Vienna, June 5. N. S.

ON the 31st past Baron Kessler came hither, with the good News of the raising the Siege of Barcelona, and the same Evening Baron Onsteyn arrived from Brabant, with the Particulars of the Duke of Marlborough's Victory; and on the 3d General Dopf's Son brought some farther Advices as to the happy Consequence of that Action, by the Surrender of Brussels, Mecklin, Lier, Vilvoorde, Alost, and other Places. Last Night Mr. Stepney, Envoy Extraordinary from Her Majesty of Great Britain, had Audience of the Emperor, Empress, and Empress Dowager, who he congratulated on these extraordinary Occasions: They all expressed themselves with the highest Sense of Obligation to Her Majesty and the English Nation for the generous Assistance they have given. The Empress Dowager particularly was pleased to say, That Her Majesty the Queen having acted the Part of a Mother towards the King of Spain, he did not question but he would ever behave himself with a true Obedience of a Son to Her Majesty. To-morrow *Te Deum* is to be sung at the Cathedral Church, the Guns to be thrice discharged, and Illuminations to be made in all the Houses here, on account of these great and wonderful Successes. Since the Armistice was concluded on the 8th past, the Hungarians have made no farther Advance towards the Treaty: His Imperial Majesty therefore has desired Mr. Stepney to undertake another Journey to Hungary, to represent to the Chiefs of them the Necessity of entering seriously upon a Treaty of Peace; and at the same time to acquaint them with the great Successes of his Imperial Majesty and his Allies in Spain and Flanders; to try if by those and other Motives he can induce them to give in their Demands, and to proceed to a solemn Negotiation; on which Errand he set out early this Morning for Timau, and from thence is likely to go to Prince Ragotski at Neuhaufel, in Company with Count Rechteren.

Frankfort, June 12. The French Army commanded by Marshal Villars is in the same Post. The French work very hard on their Lines between Lauterbourg and Weissembourg. The Hessian Troops which were encamped in the Neighbourhood of this Place and of Ments, marched yesterday towards Heilbron, to the Number of 10000 Men. They write from Inspruck, That part of the Palatine Forces were arrived at Trent, from whence they would continue their March towards the Imperial Army in Italy; where Prince Eugene had caused *Te Deum* to be sung, and a triple Discharge of all the Artillery, and other Rejoycings to be made, for the Victory in Brabant, and the raising the Siege of Barcelona.

Hanover, June 15. On Sunday the 13th Instant the Prince Electoral of Brunwick and Lunenburg was invested with the most Noble Order of the Garter, with the usual Ceremonies. My Lord Halifax has fixed his Departure hence for the 22d of this Month, N. S.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Aveseele, June 17. We have an Account, That Monsieur Fagel being come yesterday Morning before Plafendaal, a Fort on the Canal near Ostende, with 8 Battalions, the Commander, a French Lieutenant-Colonel, after our firing two or three Shot, surrendered, the Garrison, consisting of 250 Men, being made Prisoners of War.

This day Monsieur d'Auverquerque, with the Troops that are to form the Siege of Ostende, came before that Place, where the Artillery is expedited to join them to-morrow from Gand. Sir Stafford Fairborne, with a Squadron of English Men of War and two Bomb-Ketches, lies off that Port to assist at the Siege.

To-morrow his Grace the Duke of Marlborough marches to Rouffelaer, in order to cover the Sieges of Ostende and Newport. Huzar, June 18. N. S. The freshest Letters we have from the Army are of the 14th Instant, which say, That Monsieur d'Auverquerque was to march the next day with a Detachment to besiege Ostende; and his Grace the Duke of Marlborough was to cover the Siege with the main Army. This day came an Express from Monsieur Fagel with Advice, That he had possessed himself of Plafendaal, and of some other Forts on the Canal of Ostende, without any Loss on our side, the Garrison, consisting of about 300 Men, surrendered at Discretion, after firing 3 or 4 Guns. The Prussian Troops are arrived at Maffricnt, and are ordered to march to Bruckis; as also those of Hanover, which are expected there within few Days. The States have hired at Amsterdam about 30 Flyboats, to transport the Troops which are designed for the Descent.

The Letters come in this day from France are various as to the Affairs of Spain, some say that the Duke of Anjou is arrived at Madrid, and others that he is at Pampeluna, whither his Dutche's is gone to meet him. The States have resolved to send an Envoy to Munster, to assist at the Election of a Bishop of that Sec. Monsieur Geldermallen arrived yesterday from Germany, and will be going next week to the Army commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, as Deputy of the States.

Falmouth, June 8. The 4th Instant came in here the Fortune Dogger of Zealand, of and from Camphier, laden with Wine and Cordage for Ireland, and sailed from hence the next Day. The 6th came in the Charles the Third, a Privateer of Flushing, Peter Garrat Commander, from cruising, having taken 3 French Privateers, viz. one of 18, another of 12, and the third of 20 Guns, two of which he sent home, and the other he left at the Isle of Wight. The same Day arrived the Olimpio, George Hughes Master, of and from Guernsey, laden with Salt for Penzance; and yesterday the Mordant, a Guernsey Privateer, brought in as Prize the Katherine of Corke from Nants, laden with Wine, Brandy, Vinegar, Figs, Raisins, &c. This Day sailed to cruise the Charles the Third, a Dutch Privateer of 28 Guns. The Expedition Packet-Boat continues here, waiting for a fair Wind to proceed on her Voyage for Lisbon.

Plimouth, June 7. On the 5th Instant came in here the Walker, a Middlebourg Privateer, who brought in with her a Prize which she had taken off of Dunkirk, laden with Bailed Goods, &c. and bound for Cadiz, valued at 40000 l. The same Day sailed the Frankland Packet-Boat, Captain Smyton Commander, for the West Indies; and the Speedwell of and from Jersey arrived here. Yesterday a Dutch Caper sent into this Harbour a Privateer of St. Malo, of 12 Guns.

Dartmouth, June 7. On the 3d Instant, off of this Place, happened a sharp Dispute between a French Privateer of 8 Guns and the Lucy Galley, Captain Back Commander, of about 10 Guns, which lasted near 7 Hours; but at last the Privateer was forced to flee: The Merchant-Man is put into Salcomb, having only two Men killed, and one wounded. The 5th came into this Port the Revenge, a Privateer of Guernsey, who brought in with her a Prize called the Duke of Borkney, belonging to Ostend, of 200 Tuns, laden with Wine and Brandy from Bourdeaux; and bound for Ostend.
