Spain:
The 24th of June, N. S. the City of Madrid fubmitted to
King Charles III. upon the Approach of the Confederate Army

Several Expresses and divers Parties of Horse were immediately dispatched to the King of Spain, some by the way of Valentia, others by Arragon, to hasten his coming to his Capital City, with as many Troops as he could; for the Enemy's Army which had been employed in the Siege of Barcelona marching with great Diligence thro' Navarre to get back to Castile, and the Body commanded by the Conde de las Torrès having joined the Duke of Berwick, as the rest of their Troops which were in the several Provinces had likewise done, it was necessary we should also draw all our Forces together, to preserve our Superiority, or at least to prevent the Enemy's outnumbering us. His Catholick Majesty being Proclaimed at Madrid, many considerable Towns tollowed this Example, and declared for him.

In the mean time the Duke of Anjou was got to Atiençe, within 20 Leagues of Madrid, and at the Entrance of the Mountains of Old Castile, where he had 5000 Horse and 16 Battalions of Foot.

History Tumults, raised by the Rabble, the most considerable among the Spaniards being satisfied that the Reports of the King's Death were false, and still giving us Assurances of their Loyalty to him, we did not doubt but his Presence would restore all. From Prince Eugene's Camp near Alexandria, Octob. 22. N. S.
The 13th Instant we came before Tortona; and the Prince of Darmstad was sent with our Horse to invest Alexandria. The 15th the City of Tortona surrendied to us; and the Garison retiring into the Castle, we left a Detachment to beliege it, and marched towards Alexandria. The 16th we passed the Bormia. The 17th we came within 400 Paces of Alexandria, and formed the Siege of that Place. The 20th Count Martigni was sent with a Detachment to take Saravella, who has since made himself Masser of the Town; but the Enemy are still in possession of the Castle, which however it is believed they cannot keep long. This Morning arrived here Berlin, November 2. the Sieur Spiegel, Gentleman of the Chamber to the King of Poland, with Advice, That on the 29th past his Majesty descated General Mardeveldt, who was posted with 7 Regiments of Swedish Horse and 3 of Foot near Kalisch in Great Poland. The King of Poland's Army confifted of 5000 Saxons, 6000 Poles, and 9000 Muscovites. General Mardeveldt was taken Prisoner, and the Fight is said to have been very bloody; for the Poles and Muscovites gave no Quarter. The Sieur Spiegel further reports, That the Palatine of Kiow, coming to join Monsieur Mar-

develdt with 6000 Poles, was likewise descated.

The 27th Instant my Lord Duke of Marlborough, attended by Mr. Stepney, Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary, and several General Officers, came hither from the Camp at Ghieslinghien. His Grace was met at some distance from the Town by General Churchill, Count Zinzendorf, and other Persons of Quality, with whom his Grace, at the re-peated Request of the Magistrates, made his Entry on Horseback: At the Anderlech-Port his Grace was received by the Burgomaster and Magistrates, who there presented him the Keys of Honour, and made him a very handsome Speech, expressing their Grati-tude to Her Majesty of Great Britain and the Eng-lish Nation, and to his Grace, the Glorious Instru-ment of their Deliverance. The Streets through ment of their Deliverance. which his Grace passed were filled with a great Concourse of Nobility and Gentry, and lined with the Burghers under Arms. The People made loud Acclamations, and gave all other Demonstrations of Joy; the Cannon in the mean time firing from the Ramparts; and the same Honours were paid to his Grace as were formerly to the Dukes of Burgundy. His Grace alighted at the Palace of Orange, where he was complimented by the Council of State, the States of Brabant, and the Chief of the Clergy. The 28th in the Morning the Magistrates waited on his Grace again in a Body, and presented him with what they call the Wine of Honour, which was brought in a Tun gilded and painted with his Grace's Arms, upon a Carriage, with Streamers, drawn by Six Horses, preceded by Trumpets and Kettle-Drums, and attenated by a Cavalcade of young Students on Horseback, finely Cloathed, with Devices in their Hands in Honour of his Grace, and representing the great Actions of this Campaign. This Day his Grace set out from hence, on his Return to the Army, having, during his Stay here, received all possible Marks of Honour and Respect from the whole City.
