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Newmarket, October 5.

**T**HIS Day Dr. Fisher, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Cambridge, with the Heads of Colleges, and other Members of that University, attended the Queen here, and in a most dutiful and loyal Speech welcomed Her Sacred Majesty into these Parts of Her Kingdom; congratulating the repeated unparalleled Successes of Her Majesty's Forces, Her Auspicious Reign being indeed but one continued Scene of Victories and Triumphs: After which he pray'd for Her Majesty's long Life, that She might enjoy in Her own Sacred Person, as well as ensure to all, the Blessings of Peace, and a lasting Security both in Church and State: Concluding with Assurances of all that steady Loyalty and Obedience the best and most gracious of Queens might justly expect from Subjects under the utmost Obligations of Duty and Gratitude.

To which Her Majesty was pleas'd to return a most Gracious Answer; That She took this Respect of Her University very kindly, and they might depend upon Her Protection.

After which they waited upon the Prince, and with all imaginable Duty, and Respect, in the Name of the University, welcomed his Royal Highness, who received them with particular Marks of Favour and Esteem.

They had the Honour of being introduced, both to Her Majesty and to his Royal Highness, by his Grace the Duke of Somerset, their Chancellor: And they were afterwards, by Order from Her Majesty, splendidly entertained by the Board of Green Cloth.

**Lisbon, October 1. N. S.** An Officer is lately arriv'd here from the Confederate Army in Spain, who brings an Account, That our Troops pass'd the Tejo the 9th of the last Month at Fonte-Duena. The Enemy attempt'd to fall upon their Rear; but Care having been taken to send over the Artillery first, and to plant Batteries along the River side, their Fire soon oblig'd the Enemy to retire. From Fonte-Duena the Army march'd to Barajas, and came the 12th to Veles, where it was join'd by General Windham with 3000 English from Huec. Then our Troops continuing their March towards the Frontiers of Valentia, pass'd the River Xucar the 15th, on which Day this Gentleman left them. They were to be put into Quarters of Refreshment in the several Towns lying between Cucena and Valverde. The Enemy had pass'd the Tejo at Aranjuez; and were advanced to Ocanna. This Officer having Letters from the Marquis de Minas to the Viscount de Fonté Arcada, who commands that Body of our Troops which was employ'd in the Expedition upon Salamanca, went thither, and after he had deliver'd them, continu'd his Journey to this Place. The Viscount de Fonté Arcada, upon the Receipt of these Letters from the Marquis de Minas, resolv'd to return to Ciudad Rodrigo, where he continues encamp'd. A considerable Sum of Money, with other Supplies for our Army, is sent from hence by Sea for Valentia. There is an Account from Alicant, That Sir John Leake, with the Confederate Fleet under his Command, was fail'd towards the Islands of Ivica and Minorca.

**Venice, October 2.** Signior Ruzzini arriv'd here from his Embassy to the Ottoman Porte the 23d past, with two Men of War, which had been sent to Tenedos to attend him in his Passage. His Excellency and his Retinue are gone into the old Lazaretto, to perform their Quarantine. They bring an Account, That one Devali Aga has excit'd a great Revolt in Asia, and propos'd to depose the present Sultan, and to set up in his room Ibrahim his Nephew, who is about 15 Years of Age. Letters from Rovigo say, That the Prince of Hesse, with the Forces under his Command, being march'd from the Polesine, with intent to pass the Po near Figuarola, he receiv'd an Order from Prince Eugene; upon which he made a halt, and continues encamp'd near Canda.

**Munich, Oct. 2.** Our Letters from Italy bring the following Account of the Glorious Progresses of the Confederate Troops in that Country: That the Enemy abandon'd Pignerol on the 12th of the last Month, Ivrea the 13th, Vercelli the 14th, Trino the 15th, and Chivas was taken the 16th, the Garrison of which Place remain'd Prisoners of War, and the Allies found great Stores of Ammunition there. On the 20th Novara was surrendr'd to them; on the 21st Crescentino, and the Fort de Bar; the 24th the Magistrates of the City of Milan made their Submission; and the 25th the Castle also capitulated, wherein were two French and one Spanish Battalion, which all remain Prisoners of War. The Prince of Vaudemont was at Picighitronne, near which Place General Medavi lay with a Body of 14 or 15000 Men.

**Vicenza, October 2.** Prince Pio arriv'd here yesterday from the Army near Milan, with an Account of the further happy Consequences that have attend'd the late glorious Victory in Italy, in the reducing the City and Duchy of Milan: Of which he brings the following Particulars:

The necessary Dispositions being made to prevent the Enemy's returning into Piedmont, the Army march'd from Turin the 15th of September to Brandis, the 14th to Rodislon, the 15th to Cigliano, the 16th the Army rest'd, the 17th it came to St. Germano, the 18th to Vercelli, the 19th to Camerano, and the 20th into the Neighbourhood of Novara. In the mean time a Detachment of our Troops took Chivas, and in that Place a Magazine the Enemy had erect'd there; the Garrison, consisting of 1400 French, remain'd Prisoners of War. Our Forces also took possession of Ivrea and Vercelli, which last Place the Enemy had dismantled before they quitted it. The Town of Novara being one of the principal Fortresses of the Milanese, at first made some Resistance; but after three Days Siege, the Burglers and other Inhabitants disarm'd the French who were there in Garrison, to the Number of 4 or 500, and oblig'd them to surrender at Discretion. The 22d the Army encamp'd at Trecate; the 23d at the Torre di Buffalo; and the 24th at Corfico, where the Troops rest'd the Day following. The Conde de Beaufort, Adjutant-General, was sent from thence with a Trumpeter to Milan; upon whose Arrival the Senate met, and in less than half an Hour's time deputed two of their Body, the Condes Baptista Scotti, and Uberto Stampa, to the Duke of Savoy's Camp, to make their Submission; which was done accordingly. Prince Vaudemont had left the Place some time before, and retir'd to Picighitronne, near Cremona, where he had been join'd by the French General Medavi with the Troops under his Command. Prince Pio left the Army the 26th, which was then marching towards Pavia.

**Copenhagen, October 9.** The Queen of Denmark was happily deliver'd of a Daughter the 3d Instant, and the same Evening the young Princess was christen'd, and named Charlotta Amalia. According to our Advices from Saxony, Matters on that side seem to be in a fair way of Accommodation.

**From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Gramez, October 11:** His Grace continues, with the Army under his Command, in this Camp, and the Army command'd by Monsieur d'Auverquerque between Molley and Aubre; but to morrow the Artillery and heavy Bagage are to pass the Dender at Leuze; and the next Day the whole Army will follow, in order to take the Camp of Cambrou.

The Enemy are likewise still in their former Camp, between Mortagne and Querrechia.

**From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Cambrou, October 14.** Yesterday Morning the Army command'd by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough march'd from Gramez, and having pass'd the Dender near Leuze, was join'd by the Army under the Command of Monsieur d'Auverquerque. The French had given out, That they would fall upon our Rear at Leuze; but the necessary Precautions being taken to secure our selves against such an Attempt, the Enemy did not think fit to appear. The two Armies being join'd, the whole came and encamp'd together on the Plains of Cambrou, with the Right at Chierre, and the Left at Lens, the head Quarter being at the Abbey of Cambrou, within two Leagues and an half of Mons.

**Hague, October 15. N. S.** Letters from the Army give an Account of their being encamp'd in the Plains of Cambrou; and that a Detachment was to be sent to Courtray, to put that Place into a good Posture of Defence. The Earl of Portland fail'd from the Brill the 13th Instant, as did also a Fleet of Merchant-ships bound for England, under Convoy of several Men of War. Mr. Pulteney, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy to the King of Denmark, is lately arriv'd here from England, in order to proceed on his Journey for Copenhagen.

**Falmouth, October 6.** The Queen Packet-Boat arriv'd here this Day from Lisbon: The Passengers on board her report, That the Armies in Spain were gone into Quarters of Refreshment. The Unity, a Dutch Privateer, is also come in, having taken two French Prizes, homeward bound from Newfoundland; one of which he ransom'd, and sent the other to Lisbon.

**Plymouth, October 6.** The 2d Instant Her Majesty's Ships the Orford, York and Dunkirk, fail'd hence to join Her Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Sir Cloudesly Shovel. This Day came in the St. Bernard of London from Bilbao.

**Portsmouth, October 8.** Her Majesty's Ship the Edgar arriv'd at Spithead yesterday Morning from Lisbon. The Ranelagh and the Bedford pass'd by at the same time, having under their Convoy about 40 Sail of Merchant-men, bound from thence to the Downs.
