From the Dake of Savoy's Camp near Bubiane, July 27. N. S. THE 8th Instant we encamped at Bubiane, within two Miles of Lucerne.

The 9th we removed our Camp, and took Post between those two Places. A Party of our Hussars brought in two Officers, whom they had taken Prisoners between Turin and Susa: One of them was Captain of Prince Vaudemont's Swifs Guard; the other was Captain of the Guard to the Duke de la Feuillade; and they were going to compliment the Duke of Orleans at Susa in the Name of their respective Masters. The Enemy continued encamped near Saluces, giving out, that they expected the Duke de la Feuillade with a Reinforcement from the Camp before Turin. We received Advice, That the Duke of Orleans was come to that Camp.

The 11th we had an Account, That he was gone from thence towards Lombardy; and that the Duke de la Feuillade had joined his Detachment at Saluces.

The 12th, upon Advice that the Enemy were advanced to Barges, and in a full March towards us, we retired from Bu-biane to Lucerne: The Horfe and Dragoons difmounted, and their Horfes were fent up into the Mountains. A Difpolition was made for the Defence of the Pofts we had taken near Lucerne at Rora, St. John's, and Angrogne; and the Troops being joined by the Vaudois in Arms, were placed in the re-fective Posts appointed them.

The 13th we had Notice, That the Enemy were at Cahours, and intended to march to Brigueras, between our Camp and Pionerol.

The 14th the Duke de la Feuillade took Post at Brigueras with 5 Battalions; and we had Intelligence, that 3 other Battalions were posted at Bagnoles.

The 15th a Deserter came over to us from Brigueras, by whom, as well as from other Hands, we had an Account, That the Duke de la Feuillade intended to attack us the next day; That he had with him at Brigueras, besides the 5 Battalions above-mentioned, 10 Field pieces, all his Dragoons and part of his Horse dismounted, the rest continuing in their Camp at Cahours, to guard the Horse and Artillery they had lest there; and that two French Battalions were marched to the Valley of St. Martins, to come upon us that way.

The 16th (there happened a Rencounter between the Enemy's Militia and a Party of our Troops, wherein the Commander in Chief of their Militia and many of his Men were taken Prisoners.

The 17th we had an Account, That the French despairing of forcing us in our Posts, had altered their Design, and were going to decamp from Brigueras; upon which Orders were given to setch our Hosses from the Mountains.

The 18th the Enemy marched from Brigueras, and encamped at Osseque.

The 20th they marched from thence, and encamped in two Lines, with their Right near Pignerol; and we received Advice, That part of the Troops they had left near Saluces were marching along the Po towards Turin.

The 22d the Enemy's Troops marched from the Neighbourhood of Pignerol towards Turin.

The 25th we marched from Lucerne, and returned to our former Camp at Bubiane, where we still continue. His Royal Highnels received Letters from Prince Eugenie, with an Account of his having passed the Adige; and that part of his Forces had passed the Po, and taken Post on the other side of that River. that River.

We hear fince, that the Enemy have quitted Mondovi, and the siege of the Castle of Ceva: And we have good Reason to hope, that the Progresses of the Imperial Army under Prince Eugene will oblige the Enemy to draw off so many Troops from before Turin, to reinforce their Army in Lombardy under the Duke of Orleans, that it will not be practicable for them to Castle on these Siege.

Venice, August 6. Prince Eugene, by our last Advices, lay with a Body of the Imperial Troops under his Command at Sana Helaria, the main Body of his Forces being at St. Martino de la Secchia, and another Detrachment at Finale de Modena. The French have abandened Revere, Ostiglia, San Benedetto, and several other Posts which they had sortified; and having drawn all their Troops together, lie encamped between Guastalia and Luzzara, which dast Place is their head Quarter. They write from Genoa, That the French had been obliged to retire from before Ceva, and quit'St. Michel, Mondovi, Fosiano, Savigliano, and several other Posts, to remifere their Aimy before Turin; the Siege of which Place goes on our slowly, the Desiegers suffering much from the frequent vigorous Sallies of the Garison.

From the Duke of Markovengh's Camp at Helchin, August 19.
On Tuesday the 17th my Lord Duke of Markovengh went to the Camp before Menin, to concert with the Departies of the States and the General Officers the necessary Measures for carrying on the Siege of that Place.

Yesterday Morning his Grace ordered the Army to make another Movement, whereby the Right extends to Lauwe, within half a League of Menin, the Lest continuing still at Pont-d'Espieres.

The Troops before Menin having advanced the Saps on the Right and Lest as far as the Saliant-Angles of the Counterscarp, the Disposition was made for attacking it in the Evening: Lieurenant-General Scholten and the Earl of Orkney commanded at their respective Artacks, and each had under him a Major-General and a Brigadier, with 300 Granadiers, as many Workmen, and a Detachment of the like Number of Fusiliers to cover them; the whole being sustained by the 9 Battalions that relieved the Trenches, 4 on the Right, and 5 on the Lest. The Attack began about 7 a Clock, upon a Signal of a Mine we sprung up at each of the Angles. Our Men behaved themselves with so great Bravery, that they soon beat the Enemy out of the Covered-way, with great Slaughter, and made a Lodgment close to the Pailiadoer. The Enemy sprung rwo Mines during the Attack, which did us but little Harm; but we were exposed to the Fire of the Ravelins and other Works for near two Hours, before our People could cover themselves, which occasioned the greatest part of our Loss, whereof we have not yet the Particulars: however we are assured, it was as little as could be expected in so warm a Service; and the Deputies of the States and the Generals have expressed themselves extreamly well pleased with the Gallantry of the Troops on this Occasion.
