Saragossa, July 24. N. S.

THE King of Spain has been received here with all imaginable Demonstrations of Loyalty and Affection. The 20th Instant an Officer arrived here from the Earl of Galway, who left his Excellency with the Portuguese Army 4 days before at Guadalaxara. His Catholick Majesty having sent his Foot before, began his March this day with the Horse, in order to join the Earl of Galway: And we have received Advice, That the Earl of Peterborow is also marching towards Guadalaxara with a considerable Body of Horse and Foot. We have an Account from Rouffillon, That an infectious Distemper reigns in those Parts; that the Garrison of Roses is not free from it; and that there is good Reason to hope that that Place will shortly fall into the Hands of our Troops which were left behind to block it up, the Garrison being reduced to Straights for want of divers Necessaries.

From on board Her Majesty's Fleet commanded by Sir John Leake in Alicante-Road, July 31. O. S. The 28th. past we took the Town of Alicante by Storm, which we found in a great measure destroyed by the Cannon and Bombs from the Fleet. Brigadier Mahoni, who commands the Garrison, retired with his Men into the Castle; but we ply them so warmly with our Cannon and Mortars, that in all probability we shall be Masters of it in a very short time.

Venice, Aug. 13. Our Letters from Lombardy give an Account, That the Imperial Army under the Command of Prince Eugene had taken Carpi and Corregio, and was set down before Reggio. They had removed their pontoons from the Adige to the Po, in order to lay Bridges over that River. The Prince of Hesse is marched from the Veronesi with 5000 Men to Valesio on the Mincio, whither the rest of his Troops are to follow him. The Duke of Orleans with the French Army continued at Guastalla, his Left Wing extending to the Po, and his Right to the Crostolo. He has laid several Bridges over the Po, and has sent his heavy Baggage to Cremona; And fearing that Place may be attacked by the Imperialists, his, for the better securing it, caused the Sluices to be opened, and the adjacent Country to be laid under Water. General Toralbi with the Spanish Troops was posted along the Oglio near Palazzuolo; and General Medavi was marching with a Detachment from the Duke of Orleans's Army to join him, and enable him to make head against the Prince of Hesse, whose Design seems to be to advance thro' the Breiscian towards the Milanese.

Vienna, August 14. The 9th Instant Count Rechteren, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General, left this Place, in order to return to Holland. The 11th the Prince of Lorraine set out from hence for his Bishoprick of Osnabrug: He stands a Candidate to succeed in the See of Munster, where the Chapter is to proceed to an Election the 26th Instant. The 15th a Party of Hungarians, commanded by Baron Orzkai, passed the River Mark, and committed some Disorders on the frontiers of Moravia; but were soon obliged to retire. Yesterday a B. dy of 8000 Men, whereof 1000 are Germans, and the rest Croats, Wallachians and Rascians, commanded by General Palfi, joined Field Marshal General Staremberg at Brugg on the River Leitha, who intends to march out of the Lines to-morrow; And it is generally believed that he designs to relieve Gran, which Place has been besieged by the Malcontents ever since the beginning of this Month, Prince Ragotzi being in Person before it. We have no late Advices from the Imperial Army in Transilvania, under the Command of General Rabutin, which was to march from thence the 25th past. Our Letters from Italy give an Account that the Imperial Army under Prince Eugene passed the Secchia at St. Martin the 29th past; and that on the 5th Instant he made himself Master of Carpi di Modena, where he met with very little Resistance, about 300 of the Enemy who were in Garrison there surrendering themselves Prisoners of War. The day following he encamped between Reggio and Novellara, within 2 Miles of the French Army, which lay between Guastalla and Gualtieri.

Hanover, August 27. N. S. The King of Prussia and the Prince Royal his Son arrived at Fernhaufen the 25th Instant. The Elector of Hanover met him a German Mile beyond that Place, and conducted his Majesty to the Apartment which had been prepared for his Reception. His Majesty proceeds to-morrow towards Berlin; but the Prince Royal his Son intends to continue at this Court some time longer.

Falmouth, Aug. 24. The King Charles the Third, a Dutch Privateer, sailed hence the 22d Instant to cruise. At the same time came in the Tuscany Galley, Thomas Panuelli, and the Pearl Galley, Benjamin Brewer, Commanders, both belonging to London, and homeward bound with Oyl, Wine and other Goods, from Leghorn; and they sailed again last Night, in order to proceed on their Voyage.

Plimouth, August 25. Yesterday sailed hence two Dutch Men of War, with 40 Sail of Merchant-men, some bound to London, the rest for Holland. The same day sailed the Grey-board of London, homeward bound from Guinæa.

Dartmouth, Aug. 26. A Fleet of Dutch Prizes and Coasters from Falmouth and Plimouth; under Convoy of some Dutch Men of War and Privateers, passed by our Harbour this Morning, and was joined by 6 Prizes, which had been sent in here at several times by the Dutch Privateers.

Tarmouth, Aug. 26. A Fleet of laden Colliers passed thro' our Road yesterday to the Southward. Several light Colliers are lately come in from the Southward, which are detained here by contrary Wind.

Portsmouth, Aug. 27. Her Majesty's Ship the Rye, Captain Vernon Commander, arrived yesterday at Spithead from the Fleet under Sir John Leake, and brings an Account of their having taken the Town of Alicante; and that the Castle would in all probability be soon obliged to surrender. Divers Merchant-men, bound for the River, passed by this Port at the same time to the Eastward.

Windsor, Aug. 23. Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to continue the Rt. Hon. Thomas Lord Wharren Warden, Chief Justice, and Justice in Eyre, of all Her Majesty's Forests, Chafes, Parks and Warrens, on this side Trent.

Windsor, Aug. 24. Her Majesty has been graciously pleased, under Her Signet, to approve of the Rt. Hon. Henry Lord Walden as Deputy to his Grace Thomas Duke of Norfolk, Earl-Marshal, and Hereditary Marshal of England, for executing the said Office of Marshal of England.
