Iron the Duke of Savoy's Camp at Bubiane, July 9. N. S.

HE 7th Instant a Body of the Enemy's Troops, under the Command of Monsieur d'Aubererre, confifting of 40 Squadrons and 5 Battalions, marched from Savigliano towards Saluces, where wethen lay, in order to attack us. Ou Duke having Nowethen lay, in order to attack us. Our Duke having Notice of it, ordered his Horse to decamp about Noon, and exceled his advanced Guard from 150 to 350 Horse. The Enemy's Van guard, consisting of 100 Carabiniers, a Regiment of Horse, 3 of Dragoons, and all their Hussen, advanced to our Suburbs; of which our advanced seard disputed the Entrance with them very bravely during an Hour and half, till being overpowered by Number, they were obliged to retire, which they did in very good Order In the mean time the rest of our Troops slide. of towards Cavours; They had several Desiles to pass, but were disposed in so good Order, that the the Enemy attempted several times to fall upon our Rear, they were always repulsed. We came in this manner to the Banks of aways repulled. We came in this manner to the Banks of the Po; and part of our Troops having passed it, among which was Prince Eugene's Regiment, that Regiment was unged in Order of Battle along the Banks of that River, to import the rest of the Troops as they were passing; but the Enemy's Forces coming up, his Royal Highness refixed to repass the River with the said Regiment, and homeother Troops of our Rear, and attack them; which his Banks of the Reavent and Sugars. his Royal Highness did with so much Bravery and Success, that he repulsed the Enemy, took from them two Standards, fit Officers, and 50 private Men Prisoners, and killed and wounded many of them. The Loss on our fide did not exwounded many or them. The Lois on our line out not exced to Men, killed, wounded, or taken. Two Li usemans are reckoned among the latter; a Cornet was killed,
and another was wounded. Prince Emanuel of Soissons
was wounded in the Leg, and the Count d'Ales in the
Thigh. This Action being over, we retired to this Place,
without any turther Ditturbance from the Enemy.

The Collection of Arms between

Vienta, July 28. N S. The Cessation of Arms between the Emperor's Forces and those of the Hungarian Maleconto this being to end this Day, the Envoys of Her Majesty of Great Britain and the States-General, the Mediators for the treating of an Accommodation between this Court and the Malecontents, took their Leave the 21st of Prince Ra-piziat Schinta, and of the Hungarian Depuries at Tirnau, adcame the 22d to Presbourg, and the next Day to this Place. From the Imperial Camp at Stolloffen, August 2. Prince Lewis is gone from hence to Restat, having posted his Troops in the Lines near Buhl and this Place, and lest General Thungen to command in his Absence. Some Registeres are marched from hence, being appointed to reinforce the Emperor's Army in Hungary. The Enemy, have lately taken Post in an Island over against Fort Louis. From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Helebin, August 9. We have the following Journal from the Camp before Monine: The 5th Instant the Enemy made 2 Sally, as we mentioned in our last, with 500 Men of the Garison, beautiful or the same of sides 500 Workmen, with all manner of Too's for the ruining of our Work; but they were immediately repulsed with considerable Loss; and in the Evening the Governor sent out a Drum to desire Leave to bury their Dead, and to make Enquiry after some Officers that were missing. On our side, Colonel Chambrier was wounded in the Thigh, and about 20 Men were killed or wounded. The same Night and about 20 Men were killed or wounded. The tame Night the Parallel was finished between our two Artacks, 48 was likewise a Bridge of 460 Paces over an Inundation of Water the Enemy had mide on the Right, at the Entrance of our Trenches; by means of which all our Troops have now a free Communication one with another. Our Men began this Night to work on the Batteries, and made a considerable Progress. The Enemy made a great Fire with their Bombs and Small Shot, but it did us very little Dammage.

The 6th. A Serjeant who deferted from the Town gave an Account, That the Enemy lost in their first Saly 62 Men, and 4 Officers. The Enemy made a Sally about 6 in the Evening, and another at to; but our Men repulled them both times with great Vigour. The Batteries were carried on this N ght with all manner of Application, most of the Mortars and Hawitzers being placed upon them, and a Communication fecured with the Atrack on the Left, where our Men were before exposed to the Enemy's Fire at their going in and Coming out of the Trenches. The Enemy wounded in the Neck by a Shot from a Deake. The Enemy made a greater Fire than ever with their Small Shot, and killed us 6 Men, and wounded 20. Brigadier Du Troffell received a flight Wound, which however did not hinder his Service in the Trenches.

The 7th, Nothing confiderable passed this Day, except the finishing of a Battery for 44 Mortars, those for the Cannon being likewise in great forwardness. The Garison of Lille marched our towards Ypres; and the Enemy giving out, that the Duke of Vendosme will attempt the Relief of the Place as soon as our Batteries begin to play, Orders were sent to the Peasants of the Chatellenie of Courtray to

The 8th, The Besieged have not made any Sally these Two Days, but fire continually with their Mortars, which do us very little Damage. Brigadier Capol was wounded with a Musket-Ball in his Thigh. Our Loss to this time amounts in the whole to 30 Men killed, and 120 wounded, most of them so slightly, that only 3 are sent to the Hospital

The 9th, at break of Day, we began to fire upon the Place with 60 Pieces of Cannon and 44 Mortars; and to prevent any Defign the Enemy may have to diffurb the Siege, my Lord Duke of Marlborough has ordered Lieutenant-General Fagel to post himself with 12 Battalions of Foot between the Right of our Army and Menin, near Lauwe; where he will be at hand to assist the Besiegers if there should be occasion.
