mezzepa, who joined him at the Place last mentioned; and the Muscovite Forces which lay at Grodno have been on their March ever since the 8th Instant. General Baur, with the Body of Muscovite Troops under his Command, is coming from Courland to Lithuania, to join Prince Wisnowisky, who has with him about 8000 Poles, and the Swedish General Lewenhaupt is marching the same Way with a Body of Troops, in order to observe their Motions. We hear a Detachment of Swedish Forces hath lately defeated one of about 2500 Cossacks near Nieswitz. They write from Wilna, That the Swedes have demanded a considerable Sum of that City by Way of Contribution, part of which was paid them in Money or Goods, and they took several Persons with them as Hostages for the remainder, and carried them away to their Camp at Zoludki. It is said they shortly expect considerable Supplies of Men, Money and Ammunition from Sweden.

*Vienna, April 24.* A considerable Number of Recruits arrived lately from Bohemia, for our Troops in Italy, which were immediately sent away thither. The Principality of Transilvania being now entirely freed from the Malecontents, the Danish Troops which were sent thither about half a Year ago with General Herbeville are recalled, and have already begun to march this way. The Troops on both sides in Hungary continue very quiet, in Expectation of the Issue of the Negotiation that is carrying on for restoring the Peace and Tranquility of those Parts. Our last Letters from thence left the Emperor's Troops commanded by General Paify near Altembourg. Count Budiani, who some time since was defeated near Five-Churches by the Imperial Forces under General Herberstejn, is now at Fedwar, where he has been joined by the Malecontents under the Command of Stephen Andreasti. There lay another Body of Malecontents in the County of Oedembourg. Several Barks laden with Provisions and Ammunition, with Soldiers on Board to guard them, are to be sent very speedily down the Danube to Comorra, Gran, and Buda, to supply the Magazines of those Towns.

*Augsbourg, April 30.* The Count de Lewenstein, Administrator of Bavaria, is lately returned to Munich from the Imperial Court, where he has been to receive Instructions concerning several new Regula-

tions to be made for the better Government of that Electorate, and the more effectual securing it against such Attempts as were made not long since to deprive it of the Tranquility it now enjoys under the Emperor's Government. It has been resolved to dismantle the Town of Braunau, to save the Expence of keeping a Garison there, and that Work is already in good Forwardness. General Kirchbaum is lately come to Newbourg, to hasten the March of the Palatine Troops that are to proceed from thence to Italy.

*Mastricht, May 5.* The Sieurs Van Cortiene and Hop, Deputies of the Council of State, came hither the 30th past to view the Fortifications and Magazines of this Place, as they intend likewise to do those of Hasselt and Tongeren. The Count d'Auvergne went from hence this Week to his Government of Hasselt. The Forces of which the Confederate Army in the Netherlands for the Service of the ensuing Campaign is to be composed, are for the most part quartered in our Neighbourhood, and the rest arrive daily in these Parts from their several Garrisons. Major-General Dompere is come to his Quarter at Haren; and the rest of the General Officers are suddenly expected at their respective Posts. The French are likewise drawing their Forces together upon the Frontier. The Regiment of Sonderbourg, which has been quartered here during the Winter, marched the 30th past to Tongeren; from whence the Regiment of Hasselt arrived here the next Day.

*Whitehaven, May 1.* This Day Her Majesty's Ship the Cruiser failed hence for Dublin, with about 20 Sail of Colliers under her Convoy.

*Bristol, May 4.* The St. Matthew of this Place, Richard Pritchard Master, arrived here last Night from Oporto, but last from Youghall. At the same time came in Her Majesty's Ship the Penzance from Milford.

*Plimouth, May 5.* The first Instant came in here a Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships, with a Fleet of Merchant Ships under their Convoy. The 3d came in two Dutch Men of War from Falmouth, with 10 Prizes, a Dogger from the Canaries, bound for Holland, and a Merchant-ship from Jamaica. This Day failed the two Dutch Men of War, and under their Convoy the Gold and Dolphin Frigats from Jamaica, the Fortune from the Canaries, and the Lydia from Oporto, with 5 Vessels bound from hence to London, and the other Vessels above-mentioned.

*Deale, May 6.* The 4th Instant came into the Downes the Queen Anne Galley from Leghorne, but last from Plimouth.

*Portsmouth, May 7.* Her Majesty's Ship the Winchester and the Tartar Pink failed 1st Sunday from Spithhead to the Eastward.
