The QUEEN has been graciously pleased to approve the award of the British Empire Medal for Gallantry (Military Division) to the undermentioned:

Petty Officer Engineering Mechanic Robert William Sharples, P/KX 894750, H.M.S. FALMOUTH.

At 0022 on 5th December 1961, H.M.S. FALMOUTH was in collision with a Royal Fleet Auxiliary while taking part in an Anti-Submarine exercise. The night was dark, the sea was rough and there was a Force 10 gale blowing. The ship was extensively holed on the an officer was trapped in a damaged outboard cabin. The ship was rolling heavily. As sections of the side were open to the sea there was a considerable free surface of water and oil surging across the cabin flat deck.

Petty Officer Engineering Mechanic Sharples went Petty Officer Engineering Mechanic Shaples went immediately with a repair party to the scene of the damage. He at once sent for hammocks with which he plugged the hole. While doing this he narrowly avoided being washed out into the sea. Afterwards in spite of being thrown back repeatedly by the force of the seas he held the outboard hammocks in place until shoring was established. He was in a cramped position among torn metal. There was little lighting, a variety of unpleasant fumes and a considerable risk from fires caused by parted electrical leads. Although already fully occupied he continued to

Although already fully occupied he continued to lead his party and displayed an infectious cheerful-ness. His cheerfulness and leadership in a hazardous situation was an example to all and contributed materially to the effectiveness of Damage Control and saying of the life of an officer.
