General Herbeville is made Field-Marshal of the Emperor's Forces in Bavaria, and will be going thither in few Days. Count Reichtzen, the other Mediator, is arrived here from Tirnau.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Helshin, July 26. N. S.
On Tuesday the 20th Instant my Lord Duke of Marlborough entertained the Prince Royal of Prussia with a Review of the second Line of the Army, which was drawn out for that purpose; and his Royal Highness expressed his Satisfaction with seeing the several Regiments so Compleat, and the Troops in so good a Condition. The 21st, part of the Troops appointed for the Siege of Menin marched to Courtray, and the rest followed this Day, under the Command of General Salisch, the whole making 32 Battalions and 25 Squadrons. They encamped at Leuwe, and were to invest the Town the 23d, there being already about 4000 Pioneers at hand; who were immediately employed on the Lines of Circumvallation; and Orders were given for making all the Dispatch possible in bringing up the Artillery and Ammunition from Ghent, which must be brought a great part of the way by Land, for want of Water in the River Lys. The 22d, in the Morning, my Lord Duke went with the Prince Royal to see the Troops of Prussia and Hanover, which are encamped at a small distance behind our second Line; and the whole, both Horse and Foot, appeared compleat, and in very good order. Monsieur d'Auverquerque marched that Day with the Army under his Command from St. Eloy-Vive, and came to Heltre, on the Right of our Camp; and upon a small Motion forward, made by our Army, for the better covering the Siege, those Troops are now come into the Line. The 23d, my Lord Halifax came hither from Holland to wait upon the Duke of Marlborough, with the Earl of Dorset and several other English Gentlemen, who attended his Lordship to Hanover: He intends to leave the Army in two or 3 Days, in order to embark for England. On Saturday his Grace received a Letter from Prince Eugene of Savoy, dated the 10th Instant, giving an Account, That his Troops had passed the Adige; that the Enemy, notwithstanding the advantageous Posts they have been so long intrenching, were retired before them with great Precipitation, having likewise left him Master of the Adigette and Malopera, two other Rivers, and were poited on the Canal Bianco; and that he was preparing to improve this Advantage, of which we hope soon to have a good Account. The same Day Colonel Lalo marched from hence with 3 Battalions of Foot to meet the Boats that were coming up the Lys from Ghent, with part of the Artillery and Ammunition for the Siege of Menin. His Grace had this Morning an Account; That they were arrived yesterday at St. Eloy-Vive; where they are taking some of the Artillery on Shore to be transported by Land, with hopes to carry the rest with the Boats yet much higher, which will save some time.

Hague, July 27. N. S. The Town of Menin was invested the 23d Instant by the Troops under General Salisch, who is to have the Direction of that Siege, which is to be covered by the main Army under the Command of the Duke of Marlborough. The Transport Ships which lately failed from the Texel arrived the 24th at Ostend, where the Troops of this State, designed for the Descent, are to go on board them. Seven English and Fifteen Dutch homeward-bound East-India Ships are safely arrived in the Texel. Letters from France, come in this Day, say, That the King of Spain was arrived at Saragossa: That they talked of changing the Siege of Turin into a Blockade: And that the French Court had been obliged to take off some of the Imposts on the Sea-Coasts, in order to mollify the People, who are exasperated with the heavy Taxes laid upon them, the Loss of their Trade, and the many Hardships they have suffered. It is said, That the Duke of Vendosme is arrived in the Netherlands, in order to command the French Troops on this side. We hear that Three of the French Lieutenant-Generals are broke for Misbehaviour in the Battle of Rammels, two of which are the Count d'Aragnan and Monsieur d'Estain.

Letters from Barcelona give an Account, That they had received there the welcome News of the City of Madrid's having declared for their lawful Sovereign King Charles III. That the City of Saragossa, the Castles of Jaca and Ayaca, and the greatest part of the Kingdom of Arragon, had done the like: Whereupon Count Noyelles and the Prince of Darmstadt were marched from Lerida with some Troops and a Train of Artillery towards Saragossa, to put that Place into a Posture of Defence.

The great want of ready Money in France appears daily more and more. It was some time ago found necessary to set up a Paper Credit, issuing Bills out of the Mint to be current in Payments instead of Money: This proving highly Prejudicial to Trade, a Declaration was published, whereby it was ordained, That all Bills of Exchange drawn upon any Person should be answered part in Money, and the rest in these Bills: But Money is so very scarce, that it has been impossible to comply with this Declaration: And on the other hand the Difficulties which their Traders are brought under by this way of making Payments is such, that the French Ministry are altogether at a loss how to put a stop to this growing Mischiefe, which tends to the entire Ruine of their Commerce.

The King of Prussia has received, by an Express, Letters from the Prince of Anhalt Dessau, who commands His Majesty's Forces in Italy, dated at St. Michael the 16th of July, which contain in Substance: That Prince Eugene having caused a Body of his Troops, under the Command of Colonel Parce, to pass the Adige at Rortra-Nuova, he made the necessary Dispositions for attacking on all sides the Enemy's Army, which lay along the Adige very well entrenched. This Enterprize was happily begun by Colonel Parce, who with his Detachment, consisting only of 2500 Men, went down the Canal de la Tratta to the Canal Bianco; and the Foot, with the Prince of Beveren, Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of Wolfembottle, at their Head pass'd that Canal with all imaginable Bravery. The Enemy fired a few Shot at our Men, upon which the French fled with the greatest Precipitation, leaving behind them their Tents standing, their Provisions, and all they had in their Camp. After this happy success, Prince Eugene sent to view the Po, and detached Lieutenant-Colonel St. Amour with some Troops to pursue the Enemy, and Colonel Parce was ordered to make a Halt near the Po, for the better securing the Passage of the Canal Bianco. Monsieur St. Amour overtook, within 8 Miles of Ostiglia, about 400 of the Enemy's men and wounded Men, guarded by 200 Foot and some Horse; and

had a sharp Dispute with them, and defeated the Enemy, of whom he took about 200, the rest being cut to pieces. Upon this Loss the Enemy on the 13th at Night quitted all their Posts and the Land they had made behind the Adige. The 14th the Prince of Anhalt who had been left at St. Michael's with 28 Battalions and 24 Squadrons, order'd some Troops to cross the Adige, and took Post on the side of that River. The same day he brought down the Bridge Boats from Perona to St. Michael, and the 15th removed it to some of all which he gave Advice to Prince Eugene, who sent him Orders to march on without loss of time towards Badia. According to our Advices, the Enemy are retired behind the Mincio. Some Letters from Prince Eugene laid a Bridge the 16th Instant at Night over the Po.

Portsmouth, July 10. The Rt. Hon. Lieutenant-General Erskine arrived here yesterday in the Afternoon. Sir Cloudesly Shovel came to Town the same Night, and this Morning went and hoisted his Flag on board the Britannia; being saluted at his going from Shore by the Discharge of the Cannon on our Platform.
