Verona, Nov. 9. N. S.

THE French who are in Garison at Mantua lately, sent a Detachment towards Ponte di Lagos Scuro, to surprize some Artillery Troops that had been left to guard it so well disposed to receive them, that they did not think fit to pursue their Design. The Prince of Hesse-Cassel is gone to Milan; and it is said, Prince Eugene is shortly expected there. The Duke of Savoy has caused Casal to be invested, and is making Preparations to besiege it in Form; and Prince Eugene is likewise preparing to lay Siege to Valenza; but the very bad Weather we have at present obliges them to defer the Execution of those Designs to a more proper Season.

Cologne, Nov. 7. General Lottum is come to Aix la Chapelle with 5 Battalions of the King of Prussia's Forces, which are to remain in Garison there this Winter: The rest of his Prussian Majesty's Troops that served in Flanders are arrived upon the Frontiers of this Electorate, being most of them to quarter in these Parts. They have already begun to raise Recruits in our Neighbourhood for the Service of the Confederates. Letters from the Upper Rhine give an Account, That the French Army on that side being retired within their Lines, and their Troops having begun to march into Winter Quarters, the Imperial Forces under the Command of General Thungen had repassed the Rhine, the Enemy, tho' much superior in Number, not attempting to give them any Disturbance, and were marching to the Quarters assigned them, which are disposed in such manner, that a sufficient Body of them may be drawn together in a very short time, to prevent any Attempt the Enemy might make during the Winter.

Whitehaven, Nov. 21. Yesterday arrived here the Mary of this Port, William Grayfen Master, from Virginia; and this Day the Edgar and Amity, Richard Kelswick and Charles Graton Masters, from the same Colony; and the Union of this Place, Abraham Drinkell Master, from Philadelphia.

Falmouth, Nov. 22. On the 18th Instant a Genoese Merchant-man of 44 Guns, bound home from Amsterdam, was cast away upon the Lizard. The 19th was forced in here by contrary Winds the Scarborough, James Jameson Master, the Good-will, John Amins Master, the Port Galley, John Clark Master, and the Royal Anne, Thomas Melmoore Master, all belonging to London, and bound for the Streights. Here came in also 6 Dutch Ships bound for France.

Plimouth, Nov. 24. On the 20th Instant arrived here from London the William Galley for Leghorne, and the Oxford Galley for Viana. The 21st came in Her Majesty's Ship the August from cruising. The 22d put in here the Charles of and from Boston, Robert Seares Master, for London. The 23d came in likewise the Penelope of and for London from Nevis, Charles Keefer Master; the Chester and Worcester from cruising; and the Reward of London, homeward bound from Boston.

Dartmouth, Nov. 22. On the 20th Instant came in Torbay Her Majesty's Ship the Worcester from the Westward; the Tuscan Galley, and another of her Consors, both of London, and bound for Leghorne; the Eagle Galley of London, - - - Street Commander, bound for Oporto; and the Hopewell, John Roles Commander, from Newfoundland. This Day arrived the John and the Mary of this Place from Wales. Her Majesty's Ships the Lancaster and Tryton are still detained in Torbay by contrary Winds.

Bristol, Nov. 23. On the 19th Instant arrived here the Salisbury of this Place, and the Somerset Pink,

both from Virginia. The 21st Instant came into Kingroad Her Majesty's Ship the Bridgewater; as did also Yesterday the Samuel and Waterford Sloops, both from Waterford; and this Day the Mary from Newfoundland, belonging to this Place.

Comes, Nov. 23. Yesterday came into this Port the Loveday of and for Gottenburgh, Jacob Mire Master, from Port Louis; and the Three Brothers of Dram, Creek Owlson-Master, homeward bound from Bourdeaux.

Portsmouth, Nov. 24. Yesterday came in here Her Majesty's Ships the Hampshire and Mary Galley. At the same time sailed out of our Harbour a Dutch Man of War.

There are Three Mails due from Holland.
