PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas a Representation duly made to Her Majesty in Council by the Minister of Housing and Local Government that, for the protection of the Public Health, burials should be discontinued as hereinafter directed in that part of the Churchyard of St. Helen, Pinxton, in the county of Derby, shown coloured red on the plan annexed hereto, has in pursuance of an Order in Council made the 28th day of March 1962, and duly published, been taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council:

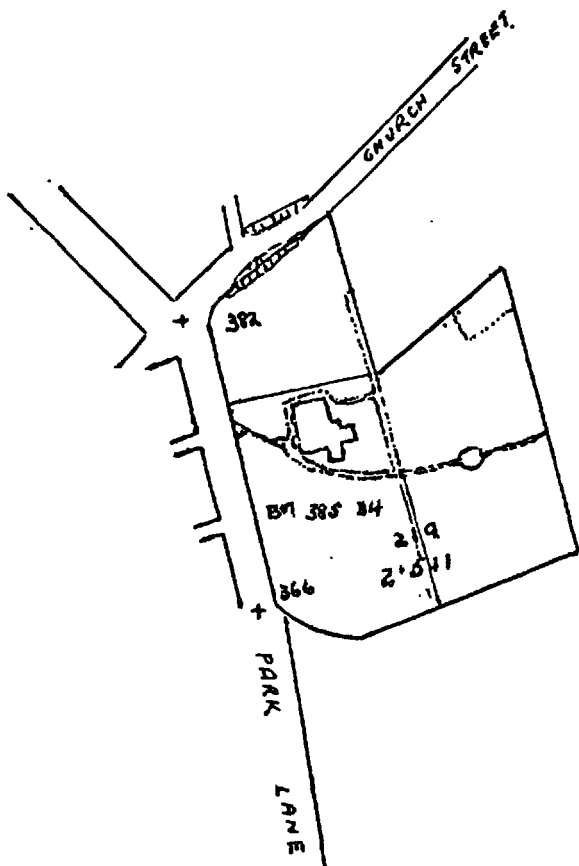
Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred on Her by section one of the Burial Act, 1853, 16 & 17 Vict. c. 134, and of all other powers Her enabling, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith and entirely in that part of the Churchyard of St. Helen, Pinxton in the county of Derby, shown coloured red on the plan annexed hereto:

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. Helen's Churchyard, Pinxton, Derbyshire) Order, 1962.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas the Minister of Housing and Local Government, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Parish of St. Alban's, Felling, Gateshead, County Durham, ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to Her Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the Public Health, burials should be discontinued forthwith and entirely in St. Alban's Churchyard, Felling, Gateshead, in the said County.

Provided that—

(a) In any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

(b) In the said Churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 10th day of August next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation one month before the said 10th day of August.
