Gibraltar, May 31. O. S.

HER Majesty's Ship the Roebuck, Capt. Kempthorn Commander, is just now come in here from Barcelona, having been 17 Days in her Passage: She brings an Account, That Sir John Leake would soon come this way with the Confederate Fleet, in order to take Alicante, Carragena, Malaga, and the other Towns along that Coast; his Excellency the Earl of Peterborow intending at the same time to march by Land with an Army of about 25000 Men. The Prince of Hesse was to remain at Barcelona, of which Place he is made Governor.

From the Camp at Salamanca, June 11. N. S. The Confederate Army came before Ciudad-Rodrigo the 21st past. We were informed, that 6 Pieces of Cannon had that day been brought into the Place, being guarded by a Party of the Enemy's Horse; and that the Garison consisted of one Battalion of regular Troops, and between 2 and 3000 of the Country People in Arms. The 23d we received 12 Cannon 24 Pounders, and 6 Mortars, from the Frontiers of Abeira; and the Mortars were placed upon a Battery, and began to play the same Night. The 24th a Portuguese Battery of 10 Guns began to fire. The 25th an English Battery of 6 Guns began to play early in the Morning. That Day 12 Barrells of Powder in the Magazine that served the Battery of Mertars blew up by Accident, and set fire to several Bombs, besides which it did no other Damage than the killing of 11 Men. The 26th, the Breach being wide enough for the giving an Assault, the Governor was summoned to surrender, who thought fit to comply, and the Capitulation was soon agreed upon; by which he, with the other principal Officers of the Garison, and the Battalion of regular Troops, were to march out the 28th, with the usual Marks of Honour, obliging themselves not to bear Arms against his Catholick Majesty King Charles the Third during the Space of one Year: The Country People were to leave their Arms behind them, to return to their respective Dwellings, and not to take up Arms any more against the House of Austria. The 3d Instant we marched from Ciudad-Rodrigo towards this Place. The 5th the Marquis das Minas received a Letter of Submission from this Town, with Advice, That the Duke of Berwick was marched from thence with his small Army. The 7th we came to this Camp. The Magistrates met us a League and half out of Town in their Formalities, and made their Submission to King Charles. The Duke of Berwick is retired to Corita, which is above 7 Leagues from hence, in the way to Madrid. To morrow we are to march forward towards Guadarama, by the way of Peguaranda.

Rome, June 5. N. S. Signior Philippuci, whom the Pope had named to be a Cardinal in the late Promotion, having excused himself from accepting that Dignity, the Pope has consented that he should resign his Cap; which he has accordingly done. The Abbot Mosca being appointed to carry the Cap to Signior Badoer, another of the new Cardinals, is gone from hence to Loretto, where he is to meet him in his Journey from Venice to this Place.

Genoa, June 5. N. S. Letters from Rome of the 1st Instant say, The Pope has appointed Signior Anguisciola to reside as his Nuncio at Venice, in the room of Signior Cuni, who is appointed to go with the same Character to the Court of France; and that they had an Account from Naples, that a Squadron of 4 Men of War that belong

to Malta had taken a Ship belonging to Tunis of 28 Guns; on Board which were 360 Slaves, and among them several Renegadoes. Cardinal Janfon passed by St. Remo the 3d Instant, being on Board one of our Gallies, going to Antibes. We have had no News from Catalonia since those of the raising the Siege of Barcelona, and of the Retreat of Marshal de Tesse with the French Army under his Command to Perpignan.

Milan, June 8. The Dutchy of Modena is to provide many more Wagons and other Necessaries for the French Army commanded by the Duke of Vendome than the last Year; the French being in great distress for want of them. They write from Prince Eugene's Army, That he had lately received a Reinforcement of 4000 Men from Germany, and expected more Troops, and then he would be in a Condition to attempt the Passage of the Adige. We have an Account from the Camp before Turin, That the Duke de la Feuillade having sent the Count de Marnigan, by Order of the French King, to carry Passports for the Dutchess and Princesses; His Royal Highness had refused them, saying, He had provided otherwise for their Security: That they fired very furiously from the Town, and very much annoyed the Besiegers; killing abundance of their Men, and ruining their Works.

Venice, June 12. The Marquis Pauletti passed lately by this Place in his way from Germany to Turin, being dispatched by the Elector Palatine to the Duke of Savoy: He brings a Confirmation of the News of the glorious Victory and further great Successes obtained by the Arms of the Allies, under the Conduct of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, over the French Forces in the Netherlands. Prince Eugene continues encamped near St. Michel; from whence they write, That his Highness upon the Receipt of this welcome News had caused *To Deum* to be Sung, and a triple Discharge to be made of all his Cannon and Small Arms: That the Marquis de Langalerie, who has left the French Service, and is made a General of Horse in the Emperor's Pay, is lately arrived there from Vienna; as is likewise the Count de Bonneval, General of Battalia: That his Highness had sent a Detachment of 2000 Horse with 4 Pieces of Cannon towards Bonavigo, with Orders to endeavour to make a Bridge there over the Adige: And that he hoped by the 20th Instant to be joynd by a sufficient number of Troops from Germany, to enable him to pass that River, and oblige the Enemy to retire.

Warsaw, June 11. The King of Poland is now at Lobzovia; his Army is encamped near Cracow. They write from Lithuania, That on the 20th past there happened an Action near Lacowisk, wherein the Loïs was said to be equal on both sides.

Frankfort, June 19. Our Army continues in the same Post. The French are encamped near Spiré. A Party from the Garison of Landau lately seized a Courier, who was carrying Letters from the French Court to the Marshal de Villars, which were brought to Prince Lewis.

Dublin, June 15. On the 4th Instant, Captain Saunders, Commander of Her Majesty's Ship the Shoreham, sailing to the Westward with some Ships bound to the West-Indies, came up with a French Privateer of 8 Guns and 53 Men, and chased her into Bantry Bay in Bear-Haven, where he took her: She is called the Francis of Cherbourg, Captain Owen Richard Commander.

Falmouth, June 15. The Pembroke Galley of London sailed hence the 13th Instant in the Evening, being laden with

with Wine and Fruit, and homeward-bound from Lisbon. At the same time sailed the Philip of London, laden with Sugar and Fruit from Lisbon, and bound to Hamburg; and the Porpus of Rotterdam, homeward-bound from Ireland. Yesterday came in the St. Joseph of Bilbao, bound home from Bilbao; and the Nostra Signora de la Solidad of Bilbao sailed hence for London, being laden with Wool and Iron. This Day sailed the St. Nicholas of Bilbao, bound also for London with a like Cargo; and the Schonenberg, a Dutch Privateer, came in here from cruising.

Falmouth, June 17. The Queen Packet-Boat arrived here last Night from Lisbon, having been 8 Days in her Passage: She brings an Account, That the Confederate Army commanded by the Earl of Galway and the Marquis das Minas, who was then Governour of the City of Oporto, had marched to Salamanca; and that Town, with some other Places thereabouts, had declared for King Charles the Third. That the Army was to march towards Guadalupe, in the Way to Madrid; That the Marquis das Minas had sent for 3 Regiments from Alcantara, 2 from Coria, and all the Auxiliary Regiments in Abeira, with 500 Horse, to reinforce his Army; That Orders had been given for the paying of two Regiments which were to march to Alcantara; That a separate Body of the Portuguese Troops, which has taken the Field on the side of Estramadura, had reduced Xeres de los Cavalleros, a Place about 7 Leagues distant from Badajos; And that their third and last Fleet from Brazil was safely arrived, and with it two Spanish Prizes, very richly laden, which were seized in Rio Janeiro, upon the Receipt of the News there of the King of Portugal's being admitted into the Grand Alliance, and having declared War against France and Spain.

Plymouth, June 18. The Philip and the Pembroke Galley, both of London, which lately came in here from Falmouth, put to Sea again yesterday. The same Day came in a Danish Ship laden with Deals for Lisbon; and some Vessels from Loo and Fowey, laden with Coals. This Day came in Her Majesty's Ships the Penzance and Hound; and under their Convoy two Ships from Viana, bound for London, 3 bound for Rotterdam, and 18 Coasters laden with Coals, Rock-Salt, and other Goods, for this Place and other Ports to the Eastward. Here are likewise come in the Patience of Dram in Norway, bound hither, and a French Prize called the Oliver of Bourdeaux, laden with Sugar from the West-Indies, taken by a Privateer of Flushing.

Bristol, June 19. Yesterday came in the Severn Galley of this Place, in 29 Days from Leghorn. This Day arrived the Bridgewater, and under her Convoy several Vessels from Corke, but last from Waterford; and the Betty Sloop from Gibraltar.

Yarmouth, June 21. Yesterday came into our Road a Fleet of Merchant-ships from Hull, under Convoy of several Men of War. Divers laden Colliers passed through our Road at the same time to the Southward.

Windsor, June 16. This day Count Galas, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Spain, had a Publick Audience of Her Majesty, in which he presented a Letter of Thanks from his Master for the timely Succours sent for the Relief of Barcelona. He had likewise afterwards a Publick Audience of His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, to whom he also presented a Letter upon the same Occasion: He was conducted to both these Audiences by Sir Charles Cottrel, Master of the Ceremonies.

Windsor, June 22. The following most dutiful and loyal Addresses, congratulating Her Majesty upon the most Glorious and Happy Success of Her Arms and those of Her Allies, and more especially those under the Command of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, have been presented to Her Majesty.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, of the City of Gloucester, in Common Council assembled; presented by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Berkeley, Lord Lieutenant of the County and City of Gloucester.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Common Council, of the City of Bristol, presented by Robert Eyre Esq; their Recorder, introduced by Mr. Secretary Harley.

The humble Address of the Mayor and Commonalty of the City of New Sarum; presented by Robert Eyre and Charles Fox Esqs; their Representatives in Parliament.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Whitehall, June 21. By Letters come in this Evening from on Board the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships before Ostend, Commanded by Sir Stafford Fairbone, we have an Account, That the Trenches were opened before that Place the 17th Instant, O. S. within Pistol-shot of the Covered-way with the Loss of about 50 Men: That they had begun to bombard the Place, and had destroyed several Houses, and put the Inhabitants under great Consternation; and that there was a Scarcity of fresh Water in the Place, which put them to great Inconveniences. They add, That the Garison of Dendermond had desired a Cessation of Arms for 24 Hours, which was granted them.

The Dutch Mails of Tuesday and Friday last are not yet come.
