#### The Albert Medal

Mr. Stanley Charles Logan (deceased), Chief Engineer m.v. "Capetown Castle".

When the "Capetown Castle" was approaching Las Palmas in the course of a voyage from Capetown to Southampton there was a violent explosion in the engine room, which resulted in serious injuries to a number of the engine room staff: two of them died in the ship and five others, including Mr. Logan, died in hospital ashore.

At the time of the explosion Mr. Logan was at the starboard engine controls and he received the full force of the blast and the sheet of flame that accompanied it, and his clothes were burned from his body.

In spite of intense pain, he stayed at his post. The explosion set off a number of fires in the engine room and in the diesel generating room. Some machinery was still running, which meant that flames were playing on pipes full of oil under pressure, and the fires were being fed by air blown in by fans. If this had continued more fires would have broken out and the whole ship would have been in danger.

Mr. Logan's only thought was to save the ship and the lives of those aboard her by seeing to it that the machinery was shut down. He then caused a report on the situation to be made to the bridge. After that, while refusing assistance to himself, he organised the removal of the other injured members of his staff. He was ultimately persuaded to leave the engine room, but after receiving some medical treatment he tried to enter it again and was only prevented by the smoke being too dense.

After he had returned to the sick bay the ship's lights failed and he tried to get up from his bed and go below to have them seen to. He eventually left the ship about 3½ hours after the explosion and was taken to hospital where he died soon after.
