Falmouth, Decemb'r. 21.

THe 10th instant several Ships put to sea from this Harbor with a fair gale; the 12th came in here the *John and Abigail* of London to lade Pill-charts for the Straights; the next day came in several Ships from Bayonne and *Bordelais*, but bring not with them any news considerable.

The 14th passed before this Harbor the *Saphir* with about 40 Merchant ships under her Convoy bound for the Straights, and the same day put in here the *Roeback* having sprung a Leaks which is held to be stopped, and on board from Dantzic with a lading of Wheat and Rye intended for France, but yesterday upon the French coast by foul weather sprang her Main Mast and Mizzen by the bows, and with some hazard and much damage in her lading recovered this Harbor.

Plymouth, Dec. 21. Here are still remaining in this Harbor about 20 sail of Ships waiting for a fair wind to convey them to their ports to which they are designed.

Danzick, Dec. 14. The 4th instant the King of Poland left Cracow intending to be the 8th at Caenfiorow where his Chapel hath prepared with a Golden Heart to a considerable value and from thence may in little time pass to Warsaw, though divers are of opinion he may rather return again to Cracow to expect the arrival of the Imperial Prince his intended Queen, it being fully resolved that the Marriage shall be solemnised before the meeting of the States of this Kingdom in the General Diet.

The King has good hopes of reducing the Cossacks in *Ucrania* to their obedience, which has been heartily endeavoured by the Seniors, they having sent several persons to Poland Conditions: the last Counter which arrived from those parts informs that there had lately happened a great Conflict between Dorozenko and Slobodko the heads of the several factions ambient in *Ucrania* in which Dorozenko is said to have obtained a considerable victory; and that he has sent an Express to give his Majesty an account of his success, and withal offering to submit himself with all Humility to His Majesty and the Republic of Poland, see p. 1. note 1. to vol. 2. of *Polonia*.

From Maffet they give no certain account of the present war between Poland and Muscovy, nor of the probability of the complete success of the difference between Muscovy and Sweden, but that Major-General Shovy from the States of the United Provinces, if few days expected, upon the 1st of the Year next, will hence he has been long absent before which he should not make any progress in the desired mediation.

Venice, Decemb'r. 14. The *Giorgio* and *Segniori* *Lodovico* *Murano*, and *Francesco Loredan* have strike themselves with the presents designed for the Grand Seignior, and have placed them in the hands of *Giorgio* and *Francesco Loredan* to send to the *Captain General of the Venetian Fleet* to *Constantinople* to inform him of his continuation to *Canca*, where he is reported with extraordinary force having received Honorable presents from the *Emperor* and a full liberty to pass the straits either to *Constantinople* or *Malta*. What other place he pleased to visit, in a short course it is to *Captain General Moreto* *Porto* before going with 14 Men of War, having sent the greater part of that Fleet to *Zante*, and dismissed several Ships from the service of the Republick.

Segnier *Corsaro*, Provostor to the Armada, is lately arrived at *Zante*, having upon the Coast of Morea received several testimonies of the Turks inclinations to keep the Peace, and of their Civilities and kindness in the readiness of all their Officers to furnish him with all Necessaries.

On Sunday last General Barbero embarked himself for his Voyage into Dalmatia, to take possession of his Charge of Provostor-General in the room of Segnier *Antonio Brilli*, but the Gally *Arbella* which was thought to have been designed for his Convoy, is employed to attend the Prince *Francesco* and his Family to *Grecia*, on his way for *Naples*.

Here are lately arrived two ships, one from *Constantinople*, the other from *Alexandria*, but sufficiently sensible how much the Trade of those parts has been abated by the great want of half Five Solz-Pieces.

Our Letters from the Levant inform us, that the Grand Vizier continues in *Candiz*, where he has made considerable progress in the Reparation of the Fortifications and Houses, and that he finds a great want of Bowlers for his Galley, in so much as he has obliged all the learned doctors in his power to contribute men to be employed in that service.

A Corsair galley belonging to *Dulcigno* some weeks since seized and made Prize of by a Frigate belonging to *Zante*, and brought her into *Dulcigno*, but upon Application made to the Balla of that place, she was immediately dismissed, with all her Men and Lading.

Yesterday in the morning the Ambassador from *Spain* took his leave at the College, being Ordered by the Duke his Master to repair immediately to *Austria*, under the same character, to be present at the Election of a successor to the Pontifical Chair.

Vienna, Dec. 24. On Wednesday last arrived here the Polish Ambassador *Batory*, unary and has conjured hitherto *Frederick* but intends to morrow to make his solemn entry with much magnificence: Two other persons of the greatest Quality are also expected from *Poland* to attend the Arch-Duchess into that Kingdom, the Empress's Elector, intending to accompany her as far as *Czecheslovakia*.

His Imperial Majesty expects suddenly the arrival of the Regiments of *Kulmen* and *Porcia* with 300 other German soldiers formerly employed in the defence of *Cannabis*, with which he intends to recruit his other Regiments, designing to increase his standing Regiment to the number of 25000 men, hoping that care will suddenly be taken for the raising of the 30000 men designed for the security of the Empire.

He *Archduke Leopold* has given Audience from the *Emperor* to conclude nearer and stronger alliance against the Turks, desiring, that His Holiness would be willing to entertain twelve thousand men for that service, which might be maintained out of several Religious Houses he intended to support, and to bestow the Revenue thereof from the late of their Lands for the common Defence of Christendome.

Decemb'r. 25. From *Maffet* we are advised, that the Governor of that place endeavouring to put in execution His Majesties Edict, commanding all French abroad the Dutch Vessels to turn their English payment and return to His Service: Ordering all such in the Partie West unwilling to give their Obedience, force might be used to reduce them: And, being inform'd that two French Men were aboard a Dutch Convoy then in the Partie

Port, he demanded them of the Captain, who refused to deliver them, urging, that they had been 20 years in Holland, where they were settled with their Wives and Children; and, to avoid any farther Dispute, put out to Sea, beyond the reach of Gun-shot, expecting to have been followed by the Ships under his Convoy; but these not taking their time, were stopped by the Governors Orders, and still remain under an Embargo, of which the Dutch Resident intends to make his Complaints.

The King is daily consulting about the best Methods of making himself considerable at Sea; and, for a supply of able men fit to Command aboard His Men of War, is resolving to have 200 young Gentlemen always maintained aboard His Admiral and Vice-Admiral, where they shall be instructed in the Art of Navigation, and all other Affairs belonging to Marine Service: and intends further to convert all the Colleges on the Sea-Coasts into Nurseries for Seamen, and has already established one at Brest for Pilots.

The King intends to divert himself about a fortnight at Versailles, which place he is so much pleased with, that he intends to have a Wall built about it, and to forme it into a City, and has encouraged his Nobility to build Houses there for their own use.

A Courrier lately arriving here from Rome, sent hither by Cardinal Uzzini, informs, That the two Parties, of the Chigi and Rospigliosi, have united themselves, hoping to make their Party so considerable in the Colleges, as to carry the Election without Dispute; and, that the Conclave was to be composed the 19th Instant; so that it is much doubted here that the Election may be over before the arrival of the Duke de Chartres His Majesties Ambassador.

The Abbot de Cauvillon is gone Post for Rome, with Dispatches from His Majesty to the Cardinals of the French Faction, who is supposed may arrive some time before the Duke, or the French Cardinals, who are all upon their way thither, except only Cardinal de Retz, who is stopped by an extraordinary Rheume, which has fallen with such violence into his Eye, as to deprive him of his sight.

Upon Information given that some Counsellours of the Parliament of Bourdeaux, had with too great liberty, and Sharpness Discourset against some of the late Edicts which His Majesty had verify'd in Parliament, his Majesty has thought fit to banish them for some time, and to confine them severally to St. Malo, Alencon, and Bayeux.

Tis believed, That the Treaty now on Foot with the Duke of Lorraine, may be suddenly concluded, it carrying with it greater advantages to the said Duke than has been of late years granted him by former Treaties.

The Grand Seignior has declared his willingness to Preserve and maintain Peace with the Emperour, on Condition that the Haydukes, and other the Emperour's Subjects, be kept in better order and Obedience then formerly, and that the Emperour will Promise not to oppose him in any of his Designs.

Brussels, Dec. 26. The French have changed and increased their Garrisons, and intend to double the number of them.

On Friday last arrived here from the Hague the Baron d'Isba the Emperour's Plenipotentiary, having been conducted as far as the Channel of Wilbroke in the States Yacht, the next day he had an Audience from the Constable of Castille, and on Sunday was with the Elector of Cologne's Resident, Treated by the Interlocutor, and on Monday returned again intending for the Hague.

The same day Sir Mark Ognate went hence to Antwerp to receive Money towards the destroying the expence of his intended Voyage into England, in the room of the lately assassinated Don Juan de Toledo.

The Deputies of Brabant have agreed to surpish their Proportions towards the maintenance of the Army, having received satisfaction in their demands made, so the

Constable, and are gone to demand the consent of the Commons, whose resolution will be given before the end of the Twelve days of this present Festival, about which time the Deputies of the Provinces of Artois, Namur, Luxembourg, and others are ordered to attend the Constable upon the same subject.

The Prince de Ligne is said to be fallen into a distemper which is believed will occasion him to defer his voyage to his Vice Royalty of Sicily till the Spring.

The Baron de Bergeick and the Sieur de Pape, two of our Commissioners for the tedious conference at Lille are againe hither, and on Sunday last had a meeting with some of the Council of State upon the subject of the said Conference.

On Sunday last came Letters from Baw, informing that the Intendant there had published that His most Christian Majesty had revoked his Declaration of the 24th of November, taking off the Sequestrations, which though it be thought to proceed only from some particular designe of the Minister; Letters are ordered to be written to the Resident at Paris to make a farther inquiry into that affair.

Hague, Dec. 27. The States have had several conferences about the Imposition upon foreign Merchandizes, intending to lay so great a Cusome upon them, as to prohibit the Importation as shall not encourage the Trade, and to prevent the Importation of Brand-wines upon pain of forfeiture of such vessel and all other their lading as shall undertake the laid Importation, but this Act is left at present half finished, nor can receive perfection till their next Assembly, which will not be till after the present Festival.

This week the Burgomasters of Zwijker gave notice to the States of the extraordinary military preparations made by the Bishop of Münster, which gave them too much reason to suspect that something might probably be intended for the disturbance of the neighborhood, for their last curiouly, pressing that their Garrisons might be reinforced, and the frontiers put into posture of defence against all attempts, the States have accordingly resolved to comply with them, and have ordered several Companies to march towards the frontiers of Flanders and towards Aesembach, to put an end to their fears and to be in readiness upon occasion.

Our new Levies go on, the 23 instant, the Officers which were last entered into service appeared before the States Deputies, and gave in their respective securities for the faithful employing of the moneys advanced by the said States for the raising of the forces for which they stood engag'd; the said Officers at the same time giving in a list of their subordinate Officers, but they are not to receive their Commission till the reassembling of the States which will be on the 7th of the next month.

The States have lately nominated the Herr Zehn, a Wit's Counsellor of Dordrecht, and a near kinsman of the Pensioner of that name to be sent Ambassador Extraordinary to the King of Poland, and the Commissioners for the affairs of Poland are ordered to draw up his Instructions.

Several debates have passed about the late interruption of our Trade in the Mediterranean, and Orders were sent to the Colleagues of the Admiralty, to send hither the said Deputies to consult with others appointed by the Secretary General about the fitting up a considerable Squadron of men of war to be sent to the straits to scour the Trade in the Mediterranean against all disturbers thereof.

July, Dec. 20. This last week arrived the Galiots of this place laden with Bully, Flax and Porculation Denmark, some of the Barley being landed was sent into the service of the Officers of the Customs. Here arrived also one Swan from Stockholm, with Iron, and one of this place with Oil and Iron from Hamburg her self.

Dec. 20. Several ships sailed bound for London, some from Bourdeaux, one from Flanders, and one from Rouen, forced in hereby English winds and seas, having rung up anchor, and so ready to set sail again, either
