From the King of Poland's Camp at Wolpa, 6 Leagues from Grodno, August 4. N. S.

WE are come hither from Grodno, and shall shortly continue our March, in order to join the Muscovite Army, which is at Bickow, and consists of 60000 Men. Letters from thence give an Account, That the Sieur Siniecki, General of the Artillery, whom the King sent lately to concert Matters with the Czar, was arriv'd there, and had been several times in Conference with him; and that a Detachment of 5000 Muscovite Horse and 5 Regiments of Foot, under the Command of Major-General Garbowa, was march'd from thence to observe the Swedish Troops towards Piosko. The King of Sweden with his Army has been at Lublin, and is marching towards the Frontiers of Poland. The Confederated Nobility who are in his Interest demanded a Contribution of 120000 Guilders from the Palatinate of Lublin for the Subsistence of their Troops; but have contented themselves with 50000 Guilders, which the Inhabitants have been forced to raise for that purpose. They had summoned a Diet of that Palatinate, to meet about this time; but have put it off to the latter end of the next Month. They have plundered and burnt the Town of Kurow, and its Dependencies; as also several Villages about Lublin, which belonged to the Weywod Talow, the Castellan of Lublin, and several others of the Nobility who continue in the King's Interest. The Swedish Forces commanded by General Reinschild are in the Neighbourhood of Lowitz.

Dantzick, August 25. A large French Ship which sail'd from hence 3 days ago, richly laden, met with bad Weather, and was forced ashore yesterday near Heel, and bulged: A Swedish Ship, and another belonging to Lubeck, were also cast away in the same Storm. Letters from Poland say, That the King of Sweden decamp'd from Wolnoniz the 15th Instant, and march'd towards Kalisch. The King of Poland is marching to join the Czar of Muscovy, who is come into Lithuania with an Army of about 60000 Men. General Levenhaupt, who commands the Swedish Forces on that side, has drawn them together, and observes their Motions. They write from Lemberg, That the Cossacks have lately plundered and burnt two small Towns in that Palatinate.

Vienna, August 21. The Emperor has advanced General Taun; who now commands his Forces, and those of the Duke of Savoy, at Turin, to the Post of General of the Artillery; and the Count de Fels to that of Lieutenant Field Marshal-General. Count Nicholas Palfy, who was Colonel of a Regiment of Heydukes in the Emperor's Service, being lately dead of a Fever, the Emperor intends to bestow that Commission upon the Prince d'Elbeuf. Baron Freybergh, Envoy from the Bishop of Aichstet, has in his Master's Name received from his Imperial Majesty the Investiture of that Principality. Count Kuffstein, chief Commissary at War, went from hence the 17th Instant towards Lintz, to review the Regiments that are coming from the Rhine, to reinforce the Imperial Army in Hungary under the Command of General Staremberg. Count Leopold Palfy, Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment de la Tour, came lately with some Dispatches from that General, giving an Account of the Posture of Affairs in those Parts; and has since been sent back with further Instructions to him upon that Subject. Letters from Hungary say, That General Staremberg has sent a Detachment to the Relief of the Castle of Gran, which is hard pressed by the Malecontents, who are Masters of

the Town. A Detachment of their Troops attempted lately to force our Lines along the River Morava, near Ghesting, which are guarded by a Body of Militia, who made so good a Defence, that the Enemy were forced to retire with the Loss of 200 Men killed upon the Spot, and many wounded.

Falmouth, Sept. 5. The Seven Provinces, a Privateer belonging to Flushing, came in here the 2d Instant from cruising. The 4th the Jealousy, another Dutch Privateer, of 10 Guns, brought in here as Prize the America of Rochell, homeward bound with a Cargo of Sugar and Cotton from Guadalupa. This day the Concord, another Dutch Privateer, sail'd out to cruise; and the Prince Packet-Boat arriv'd here from Lisbon, having been 8 days in her Passage.

Dover, September 9. A Transport-ship is come in here from Calais with exchanged Prisoners, by which we have an Account, that it was generally reported there, That the Imperial Army in Italy, under the Command of Prince Eugene, had entirely routed the French Army commanded by the Duke of Orleans; 8000 of the Enemy (among whom were the Marshal de Marfin, and several Officers of Note,) being killed upon the Spot, and all their Cannon, Ammunition and Baggage, taken: That Prince Eugene had join'd the Duke of Savoy; and that the Siege of Turin was rais'd.

Portsmouth, Sept. 10. Her Majesty's Ships the Triton and Milford sail'd from Spithead the 5th Instant in the Afternoon, in order to join Her Majesty's Fleet at Torbay. The same day two Dutch Men of War sail'd from St. Hellens, with about 50 Sail of English and Dutch Merchant-men and other Vessels bound for the Downes. The 6th Her Majesty's Ship the Royal Sovereign sail'd out of our Harbour to Spithead, whither Her Majesty's Ship the Centurion came the 8th from Torbay.
