to consider of them, and to solvife whither they are consistent with his Power and Prerogative, which gives us here no small diffatisfaction.

Hamburgh, Dec. 10. From several parts of the Empire we are informed that many Emilaries are endeavouring to dwert the Princes and Electors of the Empire from their Concurrence with the Agreement of the General Diet for raising forces for the security of the Empire, but its believed the work is so well advanced as not to be frustrated by any private machinations.

The Deputies of the Psince Elector Palatine and Duke of Lorrain continue their Conferences, and tis believed with good effect, having propoled an exchange of the County of Falkenstein for the Provostinip of Salez, endeavouring to satisfy the Bishop of Spire for his presentance.

Bruffels, Det. 17. Several informations have been taken for the discovery of the persons that were concerned in the affasinate of Don Juan de Toledo, but as yet without any success; this Fact has wrought so great an apprehension in the Members of the Council, that they have since thought for to retire thems lives in better time to their houses, that they may not by their late say give an opportunity to any ill-affected persons to offer them violence.

Yesterday the Constable of Castille was pleased so deliver to the Count de Sorre of the hous of Croy His most Christian Majestles Decuration for the taking of the Se questration from the Estates lying within the Erench jurisdiction, whose Proprietors has a their Resi ence in the Spanish Quarters, to which we are told, obedience is gi-

ven in all parts.

On Monday last arrived here from Span by Post, a Courier with the Queens Letters and dispatches for the Prince de Ligne to be Vicerey of sicily, who is accordingly preparing for his voyage thither; and may set forwards immediately after the Holidays, and the Count de Monterey designed to succeed him here in his Charge of General of the Horse.

Sir Mark d' Ognate is designed to be sent into England in the place of the lately murthered Des Juan de Te-

tede.

The 12th infant we had here a warm allarum given us, that the French were in a body of about Ten thou-fand men within three Leagues of Ghens, bending their course, towards Aloft, which intelligence caused the Confable to command all Officers to repair immediately to their respective Charges, and to take care that the soldiers might in all places be in readiness to march upon the first Orders, but we are since satisfied of the vanity of our sears the French designe in appearance being nothing more then onely to change their Quatters and to gather in the acters of Contribution from the Countrey.

The States of Erabant have had several debates upon the allowance they are to make for the maintenance of their proportion of the Militia for the defence of the Mother-Mands, and tis believed may resolve upon the summe of

1200 thouland Francs.

Mague, Decemb. 17. The States are daily preparing for the security of the Frontiers, having particularly given Order for the Fortiscation of several Towns of Overystel, and upon the borders of Wesphalia. They intend also to fend several of their Forces to Beiledue, and Sas Van Gens, and to double the Garrisons upon the Frontiers; and have eauled Letters to be Written to the several Provinces, to invite them to come to such Resolution as may be of most advantage to the Publick Sasety, considering the present po-flure of Assairs.

This day the Officers taken into the Service of the States took their Oaths of Fidelity, and put in Socurity for performance of their Agreements, and particularly for the bringing their feveral Companies to a Rendezvous at the time appointed: The Principal Officers are as fol-

Since this they have made choice of two other Collonels of Foot, Viz. Comis de Nassow, and the Barold de Chauset, who the next week may nominate their substitute Officers, who as well as those before mentionels, according to Order to give proofe of their Abilities by Exerciting Companies before several Persons of greatest abilities in Martial Affairs, and to give sufficient testimony of their sommer-Services in the Warr.

Edenbourgh , Decemb. &. This day was published here an Act for the Naturalization of strangers within the Kingdome of scotland, declaring. That all firangers of the Protestant Religion, that shall think fit to bring their Estates into the said Kingdome, or shall come to set up new Works and Manufocturies therein, Shall be Naturaliz'd, as Native-born Subjects of the faid Kingdom to all intents and purposes. His Majesty Declaring, That upon Application made unto His by such strangers , be wil grant unto them the Free and Publick Exercise of their Religion in their own Language, and the Liberty of having churches within the Isid Kingdome of Scote land; but no persons to have the benefit of the like Ad untill fish by Petition to the Lords of His Majestics Privy Council, Containing an exact Defignation of their Names, places of their Birth and former Residence, and that they are of the protestant Religion, it be found by the Council that they are qualify'd according to the faid Act, and ought to have the benefit thereof. Farther Declaring, That the faid Ad, with an Exualt of the Act of Council in their Favour, shall be to them a sufficient Naturalization; Which Extract shell be given to them freely, without payment of any stoney or Compolition, lave onely the Fee of Nine pounds Stats Momey to the Clerks of the Counsel and their servants

Plymouth, Decemb. 10. On Wednesday last arrived here one Ship of this Town for Portugal, and 3 others from Malaga; here is also put in one Dutch Merchant ship, laden with Sugar and Tobacco, homewards

bound.

Lyme, Decemb. 11. The 8th Instant put in here by contrary Winds the Margares of Topham homewards bound from Retterdam, informing us, That the Dutch feem very apprehensive of the Great Preparations making by the French both by See and Land, and have up on that account given Order for the Securing of their Frontire Towns, and new Forming their Militia, having entertained 400 Officers, and given them Commission to raise Men for their Service.

The th Instant same in the Lilly-Rose from Mericia, telling us, That some dayes before the sailed thence a Monseur de la Rosho arrived there, having been employed in visiting the Coasts, and Listing the Seamen into His Majesties Service, the whole number of them being computed to consist of 26 Thousand Men; a third part of whom are by turns to serve yearly about His Majestics Men of Warr, and the rest of the time to be at liberty to take employment amongst the Merchants, but so, as alwayes to be in a readinals to serve in their Course.
