Whitehall, September 14.

WE have this Day received the Confirmation of the great and signal Victory wherewith it has pleased God to bless the Arms of Her Majesty and Her Allies in Italy. Prince Eugene had joined the Duke of Savoy before the Battle, which happened the 7th Instant. The Enemy were totally routed, a great Number of their Men, several of them Officers of Note, were slain, their Cannon and Bagage taken, and many were made Prisoners, among whom is the Marshal de Marsin, who was wounded with a Shot in his Thigh, which it is thought will prove mortal. The Duke of Orleans had also very dangerous Contusions from several Shot he received upon his Armour. This glorious Success (under God) is owing to the great Conduct and Bravery of the Duke of Savoy and Prince Eugene, who animated the Troops by their own Example, exposing their Persons in Places where was most Danger; and was attended with the raising the Siege of Turin.

Upon the Receipt of this News at the French Court, the Marshal de Catinat was immediately sent away to Italy to supply the Place of the Marshal de Marsin.

The 9th Instant, N. S. the Count de Medavi surprised the Prince of Hesse, beat his advanced Guards, and took 6 Pieces of Cannon. The Particulars of this Action, as well as of the Victory, we expect by the Holland Mails, of which Five were due yesterday.

Dendermonde, which had been besieged since the 29th of the last Month, capitulated the 5th Instant, N. S. and immediately after the Surrender of that important Place, Aeth was besieged, which in all probability could hold out but a few Days.

They wrote from Spain, That the Duke of Berwick was detached from the Duke of Anjou's Army, to cover Salamanca from any Attempts that might be made by the Forces sent that way from Portugal.

The Earl of Galway had sent away his heavy Bagage; and it was believed, the two Armies being so near one another, and both in Motion, a Battle would soon ensue.

Ratisbon, Aug. 26. N. S. The Regiment of Dragoons of Wolfkehl came by Water the 22d Instant to this Place, and is since gone down the Danube, in order to its being sent to Hungary, to join the Imperial Army in that Country. The Imperial Diet, which has been adjourned some Days, will meet again to-morrow. The Elector of Mentz's Deputy is expected here in a Day or two from his Electoral Highness's Court; as is also the Sieur Jodoci from Dusseldorp, who is appointed by the Emperor to be one of his Deputies at the Diet.

Calogue, September 1. N. S. The French Party-man Le Croix passed the Rhine lately between this Place and Bon with a strong Party of Horse, and attempted to make an Excursion into the Country of Berg, but met with so warm a Reception from some few regular Troops and Militia which were posted on that side, that he was soon obliged to retire, leaving behind him several of his Men slain, and others who were taken Prisoners. The French Parties having lately been very troublesome in these Parts, and advanced as far as Mulheim, some Works are casting up about that Place for its Security, and a Fort is building over against it on this side the Rhine. A Regiment of Horse of the King of Prussia's Forces is also shortly expected in these Parts, which is to be posted in such Places as lie most convenient for preventing the Enemy's Excursions.

Plimouth, September 10. Her Majesty's Ship the Worcester, Captain Canninge Commander, failed from hence the 7th Instant to cruise; and Yesterday, off the Deadman, took another Privateer belonging to

St. Malo, of 14 Guns and 84 Men, called the Marquis de Chiang, Rene Descoinetes Commander, a new built Ship, that had not been above 4 Days off the Stocks, and was sent out to get Intelligence of Her Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Sir Cloudesly Shovel.

Tarmouth, September 13. The 11th Instant the Eastland Fleet, with their Convoys, failed out of our Road to the Southward; as did at the same time several laden Colliers, bound for the River Thames; and Yesterday about 50 Sail more of laden Colliers passed also through our Road to the Southward. Divers light Colliers that came lately into our Road from the Southward failed hence this Day for Newcastle. Her Majesty's Ship the Merlin Sloop came this Day into our Road from the Southward, being appointed one of the Convoys for our Herring Fishery.

Kensington, September 13. Monsieur Bonnet, Resident from his Majesty the King of Prussia, had this Day a private Audience of Her Majesty, and afterwards of his Royal Highness the Prince of Denmark: To both which Audiences he was introduced by Charles Cottrell Esq; Assistant-Master of the Ceremonies.

Her Majesty and his Royal Highness returned this Day to Windsor.

Windsor, September 15. The following most dutiful and loyal Addresses, congratulating Her Majesty upon the most glorious and happy Successes of the Arms of Her Majesty and Her Allies, and more especially those under the Command of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, have been presented to Her Majesty.

The humble Address of the Bayliffs, Aldermen, Free Burgesses, and other Inhabitants, of the ancient Corporation of Moweth in the County of Northumberland: Presented by Mr. Secretary Harley, in the Absence of the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Carlisle.

The humble Address of the Representatives in Parliament, the Burgesses, and other Inhabitants, of the ancient Borough of Northallerton in the North-Riding of the County of York: Presented by Sir William Husler, one of their Representatives in Parliament; introduced by Mr. Secretary Harley.

Both which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c. Lord High Admiral of England, &c. is pleased to direct, That the Men which did belong to Her Majesty's late Ships the Winchelsea and Squirrel, as they return from France, do repair aboard the Winchelsea, a new Ship, built by Mr. Johnson, at Blackwall, now at Woolwich; and those which do belong to the Deale Castle and Ferret-Sloop, aboard the Deale Castle, another new Ship, built by Mr. Burchett, at Deptford, and now at that Place, in order to their serving in those Ships respectively; on board of which his Royal Highness has ordered their Wages to be paid before they sail from the Shore.

If any Able-bodied Men are willing to serve Her Majesty in the Train of Artillery, let them repair to Capt. Silver, Master-Gunner of England, at his House in St. James's Park, or at the Exercise on Black-Heath, they shall enter into present Pay of Seven Shillings a Week, and be further encouraged and advanced as they shall deserve.
