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Constantinople, April 26. N. S.

**O**N the 22d Instant the Grand Signior thought fit to depose Mehmed Bafhaw, his Prime Vizier, who with Osman Aga, his Kihaya, is sent on board a Galley to Scio, where he is to continue, having the Title of Bafhaw of that Island conferred upon him, to make his Banishment the less dishonourable. All Bafhaw was the same day made Grand Vizier in his room: He was Selihtar Aga to the late Sultan during the latter part of his Reign. Achmet, the present Grand Signior, soon after his Accession to the Empire, made him a Bafhaw of the First Rank, and a Vizier of the Bench; and has now promoted him to the highest Dignity to which any Subject here can be advanced. Six Frigats are shortly to sail from hence to the Black Sea, and as many Men of War to Alexandria; and in a few days the Captain Bafhaw will sail with a Fleet of Men of War and Gallies to the Archipelago, to clear those Seas of the Malefe Privateers, and to receive the Tribute of the several Islands.

**Turin, May 26.** The 15th Instant in the Afternoon his Royal Highness having received Advice, That the Enemy were passing the Doria at Pianezza, and that a small Body of them was already got on this side the River, immediately mounted on Horseback, and went to Colegno to observe their Motions: He found that 1000 Foot, and some few of the Enemy's Horse, had passed the Doria, to view the Ground on this side, but that our Fiquet-Guard advancing towards them, they soon retired to the other side of the River. The 20th the Enemy made two Bridges over the Doria near to Pianezza, and they raised a Battery of four Pieces of Cannon at Lucinto for the covering of some other Bridges which they intended to make there. We perceived from our Ramparts, that the Enemy were destroying the Houses between this Town and their Line; whereupon his Royal Highness ordered several Pieces of Cannon to be fired upon their Workmen. That Day his Royal Highness received a Courier from Geneva, with the Confirmation of the Retreat of the French Fleet, under the Command of the Count de Foulouffe, from before Barcelona; and that the Duke of Anjou with his Army had likewise raised the Siege of that Place by Land. His Royal Highness also received Advice of an Action between the Imperial Army under Prince Eugene, and the French commanded by the Duke of Vendosme, in which the Enemy had lost a considerable number of Men. The 21st his Royal Highness having notice given him the Night before, That the Enemy designed to pass the Doria, was abroad by break of Day, and went directly to Colegno; but finding it impracticable to hinder the Enemy's Passage, he ordered all his Guards which were posted near the River to retire; and about Noon his Cavalry marched from Colegno, and came in Order of Battel within two Miles of Turin. The Enemy came to Colegno about half an hour after our Troops were retired, and took Post there; and soon after their whole Army was in light. His Royal Highness put himself at the Head of his Horse, and continued there till Evening, when he returned hither, leaving the Care of every thing to General Daun, who stay'd till Night. The Enemy extended their Right towards Rivoli, and their Left towards the Doria: The Forces on both sides lay upon their Arms all Night. When the Enemy first began to pass the Doria at Pianezza, his Royal Highness ordered four Pieces of Cannon to be planted so as to hinder the Enemy's passing over the Bridge they had made there, which was covered by a Battery of four Pieces of Cannon; and our Cannon not only hindered the Enemy's passing there, but also silenced their Battery. The Enemy left about 15 Battalions in their Redoubts on the other side of the Doria. The Marquis de Cavour, who was Governor of the Citadel of Turin, being obliged to quit that Post by reason of the ill State of his Health, his Royal Highness appointed Monsieur de la Rochedallerie, who was formerly Governor of Veruc, to succeed him in that Command. The 22d his Royal Highness was at the Head of his Horse by Three of the Clock in the Morning, and he posted some Foot in the neighbouring Houses to cover the Retreat of our Horse, and to support them if there should be Occasion. About Six of the Clock the Enemy advanced in Order of Battel, and push'd our Grand Guard; whereupon his Royal Highness gave Orders for his Horse to retire, which they did in very good Order. Upon the first News of the Enemy's Motion, his Royal Highness advanced to observe them: A Body of the Enemy's Hussars endeavoured to cut off his Retreat, for which purpose they fell upon one of our advanced Guards, and put them into disorder; and if some Officers, who were with his Royal Highness, had not rallied

this Guard, and driven back the Hussars, his Royal Highness would have run a great Risque of being kill'd or taken Prisoner. However, not one of our Officers received any hurt, and we had not above eight or ten Troopers kill'd or wounded. Mr. Hamilton, Adjutant-General in the Emperor's Service, had his Horse wounded not far from his Royal Highness, who exposed himself to the greatest Dangers, as well in endeavouring to rally and support his Men, as in advancing with a fresh Body to attack the Enemy's Hussars, and some other Troops that had joined them. The Enemy being advanced within Cannon-shot of our Citadel, made a Halt; and in the mean time our Troops filed off towards the Valentine, where the Horse encamped all Night; and the Foot came to their respective Posts in this City. The Enemy encamped behind the River Porporate, their Right being stretched out towards the Po, and their left to Lucento. The Cannon of our Citadel fired upon the Enemy all Day, and obliged them to remove some of their Tents. By what we can observe, they are much in the same Posts as they were the last Year; but they rake up a great deal more Ground. We have still one Gate open, by which we daily receive great Quantities of all Sorts of Provisions. His Royal Highness, when he gave the Word, spoke very obligingly of the Conduct of his Officers, and of the handsome Retreat which they had made in the Presence of the Enemy's superior Forces. The 23d our Horse decamped from the Valentine, and marched to Montcalier: This alarm'd the Enemy; and we observed them in Motion in their Camp, and their Guards were doubled. All the Deserters agree, That the Enemy's heavy Cannon is soon expected from Suza and Chivas and that they will open their Trenches before the End of the Month. They talk of two Attacks, one against the Town, and the other against the Citadel; but they are not strong enough to attack both these Places at once. His Royal Highness passed the Po, and went towards Montcalier, to view the Enemy's Camp; which extending it self near the Po, he ordered a Battery of 12 Pieces of Cannon to be erected the next Morning to fire upon them. The 24th his Royal Highness was on Horseback very early, to see what Execution this Battery had done, and found it had obliged the Enemy to abandon a Line they were making from their Camp to the Valentine, in order to take Post there. His Royal Highness considering of what Consequence this Post would be to the Enemy, gave the necessary Orders for maintaining it as long as should be possible, and for the pulling down such of the Walls and Buildings there as might be of Use to them if they should rake it. His Royal Highness ordered some Troops to be posted upon the Hills on the other side of the Po towards Montcalier; and two or three new Batteries for 20 Pieces of Cannon to be raised, to try once more to oblige the Enemy to retire farther from that River. The 25th our Batteries on the other side of the Po being finished; by break of Day they fired very briskly upon the Enemy for about three Hours, with so good Success, that the Enemy abandoned their Tents with great Confusion; and so soon as the Cannon had done playing, they decamped, and retired further from the River-side. We do not yet know what the Enemy's Loss on this Occasion may have been; but we are sure it must be considerable, because every Shot reached into their Camp. This is the 4th time we have Cannonaded the Enemy in this manner since they are come into our Neighbourhood; and each time has not only cost them very dear, but also obliged them to change their Posts. The Enemy's Line on this side the Doria is near finished; and they have received this Day several Pieces of Cannon from Suza. This Day we received Advice, That our Cannon yesterday killed or wounded above 400 of the Enemy's Soldiers, and about 12 Officers.

**Verona, June 4.** The Imperial Army under the Command of Prince Eugene, and the French Army commanded by the Duke of Vendosme, continue encamped near each other, with the River Adige between them. The former daily receives such considerable Reinforcements from Germany, that we hope they will shortly be enabled to pass the River, and oblige the Enemy to retire.

**Vienna, June 8.** On Sunday the 6th Instant *Te Deum* was sung here for the glorious Advantages gained by our Arms of the Allies, under the Command of the Duke of Marlborough, in the Netherlands, and for the raising of the Siege of Barcelona: Which prosperous Successes we have great reason to hope will have a very good Influence upon the Negotiations for composing the Troubles in Hungary.

**Hannover, June 12.** The King of Prussia began his Journey hither the 15th Instant in the Evening, and came early the next Morning to Tangermunde, where he rested the 15th; and arrived here the 16th about 11 in the Morning. His Majesty

was met out of Town by the Elector, the Elector's Prince his Son, and Prince Ernest Augustus his Brother; and was received at his alighting out of his Coach by the Elector's Dowager and the two Princesses. The King dined with the Elector, the Electress Dowager, and the other Princes and Princesses; and is entertained in a most splendid manner, nothing being omitted that may contribute to his Diversion, or to the setting forth the Magnificence of his Court. The same Evening his Majesty ask'd the Princess of Hanover, Daughter to his Elector's Highness, in Marriage for the Prince Royal; and the Match was publickly declared yesterday. The Prince Royal presented her Highness with a Ring of great Value; and this Night the Contract is to be signed. His Majesty intends to go from hence the 23d Instant for Cleves. The Solemnity of the Marriage is deferred till his Return. The Lord Raby, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Ambassador Extraordinary to the King of Prussia, arrived here the 15th from Berlin. The Lord Halifax has put off his Departure home for some Days.

*From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Rouffelaer, June 21. N. S.* His Grace the Duke of Marlborough, with the Army under his Command, marched from Arceie the 18th Instant, and encamped in this Place, our Right being extended beyond Hoogleede, and our Left beyond Rouffelaer. The Inhabitants of Brabant, upon our Army's being at this distance from them, began to fear lest the Enemy, who have lately received a Reinforcement from Germany, should attempt to insult them: But his Grace, to free them from any Apprehensions of this kind, sent Brigadier-General Cadogan with a Body of Horse towards Oudenarde, and caused the necessary Dispositions to be made for the immediate March of the Army that way, upon the first Intelligence of the Enemy's being in motion. Brigadier Meredith, who with a Detachment of our Troops has blocked up Dendermonde, was informed by Deserters from the Town, that the Burgers had pressed the Governor to surrender; which he refusing to do, and insinuating that they would wait at least till such time as our Cannon had begun to fire upon them, they obliged him to give them a Promise under his Hand that he would then capitulate. Our Artillery to be employed against that Place will be ready this day; so that we hope by our next Accounts to receive Advice of its being surrendered. We hear a Detachment of 1500 of the Enemy's Horse, with each a Foot-Soldier behind him; is marched from Mons to the Relief of Dendermonde: But Brigadier Cadogan having Notice of it, immediately marched towards Aloft, in order to join Brigadier Meredith, if there should be occasion. The Army commanded by Monsieur d'Auverquerque invested Offend yesterday morning, and will besiege that Place in Form as soon as the Artillery designed for that Service is come up. The Enemy are doing all they are able to repair their late extraordinary Losses; and give out they shall take the Field again about the middle of next Month.

*Hague, June 22. N. S.* Monsieur d'Auverquerque, with the Army under his Command, advanced the 18th Instant before Nieuport, and had already made some Dispositions for attacking that Place; but meeting with Difficulties which would have rendered this Siege more tedious than was expected, it was thought fit to begin with that of Offend, and he accordingly laid down before that Town on the 21st. Letters from France of the 18th Instant give an Account, That by their Advices from Italy the Siege of Turin was carried on, the Trenches being opened before the Citadel; and that they had taken one of the Outworks, which had cost them very dear. The Garrison defends it self with great Bravery and Resolution, and the Duke of Savoy directs all things with admirable Conduct and Diligence. Our Letters from Madrid give an Account, That they had at last received the News of the Siege of Barcelona being raised; That the Dutchess of Anjou would thereupon have retired to Pampeluna, but was dissuaded from it by her Ministers; That Salamanca had declared for King Charles III. and that it was expected several other Towns thereabouts would follow that Example, the Country on that side, as well as the whole Kingdom of Aragon, being generally disposed in favour of his Catholick Majesty.

*Falmouth, June 10.* The 8th in the Evening the Expedition Packer-Boat sailed for Lisbon. This day came in here the St. Nicholas and the Nostra Señora de la Solidad, both from Bilbao, laden with Wool and Iron.

*Plimouth, June 11.* This day came in here the St. Francis of and from Bilbao, laden with Wool and Iron, and bound for London. The same day failed hence the Patience of Arundel for Topsham.

*Windsor, June 10.* This day the Rt. Hon. James Earl of Derby was, by Her Majesty's Command, sworn one of the Lords of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly: And Her Majesty having been graciously pleased to give his Lordship the Custody of the Seals of the Dutchy and County Palatine of Lancaster, the Oath of Chancellor of the said Dutchy was thereupon, by Her Majesty's Command, administered this day to his Lordship.
