From the Duke of Savoy's Camp at Picighittone, October 28. N. S.

THis Town surrendered yesterday upon Articles, the Garison being allowed to march out with the usual Marks of Honour, and to be conducted to Cremona; and accordingly all the French Troops in the Place are to march out this day; but the Germans, Swiss, Italians and Spaniards, have either entered into the Service of the Allies, or desired Passes to return home, few or none of them continuing in French Pay. The Duke of Savoy intends to march from hence to morrow in order to join Prince Eugene, and will leave the Prince of Hesse with a Body of about 7000 Men, which will be sufficient to secure the Adia; to observe the French Troops under General Medavi, and prevent his making any Attempt, while the rest of our Forces are employed in reducing the Castle of Tortona, Gazal and Valenza; in the doing of which we expect no Opposition, the Reduction of Alexandria and the Town of Tortona having entirely deprived the Enemy of any Communication with this Country by the way of Genoa, without which it will be very difficult for their Troops to subsist in these Parts: And this Consideration, with that of the ill State of their Troops, which are now in Dauphine, and the Season's being far advanced, will in all probability prevent their attempting to return into Piedmont.

Genoa, October 31. N. S. The Pope's Gallies that were in this Port set Sail this Morning with a fair Wind for Civita-Vecchia. We have an Account from Spain, That the Forces on both sides are gone into Winter Quarters; and that his Catholick Majesty intended to call an Assembly of the States of Valencia, to meet in the Capital of that Kingdom.

Milan, November 6. The Duke of Savoy is now at Grosello, between Pavia and Casal, with the Body of Troops which was employed in the Siege of Picighittone: Since the Surrender of which Place his Royal Highness has retaken Asti: The Garison consisted of 40 Officers, and 320 private Men, who all surrendered themselves Prisoners of War. Prince Eugene, with the Troops under his Command, continues at Alexandria. Mortara and Valenza are both blocked up by Detachments of the Confederate Troops; but the Weather being very rainy, delays the Execution of his Royal Highness's further Designs.

Vienna, Nov. 6. The Imperial Forces in Hungary, under the Command of General Staremberg, marched the 2d Instant to Little Schizen, where they were joined by General Palfi with the Troops under his Command; and the next Day they advanced to Biesbeck, where they are making a Bridge over the Danube.

Frankfort, Nov. 14. Orders are given for supplying the Magazines at Landau with considerable Quantities of Provisions and Ammunition; and after that is done, our Troops on the other side of the Rhine will repass that River, and march into Winter Quarters. The Enemy's Forces are preparing to do the like. Letters from Italy say, they have had excessive Rains there, which have caused the Po and the Secchia to overflow their Banks; and have done a great deal of Damage to the Countries lying near those Rivers.

Hanover, Nov 16. On Sunday the 14th Instant, at 7 in the Evening, the Ceremony of the Marriage between the Prince Royal of Prussia and the Princess of Hanover was performed with great Solemnity, the Electoral Prince being his Royal Highness's Proxy. The Appearance of the Nobility and Persons of Quality upon this Occasion was very splendid: There was a noble Entertainment, and the great Guns round the Town, with the small Arms of two Battalions which were drawn up before the Gate of the Castle, were thrice discharged. Her Royal Highness sets out to morrow for Berlin, attended by Lieutenant-General Finck, and several other Persons of Quality.

Hague, Nov. 19. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough continues his Conferences with the Deputies of the States General and other Publick Ministers, and intends to go for England next Week if the Wind permits. The Fleet from London is arrived in the Maese, having met with stormy Weather at Sea, but suffered no great Damage. Monsieur Palmquist, Envoy Extraordinary from Sweden, has notified here, That a Treaty of Peace is concluded between the Kings of Sweden and Poland.

Falmouth, Nov. 7. The 5th Instant came into this Port Her Majesty's Ship the Swiftsure, and with her the Industry of and from Virginia, laden with Tobacco, which was taken by a French Privateer, and retaken by Her Majesty's Ship the Nonsuch near the Lizard. Yesterday sailed hence Her Majesty's Ship the Charles Galley, and under her Convoy several Transports and other Vessels bound for Plymouth.

Dartmouth, Nov. 8. This Evening came into Torbay Her Majesty's Ships the Sorlings and Fowey Pink from the Eastward.

Plymouth, Nov. 10. On the 7th Instant came in here Her Majesty's Ship the Charles Galley from Falmouth, and under her Convoy the Three Brothers of and from Virginia, bound hither, and several other Merchant-men. The next Day was brought in a Prize which came from Bayonne, and was taken by a Dutch Privateer. This Day came in here Her Majesty's Ship the Swallow from the Eastward, with a Prize of 18 Guns from Martinico, laden with Sugar, and a retaken Ship, viz. the Tyger Brigantine, of and from Boston, bound for the Maderas.

Bristol, Nov. 11. This Day came in here the Adventure of this Place, John Cockram Master, from Virginia.

Cowes, Nov. 9. On the 7th Instant arrived here the Sarah Sloop of London, George Gritten Master, from Maryland, which came out in Company of the homeward bound Virginia Fleet, but was separated from them by bad Weather; and the Viana Merchant of London, bound home from Lisbon. Yesterday came in here a Dutch Ship, Peter Hilander Master, from St. Ubes.

Poresmouth, Nov. 10. On Thursday last came into our Harbour Her Majesty's Ship the Exeter. The next Day arrived at Spithead Her Majesty's Ship the Mary Galley from Lisbon, and the Star Bomb-ship.

St. James's, Nov. 12. This Day Monsieur Walderssee, Councillor of State to the King of Denmark, and his Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary, had publick Audience of Her Majesty, and afterwards of his Royal Highness; being introduced by Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.
